FROM THE PASTOR

SOMEWHERE BETWEEN SHROVE TUESDAY AND EASTER

Here I sit on Ash Wednesday reflecting on last night's Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper and preparing for tonight (Ash Wednesday service) while also thinking about what is to come. We have once again started another 40-day journey [Lent: a period of time on the liturgical calendar that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends approximately six weeks (40 days) later on Maundy Thursday], the beginning of a 3-day period leading to Easter. So let's stay here between Shrove Tuesday (Feb 25th) and the end of March (5th Sunday of Lent) for now. It all began with pancakes, bacon, sausage, juice, and coffee here at Holy Trinity. Announced with a Friday night email update and an announcement at Sunday Worship, 50 plus hearty church members, family, and friends enthusiastically showed up. WOW! There is *amazing love* at Holy Trinity!

I witnessed, first-hand, the love at Holy Trinity at what will hopefully be the first of many Shrove Tuesday Pancake Suppers we enjoy together. The kitchen crew quickly assembled including Jenny Trumbo, Judy Harper (who celebrated the birthday of her 13th anniversary for washing dishes at HTLC), Mic Childress, Martin & Kathy Schick, John Pollak, Joy Wood, Kristi Grady and yours truly, Pastor Scottie. And Myra Burkhalter made a late run to the grocery store for more supplies after we ran out of supplies (I called this a great opportunity). Thanks to all involved.

Lots of bacon and sausage were cooked. Very special artistic pancakes were cooked/created by our local artistic, Mic Childress & some very normal pancakes made by me, Pastor Scottie (PS) with my new black apron embellished with the brightly red-colored embroidered words, *Pastor Scottie*, thanks to the enthusiasm of Jenny Trumbo and Jo Rita McMurray (embroidering done by Jo Rita). They sure know how to make a pastor feel special. All 50 plus attendees made the evening special by cooking, eating, fellowshiping, and just being together.

Let's end this article by understanding more about *Shrove Tuesday* and how it has developed into even more with what's called *Fat Tuesday*. First of all, *Shrove Tuesday* involves a tradition of eating pancakes on the day before *Ash Wednesday* as a way to use up eggs, milk, and sugar before the fasting time for many who practice fasting during the 40 days of Lent as a way to prepare for *Easter*, which falls on April 12, 2020. "Shrive" means for a priest to hear sins confessed and for the confessor to be absolved of their sins before beginning the 40 days of Lent. As sinners, we realize the need to be cleansed and prepared for the *Easter* celebration.

In New Orleans, people often speak of *Mardi Gras*, French for "Fat Tuesday," which is the last day of a season called "Carnival." The Carnival season leading up to Lent, is a time for merrymaking, feasting, and dancing characterized by parades, masquerades, shiny beads and more. Some enjoy a party for *Fat Tuesday* with lots of different sweets and more. Maybe we will want to dress up our *Shrove Tuesday* next year. Something to think about...

News from our ... **Church Council**

SUMMARY OF COUNCIL MINUTES

FEBRUARY 10, 2020

Meeting was opened with devotions by Jo McMurray challenging us as Christians to let our light shine in the darkness and to provide love to a broken world. This was followed by a "Safety Moment" led by Paul Castille reminding us of ways we can protect ourselves at home by using appropriate safety equipment and clothing.

Treasurer Paul Castille presented the financial reports. He highlighted our reserve funds such as our Capital projects fund and other reserve funds. We have strong "in the bank" finances but our annual giving has decreased over the last decade to the point that we go into the year with deficit budgeting. Treasurer's report and Financial Secretary's report were approved.

Pastor Scottie reported on activities that he has been involved in during the past month. He is seeing increased interest and participation in his weekly coffee gatherings. He also participated in our hosting of families from Family Promise, presided at an inurnment service for Jane Hultin and a Celebration of Life Service for Jack Watson. Pastor attended a meeting of the Kingsport Ministerial Association. He was asked if Holy Trinity would consider hosting the annual Unity Prayer Service in August. This service involves numerous churches in Kingsport and was started following the shooting in the church in Charleston SC. St. Dominic Catholic church has hosted the last two years. Pastor requested Council approval to host it this year. Council approved this by a unanimous vote.

Council is charged by our constitution to review our Vision Statement on some regular basis. The current statement was adopted in 1996. Since then much has changed in our society, our community, and our church. Certainly our attendance and giving have both declined substantially. A proposal was made that we start a formal Vision 2020 process to prayerfully seek God's guidance of where a new vision might lead us. David Reames has volunteered to pick up where our 2018 Spiritual and Practical Journey of prayer left off. He would like a small team to help him with the initial work. Council unanimously endorsed moving forward with an initiative entitled Vision 2020.

