It's.....IT'S......2019!

We all knew it was inevitable. We kept seeing it around the corner. We even attempted to make things different as it was creeping closer. And now...we officially say "HAPPY NEW YEAR." 2018 had great moments...but 2019 promises 365 new and exciting days (8760 hours, 525600 minutes or 31,536,000 seconds) for each of us. With the New Year comes resolutions. "I will start a healthier lifestyle." "I will be a better husband/wife/parent." "I will focus on developing a new skill." Well, we know our intentions. With the promise of a new year, the real question is, "What would be the most important step in our lives we can take for Jesus?" Could it be growing faithfulness, intentional witnessing, or proactive attitude? What would it take to actually put Christ first in everything?

In Charles Sheldon's book "In His Steps," Rev. Henry Maxwell was preparing the Sunday sermon based on 1 Peter 2:21, "To this you were called, because Christ suffered for you, leaving you an example, that you should follow in his steps." Interrupted by the doorbell, he went downstairs, and opened the door to find a homeless man. Rev. Maxwell didn't have anything to offer and the dejected man left with his hat in his hand.

Henry's wife came home later and told him about a young man who came to the nursery holding a dirty hat in his hand. They agreed it was the same man and went about their business.

The next Sunday at First Church, the worship service was outstanding. The music, the anthem, the prayer response, the sermon, everything bolstered the congregation. "Suddenly into the midst of this perfect accord and concord between preacher and audience, there came a very remarkable interruption." The sound of a man's voice, the same man who had visited Henry earlier at his home, was standing in front of the church. He shared his plight, not wanting anything from anyone, but

offered a ponderable question, "What do you Christians mean by following the step of Jesus?"

Now, that's a great prompter for us to consider as we begin the first moment of 2019, "What does following Jesus mean?" We each have our thoughts and Scripture has many verses for us to consider.

The First Church of Raymond found a true challenge in their midst that Sunday morning. (January will be a great time to read the book and I have a couple copies I'll be glad to lend.) As we begin a new year as followers of Christ, laying claim to membership in the family of God, I wonder, if rather than church & life as usual, what would happen if we would pledge ourselves "earnestly and honestly for this entire year not to do anything without asking the question, 'What Would Jesus Do?'" (Remember WWJD? Its hay day was in the 90's but it truly is still the right and best way.)

In the year 2019 of our Lord Jesus Christ, we are offered a new resolution. There are a multitude of things we would like to do, like becoming more physically fit, a better husband or wife, or developing a new skill, all of which are good. We, at Grace and all other Christian churches, have laid claim to be followers of Jesus Christ. So, as we begin this new year let's set our hearts and sights on growing our relationship with God by accepting the challenge to follow Jesus. Let's truly ask God what He wants us to think, say and do for Him in order that our witness will be so compelling that folks will hunger for the spirit living in and through us.

Is it a challenge? You bet! Do we step out alone? Never! Christ promises He'll never leave us or forsake us. Now, my precious sisters and brothers is our opportunity to truly show the Living Spirit to a starving world. All it takes is for us to lift our foot to make the first step. A Prayer for the New Year: Wesley's Covenant Prayer

For countless years of my youth, I was at Conyers First United Methodist Church on New Year's Eve. Each year, the youth group at my home church hosted a lock-in on New Year's Eve. These long nights were filled with lip-singing contests (I won many of these), games that involved us running through a huge dark church, pizza, and a pancake breakfast on New Year's day. It seems like every year there was also a broken stained glass window discovered the Sunday after.

While vague memories of those fun times have lingered, I'll never forget being in the sanctuary when the clock struck 12:00 each year.

We didn't have a fancy service. We would gather in the sanctuary, which was always filled with a little more mystery without the sun-lit stained glass and loud organ present. Typically, we would sing worship songs played off of the latest WOW Worship CD. Our youth minister would give a short message. Then, we would sit in the pews and pray as the New Year arrived

I don't remember many specifics of my prayers on those evenings. But I always remember feeling the transcendent presence of God in the darkened space. I also remember asking myself this question each year: "Am I closer to God this year as compared to last year?" Some years this question was very convicting. Other years it led me to celebration. Little did I nor the youth minister know that our gathering in the sanctuary on New Year's Eve was a Methodist tradition that began years before.

