News from our ... **Church Council**

Summary of Council Minutes March 9, 2020

Opening: Called to order at 7 PM. Sue Rasmussen led a devotional based on “Repent” by William Williamson based on Mark 10. Minutes of February meeting reviewed and approved.

Finance: Treasurer Report and Financial Secretary Report were both reviewed and approved by Council.

Pastor Report: Pastor reported on his activities based on the 5 areas we deemed most important when he was hired: Preaching and Worship Leadership, Pastoral Care and Visitation, Evangelism/Mission, Youth and Family Ministry, and Spiritual Formation and Direction. He requested feedback on a request that had been made by the Chief Chaplain at Ballad that he consider being a volunteer chaplain one evening a month. Feedback was that it should not interfere with his Holy Trinity duties nor with his family life, but would support his trying for one or two months if he so desired. Laura Mitchell came as a visitor and explained how she and Pastor are exploring a program called Donut Repair Ministry that could be used at Easter egg hunt and VBS and perhaps other events.

Worship and Music: Amy shared their concern of the effect that the swing in temperature down as low as 61 degrees during the week in the nave had on the piano and organ. They requested that the temperature not be taken below 65 degrees. Council requested they obtain the recommendations from the piano and organ tuners and meet with the property committee to work out a temperature plan that would save energy and money while at the same time taking care of our equipment. They should report back at the next meeting.

Stewardship: Abby presented the Ministry Teams plan to have a program on Lutherans Restoring Creation on Sunday afternoon, April 23. They want to broaden our definition of Stewardship to include taking care of God’s creation.

Middle Tennessee Tornado Disaster Relief: It was recommended that we allow members to give a free will offering to support efforts to help those impacted in the recent tornado outbreaks. Money would go to synods disaster relief and 100% would go to help with this effort. Approval given to go forward with this appeal.

Safety and Security: Cal has received good input from various parishioners on cyber security, financial security, fire protection, and medical emergencies. He is well along the way to completing this policy. Suggested it might be communicated section by section. Also suggested that another evacuation drill be done this year. Several people have volunteered if we see the need for an ongoing Security Team.

Miscellaneous: Nominating committee has been formed and they will start meeting in March and plan to identify nominees in time for elections in May. Vision 2020 Team is also underway and plan to give report on suggestions on Vision and Mission at our April meeting. Permission granted to publicize and encourage participation in 2020 Census.

How To Protect Yourself and Those You Love

The More You Know...

This month Worship and Music Committee continues its series of Trumpet articles covering a variety of topics on symbols, colors, design/architecture, traditions, seasons, and festivals that many of us either don't think about very often or perhaps are not sure of the significance of these things. This month we will reflect on a hymn of the church that offers comfort for many in difficult times.

O God Our Help in Ages Past

Reading the title brings up memories of both lyrics and tune for many. While this hymn is an old one, it is one that to this day is used often. It is not hard to find in church music; it is said to be published in 1,123 hymnals.

The hymn was written by Isaac Watts in 1719. Watts was the son of a schoolmaster and was born in Southampton in the UK in 1674. He was writing verses at the age of seven, foreshadowing the bounty of work he would later produce. In 1702, he became a pastor. In 1712, he accepted an invitation to visit Sir Thomas Abney, at his residence of Abney Park and, at Sir Thomas' request, made it his home until his death in 1748. He spent his life as a preacher and a writer. His collected works, first published in 1720, include sermons, treatises, poems, and hymns.

Being a preacher and a hymn writer, he blended those skills as he delivered his messages to his worshippers. Some of his hymns were written to be sung after his sermons, giving additional expression to the meaning of the text upon which he had preached. Many of his hymns are based on the Psalms. His published hymns number more than eight hundred.

"O God Our Help in Ages Past" was written by Watts in 1719. It is based on Psalm 90. In the NIV translation, that Psalm begins:

- ¹ Lord, you have been our dwelling place
throughout all generations.
- ² Before the mountains were born
or you brought forth the whole world,
from everlasting to everlasting you are God.
- ³ You turn people back to dust,
saying, "Return to dust, you mortals."
- ⁴ A thousand years in your sight
are like a day that has just gone by,
or like a watch in the night.

