**Pastor's Thursday Morning
Study Group at 10 am**

We are reminded of God's direction, given in **Deuteronomy 6:5-7**: ⁵ *You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might.* ⁶ *Keep these words that I am commanding you today in your heart.* ⁷ *Recite them to your children and talk about them when you are at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you rise.*

It is the responsibility of the parents to bring their kids up in the faith. And it is our mutual responsibility as "the church" to help with that by our encouragement and our contribution of our time and talents (good steward-ship!). We also pass on our faith more effectively when we are willing to be flexible to try new things and new ways that can help connect with new generations and folks that didn't "grow up in the church" or have grown up in a different world with different challenges. How do we give them the faith, but also give them the freedom to make this faith "theirs" – a living faith that speaks to them, and their generation? That's a very different kind of gift - a willingness to be a bit uncomfortable, so that someone else might see and hear and experience the Gospel. But God's promise, even then, is true and wonderful: in their growth, we are blessed!

We Are Part of a bigger Church – Lutheran Disaster Response

Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) is dedicated to providing emergency and long term assistance to communities that suffer many different forms of disaster. LDR is highly rated and respected worldwide, and known for "being there after everyone else is gone".

In 2016, LDR

Received \$6.5 million – \$3.1million from individuals, \$2.7million from synods and congregations and \$650,000 in grants. Of that, \$2.9million was spent for international assistance, \$2.1 million within the United States and \$274,256 for administration and communications.

Highlights: Worldwide, LDR provided assistance in Asia (earthquakes, disaster prep, flooding, food security), Africa (conflict areas, drought, Ebola, migration), Middle East & Europe (conflict zones, earthquake, flooding, migration), Central America (drought, hurricane, migrants) and in the US for preparedness training, severe storms, hurricane Sandy, flooding, tornados, migrant minors and wildfires. A map in the Fellowship Building hallway shows more details and many projects.

Walking in Faith - Martin Luther's Quiet Time (Part 7 - Conclusion)

We continue our series of Martin Luther notes about prayer, written up by the late Walter Trobisch in his little volume "Martin Luther's Quiet Time" (1975). The text is based on a letter Martin Luther wrote, to his barber Peter Beskendorf, who had asked him "How do you pray?" We present it, reprinted with permission, as 7-part serial feature. *Pastor Scott*

In Part 1 Martin humbly mentions that he can only share how he himself prays, and that dedication and concentration are important - in prayer, as in being a good barber. In Part 2 Martin shared about the importance of praying first thing in morning, last at evening, and realizing we're fooling ourselves when we think that anything else is "more important" In Part 3 Luther walked through how he prays through the commandments. Part 4 Luther says "do the same thing with the Lord's Prayer" - walk through it - and the Apostles Creed, step by step. Part 5 has Luther explaining how his prayers often depart from that structure and become a time of listening to God. Part 6 expands upon prayerful Bible study - thinking and directing the soul toward the text, not just reading quickly with the mind. What questions does it raise? Lastly, in Part 7, Luther recommends having pen and paper handy, and writing down "God's word" to us that comes in prayer. It makes that word incarnate, real, solid, and more than a memory. Part 7

From Luther's testimony in this letter, it is evident that he believed firmly that God would speak to him through his thoughts, when the "heart is warmed up" and "has come to itself in the atmosphere of the commandments, the Lord's Prayer and the Apostles' Creed." "The Spirit will and must grant this and will go on teaching in your heart if it is conformed to God's Word and freed from foreign concerns and thoughts."

However, he gives a practical advice to his friend which should not be forgotten. He tells Master Peter to have his quiet time with pen and paper at hand to note down what God tells him:

I repeat again what I said above when I talked to you about the Lord's Prayer: If the Holy Spirit should come when these thoughts are in your mind and begin to preach to your heart, giving you rich and enlightened thoughts, then give Him the honor, let your preconceived ideas go, be quiet and listen to Him who can talk better than you; and note what He proclaims and write it down, so will you experience miracles as David says: "Open my eyes that I may behold wondrous things out of thy law" (Ps. 119:18).

Indeed, those who get used to the discipline of having their quiet time with a notebook are not likely to ever give it up. What makes our devotional life so unattractive and boring is the fact that each day, every one of us has just about the same kind of general vague pious thoughts. This causes monotony. Our thoughts remain distant and abstract and do not come to grips with our concrete daily life. The writing down, as Luther suggests, is a form of the incarnation of God's Word. It becomes tangible, visible and concrete. It forces us to be precise, definite and particular. Monotony is replaced by variety and surprise. Taking notes enables us also to check whether we have carried out what we planned in the morning. A Chinese proverb says, "The palest ink is stronger than the strongest memory."

Writing down what God has told us is also a great help in sharing when meeting with our prayer partner - also for decision-making in marriage. My wife and I agree on the same text for daily Bible study. This is especially helpful in periods when we are separated. When we meet again we can read to each other what we have written down in our quiet times - and experience "wondrous things."



Prayer Labyrinth – Last Couple of Weeks!

Slow down for a spiritual stroll in our "temporary" prayer labyrinth in the front yard. The painted path will fade away soon.

You can't get lost – but you might find the Spirit speaking along the path.

Walk – slowly – and pray along the way. The Efche/Jesus Prayer, Lord's Prayer, a favorite scripture, whatever you choose. Speak to God. And Listen. Labyrinth prayer guides are in the narthex.

Walking in Faith - Martin Luther's Quiet Time

It may take a little practice. Just as in preparing for a sports event, a warming-up is necessary in order to do one's best, so also is a "warming-up training" of the heart indispensable for our spiritual life. Martin Luther uses precisely these terms. It takes training and practice to discern our own ideas from God's thoughts. When you open the faucet in a new building, brownish liquid may come out at first. But if you have patience and let it run long enough, clear water will appear.

We can experience the same thing in our quiet time. If our praying changes from talking into being silent and our being silent changes into listening, the voice of the Good Shepherd will come through unequivocally, unambiguously and plainly.

The Spirit will and must grant this, if your heart is conformed to God's Word.

Prayer & Spiritual Direction – 1st Wednesdays at 2 pm

Do you have a desire, or possible interest, in learning more about prayer and the art of listening for God's voice? Exploring many different kinds and styles of prayer, and what might work best for you? Perhaps a desire to intentionally discuss and work to discern God's working in your life, and how you might make yourself more open to the Holy Spirit? It's not praying the whole time like a vigil – but more about exploring, together, this life of prayer and following Christ.

Join Pastor Scott on first Wednesdays of the month, at 2 pm.

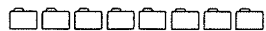
Reformation Movie, Meal & Mixer
