

Still waiting for the time to be back in the sanctuary for worship! Our efforts are pending approval for Stage 2. Stage 3 is where we will need to be if we are going to have reduced the risk of Coronavirus enough to gather for corporate worship. All kinds of events have been canceled, postponed, or altered; weddings, graduations, celebrations, school attendance, and social gathering of one kind or another.

I am currently pondering a sermon by Walter Brueggemann "Until the Dancing Begins Again." Walter draws from Jeremiah and writes of the cancellations as "no time to celebrate and no time to bet on the future."

Jeremiah 7:34 – The corpses pile up and weddings among other events are cancelled, the land is laid to waste.

Jeremiah 16:9 – Not even having funerals.


Jeremiah 25:10 – Jeremiah anticipates that the land will become a ruin and a waste. Walter continues about Jeremiah leaning into the disaster of his people seeing the failure to meet as a sign of the death of the city. "Social life has failed," he continues and makes the link to our experience of the current pandemic. Walter following Jeremiah is critical of those who would continue assembling, among them Pastors who insist that Jesus will protect them from the virus. Walter says his own Pastor calls those Pastors who insist on meeting "Knuckleheads." Jeremiah did not name them that because the whole social reality was shut down. (Note: Some large TV churches continue on TV with most worshipping not wearing masks.)

But Jeremiah is not without Hope! Jeremiah envisions a time of return, of a time when celebrations will again take place, and when people, "can again bet on and invest in the future."

Jeremiah 33:10-11 ¹⁰ The Lord proclaims: You have said about this place, "It is a wasteland, without humans or animals." Yet in the ravaged and uninhabited towns of Judah and the streets of Jerusalem, ¹¹ the sounds of joy and laughter and the voices of the bride and the bridegroom will again be heard. So will the voices of those who say, as thank offerings are brought to the Lord's temple, "Give thanks to the Lord of heavenly forces, for the Lord is good and his kindness lasts forever." I will bring back the captives of this land as they were before, says the Lord.

The anticipation will occur where waste, disaster, and devastation were, now with life resuming with "rich social thickness." "Amid the sounds of social gladness there will be songs of thank offerings sung to the God who restores and revivifies." *Give thanks to the God of host, for*

the Lord is good, for his steadfast love endures forever. -Psalm 126:11
Walter has helped us to see that when compared with the local statement of the local sta



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Jeremiah speaks of the hope of returning to weddings, and the restoration of fortunes, Jeremiah 29:14, 30:3, 18, 31:23, 32:44, 33:7, 27. God restores – Homecoming, Friday gives way to Easter. Singing and dancing as when the Son returns home – lost now found, and they must celebrate. –Luke 15:11-32

This song of thanks that Jeremiah anticipates puts me in mind of the great German anthem of thanks, "Now Thank We All Our God." This best loved hymn of German Evangelicals was written by Pastor Martin Rinkart during the Thirty Years War (1618-1648) as a table grace for his family. The notice I have on this work by Pastor Rinkart offers this startling awareness:

Martin Rinkart was pastor in Eilenburg, Saxony, the town of his birth. The walled city was a refuge for many fleeing war and pestilence. Left as the only clergyman in town, he often buried as many as forty or fifty persons in one day. Although his wife died of the pestilence, Rinkart survived (A New Century Hymnal Companion: Ag Guide to the Hymns ed. by Kristen L. Forman [Cleveland: Pilgrim Press, 1998] 421.)

He wrote not only during the long-running war but in the face of pestilence that decimated the population as he presided over their many deaths. We do well to ponder this simple table prayer of gratitude amid pestilence:

Now thank we all our God with hearts and hands and voices, who wondrous things hath done, in whom this world rejoices; who, from our mothers' arms, hath blessed us on our way with countless gifts of love, and still is ours today.

O may this bounteous God through all our life be near us, with ever joyful hearts and blessed peace to cheer us; and keep us in God's grace, and guide us when perplexed, and free us from all ills in this world and the next.

The context of his work, not unlike our own, was a scene of relentless death. Yet Rinkart wrote and sang of thanks! The hymn celebrates the "wondrous things" done by "this bounteous God." We can picture pastor Rickart with his children counting out, one by one, "countless gifts of love." The hymn invites us to cling to God's grace that "frees us of all ills" in all imaginable futures. The words are as sure, bold, and as awe-filled as is Israel's best doxology in 33:11.

Jeremiah breaths hope in the face of despair. God is the one who holds the future, who opens up ways of life before us. God is pro-life¹ in the broadest sense of that term from womb to tomb. Health care, education, livable wages, safety net, secure housing, elimination of poverty, environmental care of creation, addressing climate change, immigration, voting rights, civility in politics, overcoming systemic racism, all of which constitute some of what it means to be pro-life.

Now God is working, note how recently student debts and interest can be deferred, and medical copayments cancelled. God is working on behalf of people and care of the earth. These are ways we witness God's abiding presence in this pandemic and beyond. Now thank we all our God.