The older, King James version begins:

- ¹ Lord, thou hast been our dwelling place in all generations.
- ² Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever thou hadst formed the
earth and the world, even from everlasting to everlasting, thou art God.
- ³ Thou turnest man to destruction; and sayest, Return, ye children of men.
- ⁴ For a thousand years in thy sight are but as yesterday when it is past,
and as a watch in the night.

(Reading additional verses from either translation will provide even more context for the words of the song.)

Regardless of your preferred translation, the linkage of the Psalm to the hymn is clear as you can see from these verses:

1 Our God, our help in ages past,
our hope for years to come,
our shelter from the stormy blast,
and our eternal home:

2 Under the shadow of your throne
your saints have dwelt secure;
sufficient is your arm alone,
and our defense is sure.

3 Before the hills in order stood,
or earth received her frame,
from everlasting you are God,
to endless years the same.

4 A thousand ages in your sight
are like an evening gone;
short as the watch that ends the night
before the rising sun.

5 The busy tribes of flesh and blood,
with all their lives and cares,
are carried downward by your flood,
and lost in foll'wing years.

6 Time, like an ever-rolling stream,
bears all its sons away;
they fly forgotten, as a dream
dies at the op'ning day.

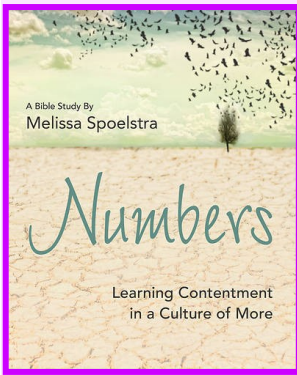
7 Our God, our help in ages past,
our hope for years to come:
O be our guard while troubles last,
and our eternal home.

These verses are the most commonly found ones, but there are several more in Watts' original work. In addition, the words of some of the verses have been adapted slightly when printed in various publications.

What prompted Watts to write this hymn? In 1714, Queen Anne, a Protestant, became deathly ill and England was thrown into chaos. The era of conditional religious tolerance was suddenly threatened with the impending change of rulers. To make matters worse, Parliament hurriedly passed the Schism Act designed to suppress dissent once again. Watts wrote this hymn of comfort for England's panicked citizens, fearful of losing their religious freedom due to change of monarch and this new Act. Paraphrasing Psalm 90, he reminded them that God takes the long view of Time, while humans are caught up in the trials and tribulations of our current crises. As luck would have it, Queen Anne died on the very day the dreaded Schism Act would have become official. George I became king and repealed the Act before it could be enforced. For this reason, the queen's death was called by some the "Protestant Passover."

Even today, his hymn comes to mind in time of crisis – small ones and larger ones. It is often used to comfort families whose loved one has died. It is also used in official government assemblies of various kinds. And, it often comes to mind in times of uncertainty and trial like we are experiencing in 2020. We are reminded that the current problems are temporary, especially when viewed in God's time and in His perspective of eternal love. He is our hope for years to come!

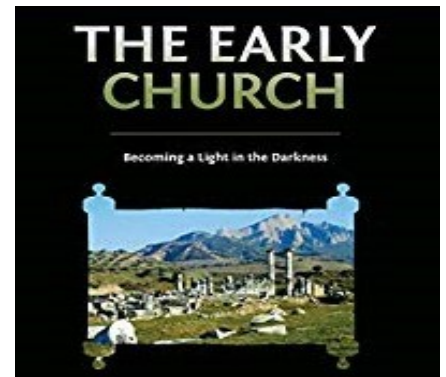

Responding to the 2020 Census

As members of Holy Trinity and residents of Sullivan County, we can help our community and our fellow man. How? By responding to the 2020 Census! The value of doing so is significant for Kingsport and Sullivan County.

By now, you have received a card from the U.S. Census Bureau inviting you to respond to the Census. It only takes a few minutes.