In 1755, John Wesley began leading Covenant Renewal services. These services were times in which people would remember the covenant made at their baptism—a covenant to serve God with all one's heart and soul. Wesley found that these services were very encouraging and powerful for everyone involved, and soon they began being held in numerous Methodist societies.

Over time, many British Methodist churches began to hold these services on New Year's Day or the first Sunday of the year since these were natural times of renewing commitments. These services continue with regularity in British Methodism today. While only a small number of congregations in America hold these services each new year, the order of worship for a Covenant Renewal service can be found on page 288 of the UMC Book of Worship.

One of the most powerful aspects of the service is the "Wesley Covenant Prayer." While John Wesley admitted that he was not the originator of this prayer, it has served as a powerful tool for spiritual formation in the Methodist church over the last two centuries.

Throughout my first six months of ministry I have prayed this prayer regularly in the mornings in order to help orient my heart for the day. I plan to continue to pray it throughout this new year, and I'd like to invite you to pray this prayer with me as well.

The Wesley Covenant Prayer

I am no longer my own, but thine.

Put me to what thou wilt, rank me with whom thou wilt.

Put me to doing, put me to suffering.

Let me be employed for thee or laid aside for thee,

exalted for thee or brought low for thee.

Let me be full, let me be empty.

Let me have all things, let me have nothing.

I freely and heartily yield all things to thy pleasure and disposal.

And now, O glorious and blessed God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit,

thou art mine, and I am thine.

So be it.

And the covenant which I have made on earth,

let it be ratified in heaven.

Amen.

2019 Altar Flowers





A Hope and a Promise

"But the angel said to them, do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord." Luke 2:11

For many of us, this season will be an endurance marathon of way too much to do, way too much to eat and way too much stress. However, the true blessing of the Christmas season can be discovered when we focus on preparing our hearts to receive again the greatest gift given to humankind: the hope, comfort, joy and glad tidings the baby Jesus brought to earth.

The birth of the Christ child was the fulfillment of God's promise. This is really good news! Even though our minds are often distracted by other thoughts, preoccupied with schedules and not always thinking about heavenly things, the Christmas story still clearly speaks to us today. While we live in such a highly competitive society—one that produces winners and losers, not only in sports, but also in the business world, in office settings and even in the church—we have the opportunity to let God come and minister to us in this Christmas season. And even though we live in a world that encourages personal gain, it is important to remember that the same message delivered to the shepherds is shared with you and me. Once again, it is the story of God's love coming down to save, to restore and to forgive. It is a message we have heard before. It is a message of hope that God is with us, looking on.

About hope, retired Minnesota Supreme Court Justice Alan Page says, "When you have no hope, you want to destroy the society around you. When you have hope, you want to protect the society. The goal is to give hope and provide opportunity."

Choosing hope makes all the difference.

At the heart of the Christmas message there is a baby born who could change everything. Christmas is all about Jesus coming to be with us. It is about Immanuel, God with us, looking on. So despite all the distractions around us, we focus on this hope that exists because of the birth of baby Jesus. We anticipate the joy of experiencing God's promise fulfilled, and in so doing, our hearts are prepared both to receive the greatest gift and to share it freely with others.

Let us focus on sharing the gift of hope with all whom we meet, and let us remember in prayer those still recovering from the storms of past and present that have caused damage for many people in South Carolina, those who have been elected to lead us in government in our communities, our state and our nation, and let us also remember in prayer the South Carolina Conference delegation along with the global United Methodist Church as all prepare for the called General Conference in February 2019.

May this prayer of hope be a gift to you during the Christmas season:

For every beginning, there is an ending. For every memory, there is a dream. As we share in the excitement of this season and the hope that it offers, may we cultivate the capacity to respect and honor one another. May we live with a purpose bigger than ourselves. May we recognize that our lives will be measured by our actions more than our words. May we be vigilant in service to all regardless of their place or station in life. May we be ever mindful to:

Watch your thoughts, because they become your words;

Watch your words, because they become your actions;

Watch your actions, because they become your habits;

Watch your habits, because they become your character;

Watch your character, because it determines your destiny.

May we walk through this Christmas season inspired by the hope found in the birth of baby Jesus and determined to be active members in our churches and in our communities, and may we move beyond ourselves. May the God of grace and mercy go with us.

"Singing Around the Chrismon Tree" and Cookies and Cocoa


