News from our ... Church Council

SUMMARY OF COUNCIL MINUTES

December 9, 2019

Meeting was opened with devotions by Dan Kleven. This was followed by a brief safety moment concerning safety during the holiday season.

All financial reports, treasurer's report and financial secretary's report were reviewed and approved.

Pastor Scottie reminded us that there were 5 areas identified by our call committee that came from our Spiritual and Practical Journey of Prayer. He is attempting to focus his primary efforts in these areas. He also brought forward requests for membership from Myra Burkhalter, Onnie Carolyn Colussy, and Sharon Uyeda to be received on December 15 and Carol and Aaron Linksman to be received on December 22. Connie Steere has asked to be removed from our rolls. Report, including membership requests, was approved.

Treasurer Paul Castille presented the proposed budget for 2020 on behalf of the Finance Team. The budget is out of balance by only \$12,000 which is better than many of our recent faith budgets. Council members expressed appreciation to Paul and others who helped with this budget work and then approved it unanimously to present to the congregation at the annual meeting in January.

The executive team brought forth recommendations for four people to serve on the nominating committee next year: Lynn Bulle, Terry Huret, Edna Kinner, and Loretta Nitschke. Also recommended Leigh and Bob Bergemann to represent us along with Pastor Scottie at the Southeastern Synod convention. Approved unanimously by council to present to the congregation at January annual meeting.

Evangelism team requested approval to do a pictorial directory in February of 2020. Approved.

Discussion was held on property committee report. One area of focus was a concern that the Jungle Gym which was built several years ago as an Eagle Scout project, had rotted somewhat and might no longer be safe. Jim will discuss with John Pollak and Bill Cooper about alternate pathways forward on this.

Another discussion was held about the number and longevity of files we store in boxes in the archives room and office. Some may need to be permanent and others may not. There are a few record books that are not replaceable. A fireproof safe might be in order. Executive team members and Flo Weirerbach will meet to come up with a recommendation on this.

Balance of meeting was discussion about an incident which happened on December 8 before church when an individual seeking money caused concerns in our narthex. Members of the executive team and staff met to discuss and take appropriate actions.

January is National Glaucoma Awareness Month.

Glaucoma is a group of eye conditions that can cause vision loss and blindness by damaging the optic nerve located at the back of the eye.

- About 3 million Americans have glaucoma.
- The second leading cause of blindness worldwide.
- Scientists aren't sure what causes the most common types of glaucoma.
- No way to prevent glaucoma, but if caught early your vision can be preserved.
- Half of the people with glaucoma don't know they have it.
- Glaucoma can affect one or both eyes.
- No early symptoms, generally a progressive slow loss of peripheral vision occurs.
- To diagnose requires a comprehensive dilated eye exam.

People at risk of having glaucoma are:

- 1) greater than 60 years of age
- 2) have a family history of glaucoma
- 3) have diabetes.

African American and the Hispanic/Latino populations develop glaucoma at a younger age and a higher prevalence of glaucoma exist in these populations.

Treatment can slow the progression of glaucoma and prevent further damage. Prescription eye drops (to lower eye pressure) is the most common treatment. Laser treatment to lower eye pressure is also used. And surgical intervention to drain fluid from the eye is an additional treatment option.

Take care of your vision and consider having an eye exam soon.

THE EARLY CHURCH

Discover the passion and commitment early believers displayed as they claimed Jesus in the face of fierce consequences and powerful adversaries.

The More You Know...

This month Worship and Music Committee continues its series of <u>Trumpet</u> articles covering a variety of topics on symbols, colors, design/architecture, traditions, seasons, and festivals that many of us either don't think about very often or perhaps are not sure of the significance of these things. In the January article, we will offer a closer look at some key characters in Epiphany, the "Wise Men."

Epiphany and the Wise Men

The Season of Epiphany

The Epiphany of Our Lord always falls on January 6 (the 12th day after Christmas). The word "Epiphany" is Greek and means "to make manifest". The word "manifest" means "to be evidence of and to prove". So, Epiphany is the season in which we observe how Jesus manifests himself as Savior of the world and the true Son of God.



