GRACE AFTER THE RAIN STORM



For me, I love to hear the rain. I'm reminded of God watering the earth and life continuing to be nourished as we see the growth of flowers and plants and trees and more. Maybe you've heard the phrase April showers bring May flowers. Thomas Tusser is credited with coming up with the phrase "April showers bring May flowers" in the year 1557. Some even say March winds, April showers, May flowers. Sometimes the rain provides a reminder of God's grace.

For others, rain may be equated with the 1971 Carpenters song, "Rainy Days and Mondays" as they sing "Rainy days and Mondays always get me down." No matter how you view rain, we can all agree rain happens. It's part of life.

The end of March 2021 is filled with memories for me. Myra and I were told the day before our daughter's wedding that rain brought a flood to our home. Meanwhile, we were preparing to witness our youngest daughter's marriage taking place on the South Carolina coast. And while this news may not have been desirable, I found myself at peace knowing God was there in our midst.

2021 will be the year some of us remember the big rain storm that brought fear and realization of property damage. Yet we still have hope according to the words of the prophet Isaiah:

When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you.

Isaiah 43:2

Lent 2021 leads us to Holy Week before we once again celebrate Easter. And *rain* may be a good analogy for us to consider as we think about the season of Lent. And while many Christians practice spiritual disciplines of fasting, repentance, self-denial, and other spiritual disciplines, we are blessed to be reminded of the Easter celebration of Jesus' resurrection as we ponder the May flowers that blossom after the rain.

And while seeing and experiencing the damage this storm brought, I'm still reminded of God's grace as we read in the Scriptures.

His death on the cross has provided the hope we have in life eternal. So whether it is rain and hail or snow and sleet, Jesus will be there. And whether hot or cold, cloudy or a day of sunshine, the hope God gives us in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ gives us the assurance that we may find happiness and peace through the celebration we share at Easter. 





How do local churches plan to hold Easter services safely?

KINGSPORT — With Easter just a few weeks away, church leaders across the region are already planning ways to safely hold worship services.

While the pandemic has presented a number of challenges for congregations over the last year, one of the biggest challenges on Easter will be accommodating larger crowds while also maintaining social distancing. The Times News recently spoke to three local pastors to find out how they plan to make this happen.

HOLY TRINITY LUTHERAN CHURCH

Pastor Scottie Burkhalter said he and other church leaders have kept a close eye on local COVID-19 case metrics when planning their Easter service. For now, the plan is to hold a 10 a.m. drive-in worship service in the church parking lot, something the church has been offering every week since last summer.

For those who aren't sure how it works, Burkhalter said churchgoers will pull into the parking lot and tune into the

church's FM radio station, 99.7 WHLT. They can sit in their vehicles and listen to Burkhalter's sermon while watching him preach from an outdoor lectern.

While the basics will remain the same for the Easter ser-

vice, Burkhalter said there will be one twist.

"We're going to invite people to bring lawn chairs and sit out beside their cars, so that'll be neat for us," Burkhalter said, adding that speakers will be set up on the grounds so that people can hear the sermon from outside their vehicles.

"We have plenty of space, because we have three lots," Burkhalter said. "We have the drug store across the street, we have our field, plus we have our parking lot here, and we haven't run out of spaces yet."

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH

Pastor Marvin Cameron said the church plans to offer three in-person services for Easter this year, but each will require reservations to ensure social distancing can occur.

"At 8:15 on Easter morning, we'll have our contemporary service, and all these are in the sanctuary," Cameron said. "At 9:45, we're going to have a family-friendly service, where we're encouraging our families with children to be

How have churches adapted to pandemic?

KINGSPORT — Since this time last year, churches have been faced with the difficult task of reimagining their worship services and other events.


And while some churches have already returned to some form of in-person worship, church leaders continue to monitor case counts and maintain a certain degree of flexibility when looking toward the future. The Times News recently spoke to three local pastors to find out how their churches have adapted to the pandemic.

