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From The Pastor

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The Theology of the Fourth of July (written by Ira Stoll)

July 4 is a religious holiday. For this insight, thank John F. Kennedy. On July 4, 1946, Kennedy — then 29 years old, the Democratic nominee for a Massachusetts Congressional seat, and still a lieutenant in the Navy Reserve, was the featured speaker at the City of Boston's Independence Day celebration. He spoke at Faneuil Hall, the red-brick building where long ago the colonists had gathered to protest taxes imposed by King George III and his Parliament.

Kennedy began by talking not about taxes, or about the British, or about the consent of the governed, but about religion. "The informing spirit of the American character has always been a deep religious sense. Throughout the years, down to the present, a devotion to fundamental religious principles has characterized American though and action," he said.

For anyone wondering what this had to do with Independence Day, Kennedy made the connection explicit. "Our government was founded on the essential religious idea of integrity of the individual. It was this religious sense which inspired the authors of the Declaration of Independence: 'We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights.""

It was a theme that Kennedy would return to during the 1960 presidential campaign, when, in a speech at the Mormon Tabernacle in Salt Lake City, he described the Cold War as "a struggle for supremacy between two conflicting ideologies; freedom under God versus ruthless, Godless tyranny." And again in his inaugural address, on January 20, 1961, in Washington, D.C., when he said, "The same revolutionary beliefs for which our forebears fought are still at issue around the globe — the belief that the rights of man come not from the generosity of the state but from the hand of God."

Whatever Kennedy's motives were as a politician for emphasizing this point, on the historical substance he had it absolutely correct. The Declaration of Independence issued from Philadelphia on July 4, 1776, included four separate references to God. In addition to the "endowed by their Creator" line mentioned by JFK in his July 4 speech, there is an opening salute to "the laws of nature's God," an appeal to "the Supreme Judge of the World," and a closing expression of "firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence."

A signer of the declaration, Samuel Adams, writing to a friend on July 9, wished the declaration had been issued earlier: "If it had been done nine months ago, we might have been justified in the sight of God."

George Washington, announcing the Declaration of Independence to the troops in a General Order dated July 9, wrote, "The General hopes and trusts, that every officer and man, will endeavour to live, and act, as becomes a Christian Soldier defending the dearest Rights and Liberties of his country....knowing that now the peace and safety of his Country depends (under God) solely on the success of our arms."

The theology of the country's founding has tended to get lost in the decades since Kennedy's death, to the point where if someone unveiled the document anew today, hard-core separation-of-church-and-state types might even see it as a violation of the First Amendment's clause prohibiting Congress from establishing a religion. The Declaration's concept of God-given rights certainly is not without its flaws. God, alas, tends to be quite reticent when it comes to weighing in on disagreements about the definition of rights. Some extremists invoke God's name while attempting to deprive others of rights. Atheists and agnostics, of whom there are increasing numbers these days, are left out.

For all that, there are some signs that a recovery is brewing of the theology of July 4. The Tea Party movement, after all, is not only a call for smaller government ("taxed enough already"), but also a conscious effort to recall the vision of the founders, of the original Boston Tea Party. Dave Brat, the economics professor who upset Eric Cantor in a recent Republican primary for to represent Virginia's seventh congressional district, said during his campaign, "a belief in God and the faith of our Founders leads to strong moral fiber. That's probably the most important ingredient in this country."

So, amid all the fireworks and barbecue smoke this July 4, consider pausing for a moment to reflect on the one our founding fathers called the Creator. As Kennedy realized, the American Revolution — and thus the country we live in today — started with God, and with the Founders' belief in rights that are his gift to us. Whatever your religious views, or lack of them, if you are an American, it's at least worth understanding the idea on which our nation was founded. Praying for a God-filled 4th (and beyond), Pastor David






Rev. Melvyn's Welcome Breakfast



ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT 2019



"A Future with Hope: Seeking a More Excellent Way"

"A Future with Hope: Seeking a More Excellent Way" was the theme for the 2019 S.C. Annual Conference held at the Greenville Convention Center June 2-6, 2019. Bishop Jonathan Holston preached the opening worship service on Sunday evening. He reminded us that "If we allow God to live in us that God will change the world". The evening ended with communion.

Each day, Monday – Thursday, began at 7:30 AM with a communion worship service. Later in the morning, we enjoyed the Bible study taught by Drs. Gregory and Susan Jones.

Many reports were heard during the week from different divisions of the Methodist Church.

A budget of \$16.8 million was passed for the 2020 ministry budget. The body voted to sell The Methodist Oaks in Orangeburg because of a very large financial deficit.

During the week, clergy and laity elected eight delegates each to attend both the General Conference 2020 and the Jurisdictional Conference 2020, along with two alternates.

There were thirty-six women and men licensed as local pastors in an impressive examination and licensing service. They were commissioned on Monday evening at the worship service.

Rev. Sara White preached the service of Thanksgiving and Memory recognizing thirty-two pastors and eight spouses who passed away during the past year, and seventeen surviving spouses. Rev. Bobby Waddell, our pastor here at Grace from 1994 – 1998 was remembered. He was deceased on December 13, 2018.

Bishop Holston presided over the Recognition Service for Retiring Ministers. Thirty men and women retired from our conference.

The Annual Conference held two mission initiatives. One was to collect twenty-five boxes of non-perishable food for The Harvest Hope Food Bank in Greenville and the other was to prepare Elder Baskets to be given to Native American needy seniors.

The 2020 Annual Conference will be held at the newly renovated Florence Center in Florence, SC, beginning Sunday, June 7, 2020 and going through Wednesday, June 10, 2020.

The Annual Conference 2019 ended on Thursday at about 2:00 PM after the fixing of ministerial appointments.

JUNE WAS ICP AWARENESS MONTH Intrahepatic Cholestasis of Pregnancy

As we consider our witness, we are blessed to have Allison and Brandon Gardner share their story with us. They are continuing their journey of wholeness after the loss of their son, Judd. Their tragedy has become a walk of faith that has already made a tremendous difference in many lives. As Psalm 30:5 says, "Weeping may endure for a night, but a shout of joy comes in the morning."

On Sunday, June 23, 2019, during the worship service, Grace surprised Allison and Brandon Gardner with a special show of support for their ICP awareness campaign. Brad Valentine explained the Gardner's story and then presented them with the first t-shirt showing Grace as a supporter of their cause. Grace shared a special moment with Allison, Brandon, and their families when we also surprised them with a luncheon and a show of support from donations of over \$2500 tor **#juddslegacy** to help raise awareness of ICP. Brandon and Allison Gardner had lost their unborn baby boy, Judd William Gardner, just six days before a scheduled induction to this pregnancy complication. This condition, which causes intense itching, is said to be "rare" but is actually just rare in its diagnosis. Since the loss of their son in October 2018, they have been spreading awareness of ICP to both expecting moms and to health care providers. Their ultimate goal is to bring the diagnostic bile acid lab to South Carolina by purchasing the equipment needed and Grace United Methodist Church is joining in to help by selling the t-shirts shown below for \$12.00 each with all proceeds going to **#juddslegacy**. Brandon and Allison's efforts have already saved several babies and this is just the beginning. Please help Grace U.M.C. help Brandon and Allison "Fight the Itch."
