PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Scot Sorensen, Interim Pastor



Several Sunday's ago, I spoke about five ancient Christian practices that congregations around the world are rediscovering in order to live out their mission

in this 21st century. I want to revisit those with you here, but first start with the 'Why now?' question.

There is little argument that the era when a particular expression of the Christian church was the sole voice in the culture is over. We live at a time when we are multi...multicultural, multiethnic, multi-religious, multifaceted shrinking world where news literally travels at the speed of light.

The church in general, and congregations in particular, must dig deep in the roots to discover what is at the core of our existence. In other words, why are we here? Literally, why has God planted and kept Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran church here on Trinity Drive in Vacaville in the second decade of the 21st Century?

Our basic God-given tasks are to love God and love neighbor. And what does that look like? It means we make disciples, and we form Christian community. We are not very good anymore at "making" disciples. Perhaps we know how to welcome full-formed disciples. But we are out of practice when it comes to making a follower of Jesus from someone who does not know the Christian story. And, we are no better or further along

at forming Christian community than we read about those early Christian communities in Corinth or Jerusalem whose public fights are recorded in Acts and other New Testament books.

We are not alone in our effort to relearn the practices that help make disciples and form Christian community. As I said, Christians around the globe are rediscovering these practices. And the nomenclature of practices is intentional. We practice skills to gain mastery. And so, here are the practices for us to engage:

Dwelling in the Word — Reading the scriptures to listen. This is a practice that we are out of practice doing together. This is not personal devotion time, it is a community activity. I have started to live into this practice with the Steering Team and will bring it to the new Call Committee. I believe this is a bedrock practice to form Christian community and make disciples. The practice is reading the scriptures together in order to listen to the Scriptures and one another.

Spiritual Discernment - This goes with #1, and the practice includes listening to scripture and also listening to saints, neighbors, and one another to discern God's desire for us. We do our corporate work more faithfully and effectively when we listen first to the Word and then to one another through a regular ritual where we hear everyone well, creating conversation that considers what God might be calling us to pay attention to. The operating assumption here is that God cares

about our choices and decision; hence, the importance of discernment. It is only if we truly believe there is a preferred and promised future for us as a congregation that we will take the time and practice spiritual discernment.

Proclaim the Kingdom of God has come near - We need to relearn the practice of believing and acting like announcing the presence of the Kingdom of God matters. We need to be the people who can see the gifts of God in our everyday lives. We believe God is still giving us things, still loving us, still triumphing over evil. And, as faithful people, we want to do more than just notice these things. We want to say that we have seen God's presence and work in the world. Pointing out the presence of Jesus, God's activity in the world is the practice of proclaiming the Kingdom of God has come near. Sharing where you encounter Jesus is part of this practice.

Focus for missional action. This is a difficult practice, but like the others, it is crucial. We need to become more focused rather than less. Frankly, we need to stop saying yes to everything. When we are trying to be all things to all people at all times, we are both

exhausted, and every step is like walking in thick mud. By following 1, 2, & 3, we can stop doing those activities that do not move us forward into God's preferred and promised future.

Hospitality - For years we have suspected that our churches may not be the most hospitable places for visitors, especially visitors who don't look, speak, or think like us. This spiritual practice proposes that we need to learn what it's like to be a stranger or guest first to better practice hospitality. We need to know what it is to be a guest, visitor, and outsider. How might seeing the world as a guest help us learn to host? Even though Shepherd of the Hills has been here for nearly 40 years, how are we still dependent upon the hospitality, the neighborliness of all of our neighbors?

These are NOT "Five Steps To A Vibrant Church." Nope. These are ancient yet difficult practices that need to be tried, poked, and explored over and over and over again. These are just the beginning practices of a long journey, a journey into God's preferred and promised future.



Scriptures

A cradle that holds the infant Jesus. Baby blankets that clothe the newborn Christ. Lutherans often use these well-known metaphors from Martin Luther to describe the Christian Scriptures and their importance. These simple metaphors clearly and profoundly describe both what the Scriptures are and what is their purpose.

Simply stated, the Scriptures tell about Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit uses the Scriptures to present Jesus to all who listen to or read them. That is why Lutheran Christians say that the Scriptures are the "source and norm" of their teaching and practice. As the Gospel writer John wrote, "these things are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name" (John 20:31).

Obviously, the Scriptures that are collected into a book or Bible describe and speak about many other things — everything from the creation of the world to the world's end. Because these writings originate from a time period that spans about a thousand years and come to us in a variety of handwritten manuscripts and fragments, they have been studied carefully with all the tools of research that are available. This research continues to enrich understanding of the Scriptures and their message.

Despite the diversity of viewpoints and the complexity of the many narratives contained in the Scriptures, Lutheran Christians believe that the story of God's steadfast love and mercy in Jesus is the heart and center of what the Scriptures have to say.






