The Origins of Flag Day



That the flag of the United States shall Be of thirteen stripes of alternate red and white, with a union of thirteen stars of white in a blue field, representing the new constellation.

This was the resolution adopted by the Continental Congress on June 14, 1777. This resolution was adopted following a report of a special committee which was assigned the task of designing a flag.

Observance of the adoption of the flag was not soon in coming. Even though a flag of this design was carried into battle September 11, 1777 most claims to the first official observance of Flag Day took place more than a century after the design was adopted in 1777.

In 1897 the governor of New York ordered the displaying of the flag over all public buildings in the state. It soon caught on.

Flag Day has a nation wide observance, but to this day Pennsylvania is the only state to recognize Flag Day as a legal holiday.

Both President Wilson, in 1916 and President Coolidge, in 1927 issued proclamations asking for June 14 to be observed as National Flag Day. August 3, 1949 Congress finally approved the national observance, and President Harry Truman signed it into law.
