General Conference Update

The United Methodist Church as a global body has once again postponed the General Conference (GC) originally scheduled for May of 2020 to August 29th - September 6, 2022. The General Conference is the only body that speaks on behalf of the United Methodist Church. We are raising this GC up for your thoughts and prayers now for several reasons.

First, should the GC meet in 2022, the GC will be considering several potential pieces of legislation about a potential schism within the United Methodist Church. One plan, "A Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace through Separation" has such support from a number of major leaders within several caucuses of the church (the Council of Bishops, "Progressives," Traditionalists," etc.) that many people believe it will pass through the General Conference. This Protocol was created through a mediation process that included representatives and voices from nearly every corner of church life. We want you to be aware that this legislation exists and may affect our church globally.

Second, as a result of the existence of this Protocol, the Conference is surveying both Pastors and Lay Leaders about their intentions should this Protocol pass through General Conference for the purpose of planning. Neither our Lay Leader Judi Eastburn nor any other part of our church is entering into a binding agreement through filling out this survey. On my end, I plan to answer that I do not know what I will do until I see the result of the General Conference. To put it colloquially, I have every intention of looking before I leap. I encourage everyone, including our Lay Leader, to look before they leap in such matters!

There are a few worries this Protocol may raise, so let me attempt to put those to rest:

- 1) The Protocol understands that each church has a "trust clause" on both the physical property and the financial resources. The trust clause is a Methodist clause dating back to John Wesley which states that all property reverts to the ownership of the greater church if a local church ceases to function as a Methodist ministry. If we were to cease being a United Methodist Church tomorrow without good reason, our church property could be transferred into the ownership of the United Methodist Church as a result of the agreements willingly entered into by this church when it became a United Methodist congregation.
- 2) The Protocol would suspend the trust clause for churches leaving the United Methodist Church to join with one of the new denominations forming after the Protocol is approved. In other words, if our church cannot abide by the resulting United Methodist Church or the decision of the Annual Conference to align with one of the new denominations, then we are welcome to join with one of the other denominations splintering from the United Methodist Church while retaining our property, although the trust clause may end up transferring to the new denomination.
- 3) The amount of time in the initial Protocol for a church to make such a decision was set for over a year and a half from the original proposed date. The makers of the Protocol did not want churches to feel forced into quick decisions and we will likely have what feels like too much time to discuss and pray over our options.

Just the facts: 1) Nothing has been approved yet; 2) Nobody is attempting to take the church or church funds away; 3) We will have time to pray and come to a decision when and if a decision must be made.



We are so blessed to have each other in this big, warm, caring, church family! Life hands out lots of hard things, but somehow this congregation always manages to support each other in a most compassionate way.

I just want to thank everyone who offered ongoing prayers as my brother Bob faced a terminal diagnosis, as I and my family supported him through his illness, and then helped him to have a peaceful departure. The understanding of the Church Council as my plans frequently changed, and the stack of cards I came home to upon my return from Florida was overwhelming and healing. I often say, "THESE PEOPLE! They are amazing and wonderful." I am so lucky to have you all in my life.

Being a non-Tburger (we live on South Hill in Ithaca), most of what I know about each of your lives comes from the "joys and concerns" portion of our service. This is what I miss most about our current hybrid service and the Covid necessity of not "passing the mike." It helps me to remember those of you who have asked for prayers when I know a bit of the story, be it happy, scary or sad.

I would like to share a prayer concern for two young men that "belong" to two women I work with.

Johnny is the son of a nurse friend who previously worked at the medical center. He is in his 20s and has an extremely rare tissue cancer (less than 100 in the world) that is nearly always fatal. He has since moved from the Pacific Northwest to Florida where his family is located. He has had some experimental treatments and is stable at the moment, but he has been told that it will progress. Just

Steven is the son of one of our staff. Her son is in his early thirties and was diagnosed with a particularly nasty type of brain tumor just about the same time my brother became ill. His prognosis is also pretty overwhelming, and his chemo is one of the most difficult to endure. He also lives in Florida, so his mom and dad (both hospital workers) are traveling back and forth as often as they can to be with him. He has a

very strong faith and a ton of support from his church family. He is very touched to know our church is praying for him. I have shared some of our message boards with him, especially the one that said, " 'What if' equals fear. 'Even if' equals faith." **Update**: Scan a few days ago shows NO SIGN of that tumor left after treatment! Hallelujah! Now to keep it from returning... **keep on praying**. They will be having a VERY Happy Thanksgiving family gathering.:)

I hope you will hold these two families in your prayers as they face the unthinkable. Both of these guys are about my own two sons' ages.

A note from the Trustees......

Fall is here and the Trustees are preparing for winter. Contracts have been approved for snow removal at the church and the parsonage. We are thankful for the excellent lawn mowing service at the church provided by Jack and Alex Mitchell. It is a wonderful free will service they provide. We are also very appreciative of the care of Mary's Garden by Paula Austic and Pat Love. The garden is a beautiful welcome for all who enter the back door of the church.

Our Fall chicken barbecue and pie sale was a great success. We cleared just over \$1,400, which is the best barbecue/pie sale profit we have achieved in some time. Thank you to all who worked that day and for all the pie bakers who provided the delicious, sweet accompaniments to the chicken.

We had a mini sink hole in the church parking lot right at the entrance. It started small but was getting progressively worse. We had a concern that a sewage line had burst below the spot, and we had to take action. Joe Houseworth and his son excavated the sink hole and found it was due to a large stump that had been covered many years ago. It had deteriorated and created a growing void that caused the sink hole to develop. We are happy that no underground water or sewer lines were involved. Thank you to the Houseworth's for their immediate response to our problem.

For several years we have been evaluating the need to refurbish our wonderful organ. Some of you may recall that the organ had fallen into disrepair in the late 1950s and could not be used for 5 years until repairs were made. We can't allow that to happen again. Our Garrett House organ is currently maintained by Parsons Pipe Organ Builders, Canandaigua, NY. The have evaluated the repair and refurbishing needs of our organ and proposed 4 major repairs that need to be done:

- 1. Flute pipe repairs
- 2. Tremolo rebuilding
- 3. Reservoir releathering (swell and great)
- 4. Complete cleaning

It's a big job that will be done over time as it fits into their schedule. We may be without the organ for short periods of time, but the effort will be well worth it. We hope to have a community organ concert when all repairs are done as a celebration. The Trustees recommended going ahead with this project and Council approved it. The funds are in place to do this work. Betty McKnight is smiling in Heaven. She loved that organ.

Just a little background on pledging and why we need them. Just as your home budget is managed from month to month, Julie, our wonderful Treasurer, manages our church budget. We, of course, have monthly bills, telephone, internet, heat, lights and more for both the church and the parsonage. We pay the copier bill and we pay our paid staff. We budget money for Mission and Outreach and the lay servant ministry and other ministries when we can. This is just a quick snapshot of what is paid monthly, there is more. You get the idea. Your pledges help project a general idea of what income we have to do all this with. Of course we also factor in monies from fundraisers and other income. Not to bore you, just to update you.

We ask that you prayerfully consider what you may be able to give and, of course, we know that circumstances change and you are not held to that amount.
