### "What Do We Do?"

Have you ever felt like you were on top of the world, and then a moment later you find yourself falling as though the world, like a rug, was yanked out from under you? Earlier this month I had this exact feeling. Several projects have been on going at the parsonage lately with the latest one being the drainage system under the house. After completion on Friday, I was returning to the house with Mr. Simmons from Upstate Mold Remediation. He was there to spray the basement area and the house to clear out the moldy, musty, mildew smell that had filled the house from all the digging.

When we got to the parsonage, the first thing I noticed was the wide open backdoor. My hear sank because I was there the day before, and I had shut and locked everything. Entering the house, with phone in hand on speed dial to Public Safety, I noticed the glass, wood, and brick on the bedroom floor. Our chests of drawers were opened, and the contents were strewn all around. A quick assessment revealed that someone had gone through everything in the house. I immediately looked for our safe, and it was gone! I thought about its contents: cash, jewelry, keepsakes from parents, and the documents. Would we ever be able to get those things back?

As I continued to look around, I saw that the third had gone through a jewelry box. My high school and Clemson rings were still there, but a diamond tie tac was missing. There were documents on the chest that had not been bothered, but the thief stopped long enough to open a cookie tin and eat some cookies! WOW, what audacity!!! I went upstairs and in each bedroom the chests of drawers were open, things were scattered and any boxes holding valuable contents had been violated.

After calling Public Safety, I called Sherry with the sad news of the break-in. With deepened despair and discouragement, we shared our disappointment. When Public safety arrived, they began their questioning and inspecting. It was apparent that the broken window was the entry point. If we would have been home, the brick would have possibly hit Sherry as we slept! Continuing their investigation, Public Safety found where the thief had handled things, but there were no fingerprints, likely due to the use of latex gloves. The only promising clues were hair samples found in two of the bedrooms. It was clearly evident that the hair they found was NOT Sherry's or mine. At least that was a start. Public Safety finished their work. John and I put plastic and wire over the window to keep rain and any other person out. After everyone evacuated the premises, John and I could finally leave the daunting ordeal, but the shock and feeling of vulnerability remained.

Living on South Mountain Street has never given us a good warm fuzzy feeling because of the drugs, robberies, shootings, and need for constant police presence in the neighborhood. Just two weeks before, our locale witnessed a murder just across the street from the church. Another drive-by shooting ensued a couple of days later. With this break-in, we finally acknowledged our personal safety was in jeopardy. It is a difficult thing to admit that you are no longer safe in your home of eight years.

The thought, "What do we do?" filled my mind. My emotions ranged from being more than a little angry to praying for the person who broke in. In the cays and weeks since, we have revisited that situation many times, asking the many unending questions of "Why??""

Now why even bring this up? Well, it's a great reminder about how we live. Do we live for our stuff or do we live for Jesus? Matthew 6:19-20 says, <sup>19</sup> "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moths and vermin destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. <sup>20</sup> But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moths and vermin do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal." In the midst of all that has gone on, yes, we're reminded we had stored up treasures on earth to begin our new home along with family keepsakes, but even greater was the reality that the treasures in heaven outweigh any loss of "our stuff". It is freeing to experience God's promise to never leave us or forsake us, and be reminded that He will always take care of all our needs. What a great opportunity to grow and praise God for all HIS promises!

My friends, how true it is that life's events enuse us to change, but it doesn't have to change who and "Whose" we are. The reality is that Sherry and I still have our health and strength, but most of all our faith. Our God will always supply, and regardless of life's events, our future is traly in Him. Isn't it wonderful to "live and learn"? I pray that each day all of us will grow in faith, as we grow and acknowledge God's omnipotence. What a true blessing it is to fully trust that God always knows what we need...and live in His bounty! Blessings...Pastor David.







# Has The United Methodist Church always had a symbol like the cross and flame?

The official insignia of The United Methodist Church has been the <u>Cross and Flame</u> since its founding in 1968. Prior to that, the Evangelical United Brethren Church, one of our predecessors, adopted an insignia with the church name encircling clasped hands in front of a Latin cross. The symbols and seals for other predecessor denominations were generally varied in form and use.

In 1966, a commission on church union, representing The Methodist Church and The Evangelical United Brethren, was authorized to develop an official insignia. Edward J. Mikula (art director) and Edwin H. Maynard (editorial director) were appointed to develop the design.

Early on they established <u>principles for the design</u>: that it should be simple, bold, instantly recognizable, obviously Christian and uniquely Wesleyan. They determined that it should have official colors, but also be capable of reproduction in black and white.

One of their designs, the one officially adopted, was the Cross and Flame. Following more than two dozen conceptualizations, a traditional symbol of the cross was linked with a single flame with dual tongues of fire.

The resulting insignia is rich in meaning. It relates The United Methodist Church to God through Christ (cross) and the Holy Spirit (flame). The flame is a reminder of Pentecost when witnesses were unified by the power of the Holy Spirit and saw "tongues, as of fire" (Acts 2:3).

The elements of the emblem also recall a transforming moment in the life of Methodism's founder, John Wesley, when he sensed God's presence and felt his heart "strangely warmed." The two tongues can also represent the two bodies that united in 1968 to form The United Methodist Church.

The 1968 Uniting Conference adopted this design as the official insignia of the new denomination, and so it has been to this day.



- 2) Lord, please have mercy on the **parents and other caregivers** of students who face perplexing situations and schedules. - 3) Heavenly Father, help **students of all ages** in the coming days, weeks and months. Encourage those who suffer from a lack of social interaction. Empower those who need help with online learning. Encourage those with special needs. And please keep them all safe and healthy while they learn.
- 4) Lord, you know the situations faced by **teachers and tutors** at this time, some of whom must <u>enter the front lines</u>, others who must learn new ways of teaching, and still others who must cope with idleness and uncertainty. Please come to them and <u>strengthen them</u>, granting fresh ideas and miraculous effectiveness in their workplaces and work challenges.
- 5) God, hear our prayers for school system personnel facing even more challenges than usual in their lives and livelihoods: **custodial staff, cafeteria staff, bus drivers, and others.** Provide for the unemployed and underemployed. Help those who are struggling. Grant relief to those who are overworked and encouragement to those who are overwhelmed.
- 6) For all of the above, Lord, please protect and preserve them physically, emotionally and mentally. Keep them safe and healthy; <u>increase their strength</u> and stamina now and in the future, in Jesus' name, amen.