This is the season when the wise men actually appear on the scene, and we follow them as they search for and find Jesus. During Epiphany we will see Jesus as a boy in the temple; later we hear of His early miracles as He displays His divinity. We will see Jesus baptized by John (not because he needed to be cleansed from sin, but so that "the Law would be fulfilled"). During Epiphany we see Satan make a futile attempt to tempt Jesus in the

wilderness. We also see that the salvation promised by God was not for the Jews alone but for the whole world. Finally, with Peter, James, and John, we witness the Transfiguration of our Lord Jesus Christ just before he goes into Jerusalem to be crucified.

Epiphany represents the season of revelation and emphasizes the ministry of Jesus. It reveals to us who God is in Christ and what He did in the world. The color for *season* of Epiphany is green which is the color of growth and our new life in Christ. There are several festivals throughout the season that are celebrated with the royal and majestic color of white: The Epiphany of Our Lord (always on January 6), The Baptism of Our Lord, The Presentation of Our Lord and The Transfiguration of Our Lord. This year, Easter comes later, so Epiphany has 7 Sundays. At the end of Epiphany, we mark the Transfiguration of our Lord and then begin Lent with Ash Wednesday.

As to the "Wise Men," who are also referred to as "Three Kings" or the "Magi:" We learn about their visit in the Gospel of Matthew. They are described in the writing only as "wise men from the east." There is no reference to an exact number – but there are three gifts, presumably leading to the long-held assumption that there were

three visitors. Who were they? The term "Magi" may shed the most (but still little) light on this. Magi were learned (presumably "wise") men who studied astrology, regarded as a science at the time. "Magi" is derived from the same root as "magic", but Magi were not sorcerers. They were typically Persian, and that is consistent with Matthew's statement that they came "from the east." Persia no longer exists, but it is largely present-day Iran. Presumably, their study of the heavens would have led them to observe the star of Bethlehem, to recognize that is was something out of the ordinary, and to decide they should travel to check this out in more detail. Further, the fact (although often forgotten) that they arrived



later than the birth night is consistent with travel. This would also be consistent with a Persian belief that the rising of a star can signal the birth of a ruler.

While the "Wise Men" are sometimes called "Kings" (notably in the famous carol), there is no scriptural or historical basis for them being rulers of any kind. So why this name? Old Testament prophecies predict that "all kings shall fall down before him" or worship him. It could well be that early believers, reading both the prophesies and Matthew's writing, connected the dots and concluded that the two statements are linked with the visitors being kings. Another Western tradition actually names three visitors – Melchior, Caspar, and Balthazar. Other Christian traditions offer alternative names. Some traditions indicate they were from Persia, Arabia, and India. Others suggest that at least one was from China. Over the years, a tradition has also evolved suggesting that the three were of differing ages as well as being from different countries.



And what about those gifts? The gifts were typical of what would be given to a king. And, the gifts in that day had spiritual meaning: Gold was a symbol of kingship on earth. Frankincense was a symbol of deity. Myrrh was a symbol of death. The fate of the gifts is not described. But once again, there are at least two unsubstantiated traditions about one of the gifts, the gold. One suggests Mary and Joseph pragmatically used it to finance their travels as they sought to save their baby from Herod's plan to kill Jesus. Another suggests it was stolen by two thieves who turn out to be the two crucified beside Jesus.

So, with limited, historically verified details and a lot of "traditions," what do we conclude about the visit of the Wise Men? Perhaps the following:

Jesus was recognized as being something special from the time of his birth – not just another baby!

He is recognized outside his own land as being special.

He is worthy of worship, of falling down before him.

He is worth going out of your way (making a special effort or trip) to worship and to learn about.

Perhaps there are other conclusions – something worthy of consideration in the season of Epiphany.

Flu Season and the Passing of the Peace

During this time with the flu being wide-spread and the Passing of the Peace during worship:

- Use your good judgment.
- Use the hand cleanser and tissue provided.
- Your fellow worshiper will not be offended if you smile and greet without huging, kissing, or shaking hands.
- Protect yourself and your fellow worshiper, save your hugs, kisses and hand shakes till spring and this heavy flu season passes.


