Lutherans for Life - April

Lutherans for Life began in 1976 when a group of people met to

Lutherans

explore common concerns about human life issues. The pan
Lutheran group was officially incorporated in 1979. Its mission is to

equip Lutherans to be gospel-motivated voices for upholding the

sanctity of human life as all people are created by God in His image.

Lutherans for Life believe that the church is compelled by God's Word to speak and act on behalf of those who are vulnerable and defenseless. The ministry calls for compassionate action and to foster life- affirming alternatives for those facing difficult situations. The grassroots organization desires to help others live out their faith according to God's will and seeks to share Jesus through teaching, caring and serving. The ministry has a network of chapters and state affiliates and has an array of educational resources.



<u>Adult and Teen Challenge - May</u>

Pennsylvania Adult & Teen Challenge is a faith-based ministry that specializes in support for those recovering from substance abuse issues. The faith-based recovery

program is committed to rekindling hope, renewing life and restoring families by reaching out to people struggling with drug/alcohol addiction and withdrawal.

There are short-term and long-term programs for comprehensive addiction treatment. A holistic approach features aspects of health including biological, psychological, sociological and spiritual components. The ministry is nationally accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF).

The ministry was started in 1958 when Rev. David Wilkerson traveled to New York City to intercede in a court case involving gang members. It turned into an opportunity to share the gospel message. Teen Challenge was created as a ministry reaching out to gangs and people trapped in addictive lifestyles.

There are ministry centers for adults and teenagers throughout the United States and overseas. There is a residential center in Cheswick. The national office is located in Springfield, MO.

Lenten Commitment

Hurricane Relief Campaign Ends

The seven-month hurricane relief campaign ended Easter Sunday with hope instilled in many Hurricane Harvey victims as St. Luke's members carried out God's work and shared His love with servant hearts and giving hands.

The drive started in September with Rally Day, two fall festivals, supplies and materials collected in November, educational activities, direct donations, Souper Bowl and Lenten coin boxes, and two handson mission trips in January and March. Funds raised went toward providing direct relief to victims of the hurricanes through NALC Disaster Relief.

Materials and cleaning supplies were collected and then taken to the NALC Mission District meeting in November for direct transport to the affected region. Boots were on the ground twice with St. Luke's direct involvement. Hurricane relief was given by an 11-member mission team from the Mid-Northeast Mission District of the NALC. People from three states, including Pastor Keller and David McRandal, went to an area outside Rosenberg Texas in late January. The mission was led by Peace Lutheran Church of Rosenberg. A Disaster Relief Center is located on the campus and a parsonage was used to host groups. In March, church council authorized disaster relief funds for a five-member

the team included college students Micah Keller, Trace Trempus, Bill Sweeney and Isaac Harbison.

Their experiences were shared in sermons and personal testimony during worship services and in the Angel. Photos of the mission trip can be found on stlks.com. Thank you letters from Michael and Pat Diltrich, the Rosenberg NALC coordinators, can be found on page 3 of this newsletter. The letters were written on behalf of the families who were served during those weeks.

Domestic Disaster Relief (DDR) funds and hurricane relief funds were put to good use in the NALC Disaster relief efforts. The Domestic Disaster Relief ministry has existed for more than five years. Donated funds have been given directly to areas that are affected by disasters. DDR has been supported by direct donations and by St. Luke's monthly benevolence. DDR is not on the 2018 benevolence list. At this time, there is less than \$100 remaining in the account. Please consider helping us raise additional funds to assist in future disaster efforts. Checks may be made out to St. Luke's and put Domestic Disaster Relief on the memo line.



June 3, 2018 is Confirmation Sunday for:

Krystle Ann Ekas Baptized January 22, 2012

Adre Jean Anderson Baptized April 12, 2016

Confirmation at St. Luke's is a public profession of faith prepared for by a two-year careful instruction during the Sunday School hour. Confirmation, or the student's "affirmation of baptism," is a mature and public reaffirmation of the faith which "marks the completion of the congregation's program of confirmation ministry."

Students reaching this Christian milestone are presented with a necklace of a Sterling silver Luther Rose as an emblem of their Christian faith. The Luther Seal or Rose is a widely recognized symbol for Lutheranism. The seal that was designed for Martin Luther was seen as an expression of his theology and faith and is made up of 5 parts. First, there is a black cross in the middle of a red heart. This reminds us that we believe with our heart that Jesus loves us! Even though there is a black

cross on the heart and we know that Jesus died on a cross for us, the heart stays colorful and alive. God is the creator and care-taker of all life. The heart lies on a white rose like a soft blanket reminding us that our faith gives us joy, peace and comfort. The rose should be white because white is the color of angels. Blue is the color of the sky and reminds us of heaven. It is also the color of hope, all the wonderful things God has promised us. The Gold Ring represents one of the most precious metals in all the earth. God loves each one of us as if we were the most precious thing in all the world. When we look at the ring there is no beginning or end to it just like God's love for the world that will last forever and never end.

The students are also presented with red boutonnieres to be worn to celebrate the Spirit and remind them of the blood of Christ shed for them.

After confirmation, these students move on to the Senior High Sunday School program and become voting members of the congregation.

A luncheon will be served during the Social Hour following the worship service with family and congregation invited. Please sign up in the narthex.

Ark Encounter and Creation Museum

Also Tour of Cincinnati and the Newport Aquarium

This tour also includes a Riverboat Dinner Cruise on the Ohio River. Lodging will be in a hotel along the boardwalk in Newport on the Levee. It will be a quick visit to the Cincinnati and Northern Kentucky area.

The Ark Encounter is a "one of a kind" historically themed timber-framed attraction in the world. It was built to the specifications as God gave them to Noah and recorded in the Bible. The building is 510 feet long, 85 feet wide and 51 feet high. It stretches more than one and a half football fields in length and taller than a four-story house. It took several years to construct and was dedicated July 6, 2016. The Ark is really three exhibits in one. Three decks are full of state-of-the-art exhibits that will amaze and inspire you to think differently about the biblical account of Noah's Ark. You will want to go back another time to see more.

The Creation Museum, another state-of-the-art structure, a sister exhibit to the Ark, is located near the Cincinnati Airport at Petersburg, KY. This will be a self-guided tour to venture through biblical history, stunning exhibits, botanical gardens, planetarium, life-size animatronics and other striking displays. Travel back to creation and witness God's redemptive plan throughout history. There are many things to do while there. Perhaps you will be lucky enough to have time to attend a special featured presentation.

In addition to visiting the Ark Encounter and the Creation Museum, you will get acquainted with the Cincinnati and northern Kentucky areas with a "See the Sights" Step-on Guided Tour. This will include a stop at the Robert Dafford murals. You will check-in at the Comfort Suites Riverfront in Newport for a two-night stay. After checking in at your hotel, it will be time to relax on a boat with Victorian décor and romantic Riverboat-era charm. It will be a 2 ½ hour BB Riverboat Dinner Cruise down the Ohio River.

Wednesday morning, before leaving Newport for home, you will stop at the world famous Newport Aquarium where thousands of animals from around the world are showcased in a million gallons of water. A stringray touch pool opened in May 2017. You can have an up-close experience with sharks, walk across the Shark Bridge, and get a glimpse of shark ray pups.
