Mother's Day: It's complicated

Every year on the second Sunday of May, people across the U.S. honor the sacrificial love of mothers. It's a time for family and festivities. Many celebrate by buying flowers, greeting cards and brunch. Although a secular holiday, Mother's Day is observed in certain ELCA congregations. Some churches give carnations or ask mothers to stand for a round of applause. But these well-meaning moments of recognition can be painful; for many, Mother's Day is complicated. (Even Anna Reeves Jarvis, the "mother" of Mother's Day, grew to resent the commercialization of the holiday and fought against it until the day she died.)

My love/hate relationship with Mother's Day began years ago after my husband and I had a stillbirth. Our first daughter, Baby Joy, entered the world in silence, and our lives were shattered. Consequently, Mother's Day for me is equal parts

joy and sorrow. Even though we have three living children whom we adore, my husband and I walk through life with a lingering incompleteness. When we look at our three wonderful children, we recognize that somebody is missing. This incompleteness is especially palpable during holidays, and for me, Mother's Day is the worst.

"Whether Mother's Day for you is awesome or awkward, joyful or tearful, a time for celebration or a time for hibernation, it does speak to the sacrificial love of motherhood, which can point us to the boundless love of our mothering God."

In years past, I've given myself permission to simply opt out—stay at home, pull my kids in close to my heart, and just ... be. Perhaps you are without your mother. Or you're like me and your son or daughter is gone. Or maybe you've always wanted children but, for whatever reason, that is not your reality. For some of us, simply

PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

He is Risen!

I am reflecting today on the work of your Call Committee over the past eight months, and it has been a remarkable journey. They are nearing completion of the

first part of their assignment, the preparation of the Ministry Site Profile (MSP). This standardized document used by every ELCA congregation that embarks on a call process is a summary of the history of our congregation, an honest assessment of our current reality, and a hopeful gaze into God's preferred and promised future for Shepherd of the Hills.

To drastically over-simplify matters, there are two general approaches to listening, learning, and discerning while drafting the MSP. The most basic way to view the mission of the church is in its past, present, and future dreams. This is even reflective of the categories that the Call Committee was asked to write about in the document. There is a second approach (which I find more faithful, and more difficult to write) and that is to think of the life of the congregation, past, present, and future, in terms of the mission of God. Some of you are asking, "Isn't the mission of the church and the mission of God the same thing?" In my experience, I do not think you can make that assumption.

What's the difference? Let me just talk about the mission of God. This is the vantage point from which your Call Committee tried to focus. The operating assumption is that God is already active and present in our community and neighborhood. Our task is not to "bring God to the people" or even expect people to come to us to discover God. Jesus is alive. The Holy Spirit is already present and active in the world. Our task is to discern where we see God at work, name it, rejoice in it, and join in that work.

Is this a hopeful future? Yes! Is it an easy future? No. Is it clear what the path should be to join in this preferred and promised future of

God, for which God has provided and will continue to provide Shepherd of the Hills with all of the resources necessary to join in God's mission? No. Most congregations who take the mission of God approach rather than the mission of the church approach seriously discover a greater capacity for innovation, evaluation, and the acceptance of a few failures along the way.

"OK, Pastor, this is a lot of nice theological wordsmithing here, but in practical terms, what might this look like for us?" Fair question. Let me take two treasured activities in the life of Shepherd of the Hills, of which I have ZERO experience (so I might be completely wrong): VBS and Pumpkins on the Hill. I understand that these are viewed as important events that focus primarily on people who are not members of Shepherd of the Hills. Wonderful. Before those two events happen this year, what would happen if, for VBS, we (and when I say we, I don't mean the four or five people planning, I mean everyone in the congregation) ask friends and neighbors with target age children, 'What would be important for you and your child if they came to VBS?' Instead of assuming what the imaginary neighborhood child or parent wants, why don't we ask a few? When you see your neighbor out for a walk with their children, be bold and ask them. Might God be present in that very conversation?! The same can be done for Pumpkins on the Hill.

Back to the Call Committee and their work sometime this month, they will complete the MSP, and it will be submitted to the synod office. At that point, parts of it will be a public document, and you can read it and share it with others.

God is up to wonderful things in the midst of this congregation; may we have eyes to see and the courage to act.

In Church News, we are nearing the completion of the Big Room


Renovation. I would like to give Stan and Don Ward special thanks for taking care of this project for us.

The initial renovation of the Big Room plus the flooring is complete. We will need to get a new fan to replace the current one. The renovation has made the room a more welcoming place for meetings and other gather-

ings. Thank you to contractor Don Ward and the several volunteers who pitched in with painting and other finishing jobs, which made it possible for us to be able to use the "new" room for Easter brunch.

Some other improvements have included painting the new entrance door to the right of the lectern, as well the new entrance door in Ed II. These doors were replaced many months ago but not painted. Additionally, motion sensor lights were installed around the perimeter of the church. Two lights still need to be installed on the backside of the preschool.

