

From the Pastor

February 2020



"Oh, how love I Thy law! It is my meditation all the day." Psalm 119:97

Christianity is not a legal relationship; it is a love relationship. Ten thousand "don'ts" will never make us one iota more like the Lord Jesus Christ. It is our desire that moves us to be like Him. Desire is the key because this helps us want to spend time with the One who loves us. As we approach the month called "love" and the Lenten Season let me suggest five factors that can help us share some quiet time and grow with Him each day.

The Proper Period - We must find the right time. It would be great if we could spend at least half an hour in quiet time. But some time is better than no time, so if we can't start at thirty minutes, begin with ten. It should be our very best time. Don't give the Lord our leftovers. And don't just try to find time - make time and make it a priority. Also find time early in the day. Psalm 5:3 says, "... in the morning will I direct my prayer unto Thee, and will look up." We don't take the trip and then read the map, do we? Spend time alone with God to begin our day.

The Proper Preparation - A quiet time is fellowship with a holy God. There are a few things we can do to be prepared for this time. First, be physically alert. Find a time when the cobwebs are out of our mind and we can think clearly. Second, be mentally aware. Be focused and know He's there. Emotion doesn't really have all that much to do with it. And third, be morally pure and clean. Some people don't have a quiet time because they feel uncomfortable looking God in the face with sin in their lives. Remember He loved us before we even knew Him.

The Proper Place - Find a place where we can focus. Jesus said enter our closet and pray (see Matthew 6:6). That simply means find a place of isolation where we can shut the door on the world and open the windows to heaven. Jesus sought out places where He could be alone, and so should we.

The Proper Provisions - In order to have an effective quiet time, we need the right tools. Here are some tools I use: a readable Bible - invest in one with plenty of room to jot notes in the margins; a prayer journal - expect God to give us something and write it down. Also use it to record things we're praying about; a notepad - write down our daily assignments.

The Proper Procedure - Finally, may I recommend some procedures to follow in our quiet time?

Get still and quiet. The Bible says in Psalm 46:10, "Be still, and know that I am God." Let's focus our mind on Him. Calm down, relax, and recognize His presence. Take a deep breath and focus our thoughts on the Lord.

Get into the Word of God. It's better to start by reading the Bible than it is to start in prayer. It is more important for us to hear from God, than for God to hear from us. God already knows all about us, but we need to know a lot more about Him. Read the Bible for quality and not quantity. It's good to have a goal to read the Bible through in a year, or something similar; but that's not the purpose of our quiet time. Also, devotional books are wonderful. But again, this is not the place for them. This is the time when we simply read the Bible with an open mind getting to know our Loving God.

Meditate. As we focus on the Word of God and meditate, let it permeate us. Ask: Is there a command to obey? Is there a promise to claim? Is there a sin to avoid? Is there a lesson to learn? Is there a new truth to carry with me? It's not being legalistic, it opens us to God's presence with and in us.

Record what God has given us. Write down what God says to us and what He tells us to do. It doesn't have to be flowery. We're not writing it for publication or to impress other people, we're writing to help ourselves grow with Him.

Now we're ready to pray. When we pray, let's pour out our soul. Be natural and honest with God. Tell Him how we feel. Pray out loud. It keeps our mind on track and enables us to stay focused.

Begin to share out of our quiet time. God did not make us to be reservoirs; He made us to be conduits. Tell others what God is showing us and let His light shine brightly in our lives.

Finally, obey what God tells us. Our spiritual train is running on two rails. One is revelation and the other is obedience. And if either rail stops, our train stops. Let's learn to obey the Word of God.

I pray these simple suggestions will help us have a daily quiet time in the presence of our loving, almighty, powerful God. As we begin anew day, let's be more intent on growing our relationship with God...He's waiting for us. Grace and peace in a new life with Christ...Pastor David

Our Family Night Suppers will be postponed during the Lenten season. They will resume on April 22nd with the Clyburn-Whitener Class hosting.








2020 Altar Flowers

Salke-what? What is Salkehatchie?

Salkehatchie is about hard work, making connections with families, other youth, and understanding our mission as children of God.

The Salkehatchie name comes from a river that flows through the coastal plain of South Carolina, where many of the towns and neighborhoods we serve are located. Just like the river, Salkehatchie's service follows a course through time that is influenced by location, people, circumstances and historical events.

