- 5. **The Holy Spirit is still moving.** God's Spirit has not been social distancing during this pandemic. He has been drawing people to faith in Christ during these dark times. In 2020, I led am immigrant to Jesus, and he is now sharing his faith with his friends in India.
- 6. *His light shines in the darkness*. Relationships were severed this year because of strife; even families have been divided. Yet we know that when the darkness gets darker, God's light shines brighter. We can rejoice that in the midst of chaos, confusion and moral depravity, the message of the gospel will become even clearer in contrast.

2020 wasn't easy, but we will find many sweet surprises in this bitter year if we learn to rejoice in every situation.

A Message from Bishop Larry Robertson

Life can not be said to be monotonous with the same thing over and over and nothing ever changes.

Definitely not in the year 2020. We began the year with 3 separate parishes working in isolation and we are ending the year a Trinity of Parishes working together under the same leadership. We began the year realizing that none of us would be able to afford our own ministers and not sure what we would do when what little money we had runs out. We began the year wondering how we would survive and figuring nothing could get worse. Then Covid19 came along and guess what - things got worse. Well, at least 2020 was not boring - depressing maybe, but not boring!

We can see 2020 in this way and we would not be alone. Most of the world looks at 2020 as depressing, disastrous, deadly and frightening.

Or we can choose to look at 2020 through different eyes, the eyes of faith. Although God did not cause these disasters, he also did not abandon us to them. Although at times, it seems that we are alone and that Covid19 seems to constantly bring us down, we know that God walks with us through these trying times and that we are never alone.

We can choose to believe that though problems still exist, God who loves us will not only just hold us up, but will use the circumstances around us to make us stronger. We can despair that we are so weak that we have to join others to survive, or we can realize that together we are stronger, together we have more resources, together we can serve God and each other better. As we mark the end of the 2020, it marvels me of all the things we have experienced in the past year. I normally enjoy looking back and see all the changes whether they be good or bad: Who got married, who had babies, who stuck to their diets, who changed careers, etc...? I remember recalling at the beginning of 2020 this feeling that this year was going to be a year of changes. Never could I have imagined the understatement of those words/feelings. I recall feeling this urge to start sifting through my belonging and creating three piles. The items I wanted to keep, the items that were to be given away (because I never sell anything), and items that were for the trash. I knew a change was coming but what it exactly looked like was hidden from my sight. By the time we arrived at the month of March, I really began to wonder if I was simply conjuring up my imagination of change. COVID-19 came in and changed the landscape of everything we did. I could never imagine that we would not be allowed to go to church; not allowed to have services, not allowed to share a meal together, not to give someone a hug, or sit with a friend as they grieved the loss of a love one. Never mind moving to a new community and beginning a new chapter in ministry. Nope, not Me!!! Oh my, that was a lot of negative words strung together.

On a positive note, we as a human species have learned how to adapt to our new reality rather quickly. If we wanted to carry on being the body of Christ in a dark world, we needed to put aside our bewilderment and find a new way forward. And oh, how we did! This has always been the way of God's people. Zoom and Facebook media streaming became our new way forward. Much to our dislikement, we are sometimes forced down a pathway of the unknown. Following in the footpath of Mary and Joseph who escaped with the Christ Child to save his life, or like the first disciples escaping with their lives after the Resurrection. They were forced to leave their comfort zone to find a place to worship Christ in freedom and peace. Ironically, the Gospel message went with them and so the gospel was spread wider and farther than anyone could hope for.

See, I passionately believe that we are creatures of habit. We typically do not want to be pushed out into the great unknown. I am thankful that God called me here to walk alongside you, to lead you, to encourage you, and to lift your heads up to see His glory. I am thankful that my family and friends are safe from the Covid virus and I will continue to pray that they remain so. I have been saying it right from the beginning of 2020 that God has something amazing in store for His church and we get to see what He is doing.

If I could sum up the year if 2020, I would have to say this is the year of irony! What was meant for evil God is bringing out the value of life. We are putting our family and friends above our own needs. When we see someone, we get excited. We are truly and earnestly praying for the safety and welfare of all people. We are being the Church! For all these things, I am Thankful.

So, what will this next New Year 2021 bring? Will we continue as much the same as last year? We will have to wait and see. I do hope and pray that the things we have learned will be carried forward and that the Church will rise and make a difference. We will have to come to the end of 2021 and look back much like we are now.