HOLY TRINITY LUTHERAN CHURCH

When the COVID-19 shutdowns first began. Pastor Scottie Burkhalter said Holy Trinity leaders prayed hard about how to keep the congregation together. They created a phone tree to minimize feelings of isolation, made masks for the parishioners and used the church website (holytrinitykingsport. org) as a communication tool to share updates.

The church also began to publish videos, including midweek words of encouragement and filmed worship services. On July 5,





the church started holding drive-in Sunday worship services with contactless communion, Burkhalter said. Since that time, the church has not missed a week of worshiping in the parking lot, he said.

"We commune weekly at our church," Burkhalter said. "We've got doctors and nurses, and they literally put surgical gloves on my hands, and I have a mask on, and we've got a system set up so that we've got somebody that spots the cars that are coming up. They tell them how many people are in the car, and we have that many cups of wine and that many wafers on a tray, and I hold that tray out to the

window and they take those off that tray. Each tray has a brand new Bounty paper towel, and if a tray gets touched by a parishioner, we put that tray to the side until it's been sterilized. So that became a really neat thing for us."

During the drive-in services, the church broadcasts Burkhalter's sermons via an FM transmitter on its own station, 99.7 WHLT. Churchgoers can pull into the parking lot and tune in to the station to listen through their car speakers, while watching Burkhalter preach from the sidewalk. For those who can't attend the drive-ins, the services are still available in video

form on the church web-

"We've also developed a reopening task force, if you will, and there's myself and four other people on it, and what we're doing is we're looking at all the guidelines and the fact that things have changed now," Burkhalter said. "Our community here, our active worshipers, we're like 80% vaccinated for those who are in their 60s and above, but what we're going to do is make a recommendation to council as to when we think we can go back into the church. We're taking it seriously and just trying to be cautious."

Volunteers collect more than 1.3 tons of trash during 24th annual Riverview cleanup event

KINGSPORT — More than 80 volunteers converged on the Riverview neighborhood Saturday for the annual Riverview Trash Cleanup, the 24th year of trash collection in the neighborhood.

The volunteers included a group from the Brownies, New Vision Youth, Kingsport Public Works, area churches and members of the D-B Environmental Club.

The event is the first of several planned throughout the city as a part of Keep Kingsport Beautiful's participation in the statewide "Trashercise" campaign.

After some exercises offered by Healthy Kingsport, including muscle stretching and toning, the volunteers fanned out in all directions picking up discarded paper and plastic items, even broken glass.

More than 1.3 tons of trash was collected and delivered to Kingsport Public Works trucks, compared to more than 2 tons from previous years. Among the garbage were brush and metal items, including an old discarded fire extinguisher.

Participants were treated to lunch after the trash col-

SAFETY AND SECURITY POLICY

Holy Trinity Lutheran Church

Date Approved: June 2020

Cyber Security:

Holy Trinity has two computers that are used virtually every day (church office desktop and Pastor's laptop). There is a third in the music office, but it is seldom used. These computers are all on our network (wired or Wi-Fi) but they are not set up for direct file sharing. Both have password protection. Webroot antivirus/malware software has been installed by CompuWorld in Colonial Heights. They will monitor the systems and contact us if routine scans (which are scheduled) are not done or are somehow disabled. They will also contact us when it is time to renew this protection. This software package was recommended by CompuWorld as the most effective and most economical protection available. They indicate it covers all needs – malware, viruses, worms, etc.

The office PC and Pastor's PC are set to back up to OneDrive on "the cloud". This service is paid for via our subscription to Microsoft Office. The current Pastor and Secretary have been told that files in Documents, Pictures, and Desktop will be saved to the OneDrive automatically as they are created/ updated. They have also been told that any other files (in other folders) will have to be copied manually to OneDrive.