JOHN CULP, THE FOUNDER AND EVER-PRESENT SHEPHERD, STARTED LEADING YOUTH GROUPS INTO DEDICATED SERVICE BACK IN 1978. A GROUP OF 40 UNITED METHODISTS STEPPED INTO THE LIVES OF FOUR FAMILIES AFFECTED BY SOME OF THE WORST POVERTY IN AMERICA. THEY WORKED TIRELESSLY FOR ONE WEEK RESTORING DILAPIDATED HOUSES ON THE SEA ISLANDS OF SOUTH CAROLINA. WITH ONE WEEK OF WORK, THE LIVES OF THESE YOUTH AND FAMILIES HAD BEEN FOREVER TRANSFORMED.

This small group has now transformed into 46 Camps and 2,000+ campers every summer. The Salkehatchie Summer Service is an autonomous mission supported entirely by its participants, the communities it serves, and the United Methodist Church Conference of South Carolina.

It's More Than Just a Summer Camp It's a Life Changing Week

Salkehatchie is more than just a church outreach program. It is more than just a volunteer group and it is more than just a summer youth camp. Salkehatchie is faith in action. Youth volunteers head into rural, lowincome towns to work in difficult conditions, allowing themselves to be the face, hands and feet of Christ. Volunteers spend one week: Performing home repairs in teams, doing projects as small as a building a ramp or as big as remodeling an entire kitchen. (All skill sets are welcomed and encouraged.) Making a bond with families of different backgrounds than their own. Learning about teamwork and making friend-ships that last a lifetime. Salkehatchie strips youth of their familiar roles for seven days. Experience the significance of going unplugged, with a limited regimen in an open learning environment. You will be encouraged to do things for yourself, problem solve and learn from one another.

Salkehatchie's Union camp will be on June 20-27, 2020. Plans are already underway with getting meals scheduled at area churches and collecting requests from home owners. Preparing is really an all year thing. Rev. John Culp will be returning for the 2020 Camp at Union.














All Area Churches Are Invited to What's Happening at Buffalo UMC



SHMILY

They dragged "shmily" with their fingers through the sugar and flour containers to await whoever was preparing the next meal. They smeared it in the dew on the windows overlooking the patio where my grandma always fed us warm, homemade pudding with blue food coloring. "Shmily" was written in the steam left on the mirror after a hot shower, where it would reappear bath after bath. At one point, my grandmother even unrolled an entire roll of toilet paper to leave "shmily" on the very last sheet.

There was no end to the places "shmily" would pop up. Little notes with "shmily" scribbled hurriedly were found on dashboards, and car seats, or taped to steering wheels. The notes were stuffed inside shoes and left under pillows. "Shmily" was written in the dust upon the mantel and traced in the ashes of the fireplace. This mysterious word was as much a part of my grandparents' house as the furniture.

It took me a long time before I was able to fully appreciate my grandparents' game. Skepticism has kept me from believing in true love one, that is pure and enduring. However, I never doubted my grandparents' relationship. They had love down pat. It was more than their flirtatious little games; it was a way of life. Their relationship was based on a devotion and passionate affection which not everyone is lucky to experience.

Grandma and Grandpa held mands every chance they could. They stole kisses as they bumped into each other in their tiny kitchen. They finished each other's sentences and shared the daily crossword puzzle and word jumble. My grandma whispered to me about how cute my grandpa was, how handsome an old man he had grown to be. She claimed that she really knew "how to pick 'em." Before every meal they bowed their heads and gave thanks, marveling at their blessings: a wonderful family, good fortune, and each other.

But there was a dark cloud in my grandparents' life: my grandmother had breast cancer. The disease had first appeared ten years earlier. As always, Grandpa was with her every step of the way. He comforted her in their yellow room, painted that way so that she could always be surrounded by sunshine, even when she was too sick to go outside.

Now the cancer was again attacking her body. With the help of a cane and my grandfather's steady hand, they went to church every morning. But my grandmother grew steadily weaker until, finally, she could not leave the house anymore. For a while, Grandpa would go to church alone, praying to God to watch over his wife. Then one day, what we all dreaded finally happened. Grandma was gone.

"Shmily." It was scrawled in yellow on the pink ribbons of my grandmother's funeral bouquet. As the crowd thinned and the last mourners turned to leave, my aunts, uncles, cousins and other family members came forward and gathered around Grandma one last time. Grandpa stepped up to my grandmother's casket and, taking a shaky breath, he began to sing to her. Through his tears and grief, the song came, a deep and throaty lullaby.

Shaking with my own sorrow, I will never forget that moment. For I knew that, although I couldn't begin to fathom the depth of their love, I had been privileged to witness its unmatched beauty.

S-H-M-I-L-Y!


