## Pastor's Message The promised Land

One of my favorite vignettes in the tale of the Exodus from Egypt is when the Hebrews longed for "the flesh-pots of Egypt". The Israelites said to them, "If only we had died by the Lord's hand in Egypt! There we sat

around pots of meat and ate all the food we wanted, but you have brought us out into this desert to starve this entire assembly to death." (Exodus 16:3)

What is it about us humans that we tend to complain about things more than celebrate? Here are God's people - freed from slavery and oppression - on their way to the land promised to them by YHWH\* and they are grumbling about not having meat to eat and looking back longingly at their time of slavery!



Thanksgiving day is late this year, November 28<sup>th</sup>. But I encourage you to get an early start on it. The original Thanksgiving day was first suggested as a day to complain to God. Those early settlers had a lot to complain about. Only about half of those who arrived survived the first winter. They did not know how to grow crops. With the help of the local Native Americans, they did manage to bring in a meager harvest. That led to the three day celebration that became "Thanksgiving Day".

We live in one of the affluent and secure countries in the world in a time when food is abundant. We have safe homes, central heating, more clothes than will fit in our closets, etc., etc. There is so much to be thankful for! And that is not even mentioning our gratitude to God for our very lives in Christ and our place in God's family.

Psychologists and their studies have shown that an attitude of gratitude improves both our psychological and physical health.

So take some time every day to keep a "gratitude journal". Those experts who seem to know a lot about everything recommend listing five things each day that we are grateful for.

As January 1<sup>st</sup> approaches, I can tell you that you all are very high on my list. It has been, and will be for the next two months, an honor and a privilege to be in ministry among you.

#### Advent Season - A Time for Giving

A friend of mine, who works for the Mexico, NY Food Pantry, sent me an interesting article about using the Advent Calendar to supply a box of food to give to food pantries, who will then give the food out to those in need, during the holiday season.

Each day, from December 1 to December 24, people can add an item to a box. Then on Christmas Eve or shortly after, the box(es) would be donated to the Food Pantry. I plan on having several boxes lined up in the back of the sanctuary starting on December 1<sup>st</sup>. The list will be available at the back of the church starting November 17<sup>th</sup>. Each box will be labeled by date(s) and what should be donated. Now, I am fully aware that you (the congregation) cannot come to church every day to donate whatever is on that day, but you can put them in the box(es) on Sunday. Now, you are not limited to the number of items you want to give. Let's say on Dec. 3<sup>rd</sup> – the item is stuffing mix, you can bring x number of boxes if you want OR donate 3 boxes of stuffing mix and maybe 3 cans of spaghetti sauce, which the is Dec. 18<sup>th</sup> food item.
