"What message does my Lord have for his servant?" Joshua 5:14

I have been asking our Heavenly Father what he would have me share with you. My monkey mind has been swinging in all directions. When we wake on November 4, either Joe Biden will be the new president, Donald Trump will still be the president, or the results of the election will be unclear and emotions will be running high all over the country. I've been pondering the uncertainty, anger, fear, and potential division that we all might be facing after the election. Finally, Holy Spirit nudged me and gave me a very clear message to pass on to you. There is something so much more relevant and important to the election. And that is how we respond to the outcome, regardless of who wins. As followers of Christ, we must keep the big picture in mind in order to face the future with confidence. I am reminded of Joshua 5:13-15:

Now when Joshua was near Jericho, he looked up and saw a man standing in front of him with a drawn sword in his hand. Joshua went up to him and asked, "Are you for us or for our enemies?" "Neither," he replied, "but as commander of the army of the Lord I have now come." Then Joshua fell facedown to the ground in reverence and asked him, "What message does my Lord have for his servant?" The commander of the Lord's army replied, "Take off your sandals, for the place where you are standing is holy." And Joshua did so. — Joshua 5:13-15 NIV

So, God's agenda and purposes doesn't seem to depend on the outcome of the United States Presidential election. The commander of the Lord's army suggests that **our first priority is personal submission to Almighty God, and worshiping God reverently.** I think God has this, no matter what the outcome.

We may feel like the sky is falling with the pandemic, heightened racism, and the election. But, **God is sovereign**. We are reminded that God puts down one and exalts another, Psalm 75:7. As we look back over the history of the world, God uses all kinds of leaders with all kinds of backgrounds to fulfill His sovereign purposes in the world. God uses faithful followers like Gideon, Deborah, and Moses as well as pagan leaders like Darius and Nebuchadnezzar.

The isolation over the past seven months can leave us feeling abandoned, disappointed, even hopeless. I found depression pushing in on me towards the end of the summer. But, I am reminded that **trials are inevitable in our lives**. "Indeed, all who desire to live godly in Christ Jesus will be persecuted." 2 Timothy 3:12 NASB. We are living in a post-Christian nation and we just have to adjust our expectations and mission from the Lord accordingly.

Finally, and this is the most important part, God wants us to remember that **His people are THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD!** Light brings life, healing, love, and holiness. Light prays for those who persecute them, loves their enemies, and does good deeds of kindness to all people so they will glorify their Father in heaven. Light shines brightest in the darkness and crisis and difficulties are not only times of chaos, but also of great opportunity.

Let our light shine boldly as we practically face the future with confidence. We were chosen for a time like this to make a difference – to be the salt, the light, and the love of God manifested in everyday life. We cannot control what has or will happen in our country, or our circumstances – but, we can control how we respond! James 1:2-4 says, "Consider it all joy, my brethren, when you encounter various trials, knowing that the testing of your faith produces endurance. And let endurance have its perfect result, so that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing."

I am deeply humbled by your prayers and extraordinary financial support that has allowed us to respond to the needs of people here and around the world facing significant challenges.

All Hallows Eve- The Cleansing of the Earth for All Hallows Day

Celtic folk custom, from as far back as the 9^{th} century, consisting of mostly Irish, Scottish and Welch peoples, celebrated All Hallows Eve on October 31^{st} . This was the last day of the Celtic calendar year. They believed the doors between the world of the dead and the world of the living opened and all the spirits of those who had died the past year would travel from their resting place on Earth to their final resting place in the next world. The Celts put food and drink out for the spirits to refresh and encourage them on their journey.

The living wore disguises to conceal their identity from any troublesome spirits and went to visit friends and relatives with treats to celebrate the fall harvest and new year to come November 1st. They carved lanterns made from rutabagas, turnips and potatoes. They hollowed out the vegetables, carved scary faces and placed a candle inside to scare away evil spirits. Their intent was to scare away evil spirits so as to cleanse the Earth of their presence so the saintly spirits could have safe passage on All Hallows Day- their New Year's Day.

As Christianity moved into the Celtic lands the beliefs and customs of the two groups were melded together. When Irish immigrants came to America they brought their traditions with them and All Hallows Eve was shortened to Halloween. It was celebrated by the nation as a harvest festival with hay rides, taffy pulls and corn popping parties and costumes.

Trick or Treat with candy treats became popular in America in the 1950s by the Baby Boomer generation. It provided a way to visit many neighbors in a single evening and an economical and fun way to share with the growing number of children. Vandalism had risen and law enforcement discovered giving treats cut down the number of "tricks" hence the chant "Trick or Treat". Pumpkins grow in abundance and are one of America's oldest known vegetables replacing the Irish rutabaga for All Hallows Eve lanterns.

In summary- All Hallows Eve (Halloween) was a Celtic religious event being thankful for the harvest and sharing the bounty with their community. They cleansed the Earth through their religious rite for those who'd passed in the last year in preparation and remembrance of them on All Hallows Day- now known as All Saints Day. As Christianity was introduced throughout the Celtic culture, they blended the customs of both beliefs uniting God's people.
