Invitation to Confession

Liturgist: Lent developed into a season of intense inward reflection and confession centuries after the life of Jesus. Yet, as we will see, Jesus encouraged people to open up about their lives – to speak truth – no matter how broken. The Latin origins of the word "confess" is to "study and acknowledge." This is the beginning of compassion for ourselves and others. It is the beginning of healing. This will be a season of studying how we can be a healing presence in our community. We begin with a moment of silence to pause and reflect. (A chime calls us to a moment of silence.)

Prayer of Confession

People: God of All, you created us for each other. You set in us a yearning for companionship and an empathy that binds us together, protecting each other and delighting in one another. Yet too often we have broken down our relationships instead of building them up. We have been set against one another with the lie of

scarcity. We have built systems and economies that widen the gap of resources rather than safeguarding equitable practices. Too many, and growing numbers, are suffering hardship, food insecurity, joblessness. We cannot fathom the proportions of loss and so we look away, sometimes even from the need in our own community. Help us, Healer. Show us our empathy. Forgive our complacence. Move us one step at a time toward greater care for one another. Amen.

Words of Assurance

Liturgist: God's love and grace surround you this Lenten season and always. You are a precious and holy vessel right now, broken and yet made whole. God's abundance, acceptance, and redemption is meant for all people. No matter what. We are capable of sharing our light and not running out of "enough." Christ's hospitality that broke through false boundaries points the way. For you, for me, for all. Take a deep breath in to let this truth fill you: You are enough and you have enough. Breathe out with the relief of assurance.

Doing Justice

When we advocate for just laws or lift our voices in matters of policies which are unjust, we are following the Micah 6:8 directive to "Do justice." The Potomac Association's Justice and Witness Network has been encouraging members of UCC congregations in our association to become involved in advocating for bills related to justice at all levels of government. For example, there are bills related to police reform currently being reviewed in the Maryland General Assembly. If you would like to learn more about the bills being considered at the federal or state level and would like to be notified when writing to your representative or senator about these bills would be helpful in bringing about justice, you may indicate your interest in one of two ways by March 8:

Once you indicate your desire to learn more about how you might lend your voice for justice, you will receive periodic emails about bills and actions you might take. Your first email will be a summary of the current bills related to police reform at the state level. When the call goes out to contact your officials, you will receive an email with a sample letter which may be adapted for your signature. Of course, the choice to respond is optional. At UCCSV, this effort is being shepherded by our Social Action Board and emails will be sent from either Dan Davis or Suzanne Schmidt who serve as our Social Action Board co-chairs.

Love Mercy During Lent Campaign: Opportunity One Fox Chapel Elementary School (FCES)

Our church is a faith community partner in the Linkages to Learning (L to L) Program at Fox Chapel Elementary School. This program assists students and their families by providing or connecting them to services and resources that address the social, economic, health, and emotional issues that may interfere with student success. You may remember that in 2020 our church provided 5 Thanksgiving baskets and Christmas gifts for 5 families which are part of the L to L Program at FCES. Food insecurity is a major issue for the families in this program. Not only is food in short supply but healthy food is an exceptionally serious issue. Rodolfo Nogales, the Community School Coordinator for L to L at FCES is working with the University of

Maryland's Extension program to offer 5 classes via zoom focused on healthy recipes for the students' mothers. Linkages is providing the food for the first and last sessions. Our church is providing the needed items for the second and fourth classes. Mother Seton Parish is providing food for the third class. Twenty mothers have signed up for the classes which will be taught by a nutritionist who is bi-lingual. The food which we will provide for two sessions costs \$10 per person. Donations will be used to purchase the food which will be delivered directly to the school. The Love Mercy During Lent at Fox Chapel Elementary School campaign will run from February 17-March 7. Details about the other two opportunities will be featured in future newsletters.