The office computer has a copy of ACS People Suite that contains member contact information. That has never been treated as confidential in the church – printed copies are openly available in the mail-boxes, in the office, and at times in the conference rooms or Fellowship Hall. The database is also backed up to OneDrive once per month (first Tuesday night), but the computer must be left on overnight for this to be completed. The secretary's current practice is to leave the computer on Monday through Thursday nights and to turn it off on weekends, so this is covered. The office's and the Pastor's computers have no reason to contain any personal financial information, Social Security numbers, giving information, or banking information. The only sensitive information might be notes or correspondence regarding a counseling or personal matter.

The office computer also contains a copy of the budgets as printed in the annual report, but once again that information is available in printed form throughout the building and has not been treated as confidential to date.

The computers used by the Financial Secretary and Treasurer are typically not powered on unless they are in use, deterring a significant amount of the threat of virus, malware, or hacking. The Financial Secretary and Treasurer manage backups of their data.

Our Wi-Fi network has two accounts – one password protected and one open access. This was discussed with IntelliThought, the company that designed and specified the system we installed. They indicate that the threat of hacking or unauthorized access to our system/computers is the same (and very low they added with the built-in safeguards in what they provided) on both systems. The risk of using the unsecured system is to the user who logs in that way. An unsecured system is vulnerable to such things as keystroke logging software that could capture, for example, a person's banking log in if someone used the unsecured system, logged in to do banking, and a person with malicious intent and with a keystroke logging system were also nearby on the unsecured network at the same time (not very likely in our case).

Financial Security:

Generally, monies should not be kept at the Church. Sunday offerings should be counted immediately after the service and deposited in the off-hour's depository at the Main Branch of First Horizon on Center Street. For worship services apart from the Sunday morning services, the offerings should be counted and deposited immediately after the service.

There are some exceptions to this general guideline. Any small offering (less than \$100) from a midweek service should be held until the following Sunday and included in the Sunday offering. Some offerings come as checks in the mail. These are received by the Administrative Assistant and should be placed in the Financial Secretary's folder in the communication box. Sometimes individuals place offerings in the folder during the week. These offerings should be collected by the Financial Secretary whenever the folder is checked, and they should be secured in a locked file cabinet until added to the next Sunday's offering. It should be noted that the folder need not be checked every day.

In the case of the Financial Secretary's absence, a trained backup person will make the counts and deposits immediately after the last Sunday service. When both the backup are absent, an usher should place the offerings in a deposit bag and lock it in the file cabinet in the Financial Secretary's office. Upon the return of either the Financial Secretary or the backup the offerings should be counted and deposited as soon as possible. The absence of both these persons would be the only circumstance when Sunday offerings would be held at church.

At this time, the Church does not receive offerings by electronic funds transfers (ETF). On rare occasion funds have been deposited directly to the Church's Escrow Account. However, should ETFs become widely used, steps should be taken to ensure personal financial data be protected on any electronic device used by the Church to record these offerings.

The locked file cabinet in the Financial Secretary's office is considered secure. The Financial Secretary should be the only person with a key. However, a backup key should be kept in the Key Box in the Administrative Secretary's office.

Annual Policy Review

A safety and security plan should be reviewed periodically and updated as needed to address any new threats or incorporate new protocols or technologies that might improve the overall plan. Any new deficiencies identified should be corrected as soon as possible, especially those that "harden" the target and reduce vulnerabilities. The more proactive a plan and the more secure the exterior appears, the less likely the church will become a target.

Annual Inspections

Each year Council will appoint a small team of two or more members to perform a self-inspection of the church building and grounds. At least one team member should be from the Property Committee. If possible the same month of the year should be used. The team will report any problems and suggest recommendations for improvement.

Stop by the Gathering Room doors and Pastor will extend a tray to the driver with enough communion (wafers and wine in individual glasses) for each person in the car. The driver will distribute communion to passengers. Pastor will be wearing gloves and mask, and

the napkin under the elements will be discarded each time in case the communicant touches the napkin. When finished communing, turn right toward the Urology building and exit by that building. Music will be playing on our station throughout the Holy Communion process.