We accomplished quite a lot in a short period on our April 2nd workday to get ready for Easter. We cleaned up debris and weeds, trimmed trees and bushes, weeded and spread wood chips near the visitor's parking area, cleaned up and organized the sacristy, and completed the trimming around the perimeter of the backlot. CONFIRMED IN THE FAITH



Confirmation, a rite many churches celebrate each spring, has biblical roots. In Acts 8, Peter and John are sent to lay their hands on new believers and pray for them to receive the Holy Spirit. In the early church, new Christians — usually adult converts — received baptism and confirmation as one ceremony. As more children were brought for baptism, pastors and priests would baptize, but only bishops would "confirm" a baptism, or make it official. Thus, the baptized were granted full membership in the church through confirmation.

Now confirmation allows young people, often after intensive Christian education, to profess for themselves the faith into which they were baptized. Confirmation serves as an important faith milestone, as young adults purposefully embrace a life of discipleship.

FAITH IN FINANCES

My New Year's resolution was to make quarterly reports in The Horn. Since quarterly reports aren't complete until two weeks into the following quarter, the first quarter information is not available for April.

Through March 31, 2022, we show a profit of \$2,820. This

is misleading. Although the P&L states expenses of \$28,163, payments totaled \$63,345. Some of the payments are offset by income (Pre-school payroll) and some payments were made from restricted accounts. That said, we remain in a favorable financial position.

For those interested in the state of our mortgage, here's where we stand. On May 1, the principal balance will be \$211,695. Per the original amortization schedule, the mortgage would be paid off on November 1, 2030. However, we have been making additional payments for several years on the principal to retire the loan earlier. It will not be much earlier, but it should save us at least a year's worth of interest.

I am happy to report that offering collections are on target through March. Thank you to all our generous and faith-filled members.

ECUMENICAL AND INTER-RELIGIOUS RELATIONS FULL COMMUNION PARTNERS

(https://www.elca.org/Faith/Ecumenical-and-Inter-Religious-Relations/Full-Communion)

Full communion is when two denominations develop a relationship based on a common confessing of the Christian faith and a mutual recognition of Baptism and sharing of the Lord's Supper. This does not mean the two denominations merge; rather, in reaching agreements, denominations also respect differences. These denominations worship together, may exchange clergy and also share a commitment to evangelism, witness and service in the world. Each entity agrees that even with differences, there is nothing that is church-dividing.

A central document to Lutherans is the Augsburg Confession. Article VII of the Augsburg Confession states that "the true unity of the church" is present where the gospel is rightly preached and sacraments rightly administered. The ELCA is committed to this model of full communion as an authentic expression of Christian unity.

Characteristics of full communion

For the ELCA, the characteristics of full communion are theological and missiological implications of the gospel that allow variety and flexibility. These characteristics stress that the church act ecumenically for the sake of the world, not for itself alone. They will include at least the following, some of which exist at earlier stages:

- common confessing of the Christian faith
- mutual recognition of Baptism and a sharing of the Lord's Supper, allowing for joint worship and an exchangeability of members
- mutual recognition and availability of ordained ministers to the service of all, subject to the disciplinary regulations of other denominations
- common commitment to evangelism, witness and service
- means of common decision-making on critical common issues of faith and life
- mutual lifting of any condemnations that exist between denominations.




The White Water Bible Study group will be taking a long break from its regular Tuesday afternoon meetings. We have several members who are traveling for the full month of May and others who are having

WE REMEMBER

More than 150 years ago, Memorial Day took shape amid the backdrop of the U.S. Civil War. Before it ended, women began decorating the graves of fallen soldiers. In 1868, when May 30 was designated as Decoration Day, loved ones placed flowers on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers alike.

By 1882, Decoration Day became known as Memorial Day, and soldiers who died in other wars were honored too. Over time, it became a day to remember all loved ones who have died — in war and otherwise. In 1971, Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday to be observed on the last Monday in May. On Memorial Day, we pause to remember people who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country and for our freedom. We also pray for those who continue serving, especially those in harm's way.

attending church on Mother's Day is an act of courage. Whether Mother's Day for you is awesome or awkward, joyful or tearful, a time for celebration or a time for hibernation, it does speak to the sacrificial love of motherhood, which can point us to the boundless love of our mothering God.

Our individual experiences may vary, but we all had someone give birth to us. Some of us, like me, have mothers who are incredibly awesome. Yet for some, the word "mother" is not synonymous with love. Sadly, too many of us know mothers who are far from the loving archetype. Even our God, through the prophet Isaiah, recognized this painful reality. "Can a woman forget her nursing child, or show no compassion for the child of her womb? Even these may forget, yet I will not forget you" (Isaiah 49:15).

For some of us, it might be challenging to imagine God as Mother. When I think of our mothering God, I immediately think of our Savior in Matthew's gospel. Jesus himself steps into the role of mother: "How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings" (Matthew 23:37). There are many other maternal similes in the Bible. In Hosea 13:8, God is imagined as an angry mother bear defending her cubs. In Deuteronomy 32:11-12, we witness God as a majestic mother eagle. This imagery reminds us that God's grace stretches far beyond our human understanding. Not even a mother's love can compare with God's love for us, which is powerful, everlasting and unfathomable. God's love never changes and never fails. This is something we all can celebrate.







What you need:

- Adult help






- 2. Paint the flowers and leaves. Let dry.
