Invitation to Confession

Liturgist: To come before God with the truth of our lives is itself an act of faith: we trust that the Holy One is interested in us, interested in our minds and hearts and souls. We trust that God's mercy and grace are intended for us, too. With faith and in trust, let us make our confession to God, first in silent prayer. (A chime calls us to a moment of silence.)

People: Here we are. We will come.

Words of Remembrance

Pastor: Jesus of Nazareth came to the lakeshore, borrowed a boat and reached out to people by offering words to remember and food to eat. The words called them to follow and the food was from deep places.

Jesus comes still to stormy waters and food deserts, to borrow the leaky rowboat (that we wish was more like a cruise ship) that we call the church, and use it to offer words that change human lives, and sustenance that saves them.

We remember that Jesus knew.

when it was the last Passover, that only a few words were needed, and the simplest meal prepared...

Those of you watching from home I invite you to mimic my actions with your bread and cup holding them up when I do and breaking the bread as I do.

On the night on which Jesus gave himself up for love and justice, he sat at supper with his disciples. While they were eating, he took a piece of bread. Jesus said a blessing broke it, and gave it to them with the words, 'This is my body. Given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.'

Later, he took a cup of wine, and gave thanks for it. Jesus said, 'This cup is God's forgiveness poured out for you and for all people. Drink from it, all of you, to remember me'.

Pastor: Holy God, bless these elements, no matter what they are or where we are enjoying them. May the Spirit imbue them with what we need to continue to practice faith, hope, and love and share such things with the world around us. In our eating of the bread remind us that we are together one body in Christ with many different and yet crucial parts. In our drinking of the cup remind us of the many gifts you have poured out on us and your hopes that we will use those gifts in service to you, the church, and all of creation. May this meal remind us who we are and whose we are. Always. Amen.

Sharing the Bread and Cup

(At this time you are invited to serve yourself or those with you the bread saying something like, "The Body of Christ given for you" or "The Bread of Life given for you". You can dip the bread in the cup saying something like, "The Cup of Salvation shared with you" or "The Cup of Blessing shared with you." We will pause here for a few moments so everyone has a chance to receive the elements.)

Prayer of Thanksgiving

People: Holy God, we give thanks for this meal that feeds and empower us to go forth into the world. We go forth, celebrating faith. We go forth, celebrating hope. We go forth, celebrating love. We go forth to be the transformed people that you call us to be. We go forth to be the Body of Christ. We go forth from your table in gratitude and with love. Amen.