The last time we had a census in 2010 only 82.9% of Sullivan County residents responded. That meant for each person not responding, our City/County lost almost \$1100/year of potential funds flowing back into our area. That \$1100 over ten years amounted to \$11,000/person. For, all of Sullivan County, we lost a potential \$29 million/year or \$290 M over ten years. That money went somewhere else! That's something we don't want to do again.

As you can see, the impact of not responding is tremendous!

Annually, \$675 Billion in federal funds are distributed to states, counties and communities to support resources such as schools, hospitals, police and fire departments. (Tennessee gets over \$17 Billion/year.) Here are the top ten examples of how the funds support our community (most of our residents benefit directly from these items):

- Medicaid
- Student loans
- Nutrition assistance programs
- Medicare Supplemental medical insurance (Part B)
- Highway planning and construction—improvement of our federal highways
- Federal Pell Grants –need based financial aid
- Section B housing choice grants
- Needy family assistance
- Housing loans for those with low incomes
- State children's health insurance
- National school lunch programs.

Additionally, the geographical boundaries of our 1st Congressional District are decided by the Census population determination.

So...suffice it to say, the Census decides what total our community's federal funding will be. We all need to do our part and participate.

NOW is the opportunity to really help our community. Please be a Census supporter.

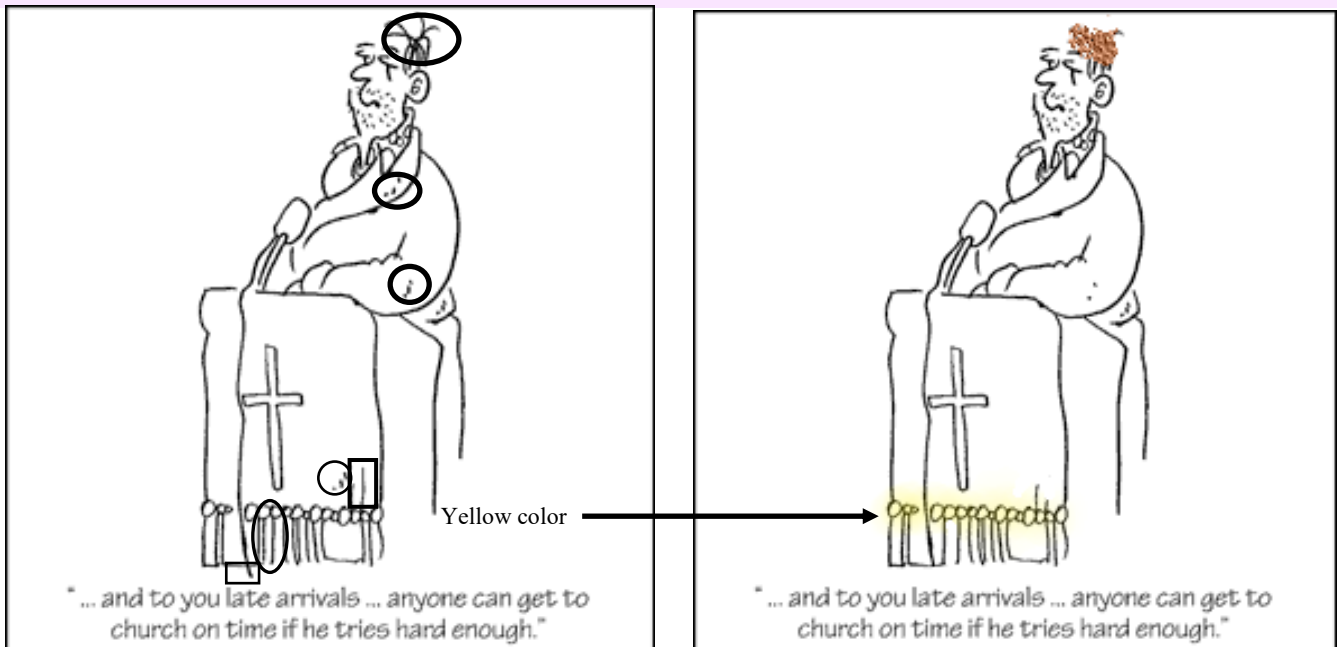
Middle Tennessee Tornado Relief.
