Our meditation on the Psalms this week must center on the theme of THANKSGIVING. It is, after all, the week of our national Thanksgiving celebration. This year, for reasons which no one is unaware, our celebration will be muted. But that is no reason that our giving of thanks should be muted. Even in the midst of a pandemic, and not minimizing the loss and suffering that it has caused, we still have much to be thankful.

By its very nature, our national Thanksgiving is as appropriate in hard times as well as good times. The Plymouth Rock pilgrims, who serve as models for our Thanksgiving celebration, certainly had no ease or worldly comforts for which to give thanks. They were giving thanks for being able to adapt to new and hard realities. They were willing to endure these for the sake of religious freedom. They were giving thanks because they could, without political persecution, follow their own consciences. They were giving thanks because they could live with strange (to each other) indigenous neighbors in peace and cooperation.

To this end, I wanted to use a psalm focused on Thanksgiving for our meditation, but I ran up against a problem that I have mentioned to you before. Some psalms are short and fit well into my little text box. But some are long, even quite long, and do not fit. I have already used most of the short psalms. So I could not find a short thanksgiving psalm which I have not already used. So I picked perhaps the best example of a thanksgiving psalm and shortened it by taking out verses 10-22. As I have said before when shortening a psalm has been necessary, this does not mean that the excluded verses are not valuable and I encourage you to look up the psalm and read it in its entirety. In this psalm, God's people praise and give thanks for the goodness of God. *Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good. His love endures forever.* That refrain, His love endures forever, is part of every single verse. God's goodness reverberates throughout His creation. *Give thanks to the Lord of lords: His love endures forever. To him who alone*



does great wonders, His love endures forever. Who by his understanding made the heavens, His love endures forever. God's grace touches us through His loving providence. He remembered us in our low estate, His love endures forever. And freed us from our enemies. His love endures forever. He gives food to every creature. His love endures forever.

Give thanks to the God of heaven.

I hope you have a truly happy and sincere Thanksgiving celebration. I hope that even if it may not be the feast you would have it to be, you and the ones you love will be joyful, safe and truly thankful. HAPPY THANKSGIVING!
