Liturgist: We wait in the darkness, expectantly, longingly, anxiously, thoughtfully.

speaking still.

Liturgist: Sometimes in the solitude of the darkness our fears and concerns, our

hopes and visions rise to the surface.

People: We come face to face with ourselves and with the road that lies ahead

of us. And in that same darkness we find companionship for the

journey.

Liturgist: In that same darkness we sometimes allow ourselves to wonder and

worry whether the human race is going to survive. And then, in the darkness we know that you are with us, O God, yet still we await your

oming.

People: In the darkness that contains both our hopelessness and our hope, we

watch for a sign of God's hope. For you are with us, O God, in darkness

and in light.

Invitation to Confession

Liturgist: In this season of Advent, we are reminded of God's love for us, shown in the impossible act of God becoming incarnate, taking on human flesh, to reach us in love and remind us of how to live together with peace. This is the God to whom we pray, to whom we make our confession. Let us then come to God with the truth of our lives, first in silent prayer. (A chime calls us to a moment of silence.)

Prayer of Confession

People:

We need your peace, Jesus. We confess that our hearts are too often filled with wonder of a different kind: wondering when the bills will be paid, when the terror will stop, when rest will come. Will it ever? Is the message still true? In a world where worry, not peace, prevails, stir up that good news again. Never have we needed your joy and peace more than now. You've promised rest for the weary, victory for the battle-scarred fighters for justice, peace for the anxious, and acceptance for the broken hearted—not just at Advent, but every day of every year. Your name is still called "Wonderful," "Counselor," "The Mighty God," and "The Prince of Peace." We know that peace on earth can only come when hearts find peace with you. Be our joy. Be our peace, this Christmas and always. Amen.
