NOTES OF INTEREST

Music Notes

Recently, I have been pondering how we know when instrumental music is sacred. This is easy enough to determine when music is sung; either the text is about God or it is not. Instrumental music, lacking a text, is more difficult to categorize. Sometimes pieces of music have an association with things that are obviously non-sacred. For instance, the themes to “Jaws” or “Psycho” will bring to mind the movies, not God, and, therefore, will fail as sacred music. Other times pieces of music develop a sacred association despite their non-sacred origins. Wagner’s “Wedding March” from the opera, *Lohengrin*, or Mendelssohn’s “Wedding March” from *Midsummer Night’s Dream*, based on a Shakespeare play, although secular by origin, have become sacred through their use in wedding ceremonies, which, by definition, are services of Christian worship. Other times the title or subtitle of the work gives us a hint as to the composer’s intent. Gustav Mahler’s Second Symphony, “Resurrection,” is a decent example (full disclosure; this work involves two vocal soloists and chorus singing a sacred text). In the end, there is likely a certain amount of subjectivity. Aaron Copland’s “Fanfare for the Common Man” (linked below) to me always brings images of God bringing order from chaos, as in the Creation story.

I have no academic basis for this, but inasmuch as the images this piece conjure in me reflect a sacred event, Creation, the piece, itself, becomes sacred.