The recent safety and security assessment of our facility by the Kingsport Police Department was reviewed and discussed in great detail. A number of their suggestions were determined to be things we should do right away and were approved by council. These will be relayed to the appropriate ministry teams for implementation. Others require more study and training. This information will be sent to the congregation in a communication.

Two other items were discussed and tabled for later decisions. The first was the Jungle Gym in our playground which is reaching the end of its life. It will likely have to be replaced in the next year or so. The second had to do with records retention, what we need to save, and what we can dispose of. Discussion is already underway regarding financial records.

Meeting was adjourned with prayer led by Pastor Scottie.

MESSAGE FROM CHURCH COUNCIL ON ACTIONS TO IMPROVE SECURITY AND SAFETY

In 2018, a team of our members, attended a seminar on church security. They also received guidance from the Sullivan County sheriff. This led to several things to make us more secure and to aid in evacuation in case of any type emergency. Chief among these were the installation of new doors with easy open bump bars, the installation of cameras at all our entrances with feed from these cameras to the church office, and the practice of locking our doors 10 minutes after the service starts.

Recently, we asked the Kingsport Police department if they had additional ideas. Two officers involved with security toured our facilities and made some additional recommendations. At our council meeting in February we voted to implement the suggestions that most applied to us. Some of the things adopted were to improve outside lighting at night in our parking lot, improving the locks on the two doors from the choir room and the furnace room to our back stairway, acquisition of a digital device that will easily link to our security cameras so all the doors can be watched from anywhere in the building, and installation of a peep hole in the door from the hallway to the office suites so that door can be locked when someone is working alone in the office but they can look out at the hallway before exiting.

One interesting thing from the police visit, they said we are well ahead of most churches they visit. The fact that we have our two entrance doors so close together makes it easy to monitor them and that we have security cameras on all our doors. They also like the fact that all our doors are locked when we are having services or meetings of any kind. They were glad that we had a trial evacuation and encouraged us to continue those periodically.

In addition to suggestions of modifications to our property, they also made suggestions regarding personal interactions with individuals who make us uncomfortable. More about this later. We just want you to know that we continue to look for ways to assure the security and safety of our people and our facilities.

A REMINDER. RECENTLY EXIT DOORS WERE FOUND NOT FULLY LOCKED AND COULD BE EASILY OPENED FROM OUTSIDE. ANYTIME WE LEAVE THROUGH ONE OF THE MAIN EXIT DOORS, PULL ON THEM FROM OUTSIDE TO BE SURE THE LOCKS HAVE ENGAGED!

The More You Know...

This month Worship and Music Committee continues its series of Trumpet articles covering a variety of topics on symbols, colors, design/architecture, traditions, seasons, and festivals that many of us either don't think about very often or perhaps are not sure of the significance of these things. This month we will reflect on the church music of the season.

Church Music During Lent

During the Lenten season in 2020, our church music will likely sound familiar and at the same time different. It will be familiar through the many pieces – hymns, preludes, anthems – that are typically heard during this season because their message and even their music fits the theme of the season. It will be different from the rest of the church year in that, in keeping with the more somber and penitent season, festive or celebratory phrases such as “Alleluia” or “Hallelujah” are not used. This constraint for the time being makes those phrases even more joyous when again unleashed on Easter Day.

The music of Lent also varies greatly in age. Some songs are hundreds of years old, while others are very new. The tension between old and new (often stated as traditional and contemporary, although that terminology reflects a style component) church music is a common chord for many worshippers today. As we navigate that tension, some words from one writer are worthy of consideration. That author, Anne McNair, is speaking specifically about choices in hymns for worship and the discussion of merits of old versus new (really, regardless of style). She asks “what should we sing?” She recognizes the conflict, noting that “Some congregations cherish the old, familiar hymns. Others relish fresh new language and tunes.” Indeed, the differences are likely at the individual level and not congregational! But she continues with a point equally important, regardless. “We all likely need both. When singing hymns that are familiar, we have opportunities to be transported by the music itself since we don't have to think too much about learning the tune and text. Many of us even have the tune and text of a very familiar hymn memorized, so that we may sing from deep within our souls. On the other hand, when singing hymns that are new, we have opportunities for God's spirit to provide new insights into the very nature of God and God's church.”

Ms. McNair shares a new Lenten hymn in her on-line piece. Its format suggests a traditional style, but the new words are very relevant to our times. She reproduces (from www.bit.ly/shepherdhymns) a “new Lenten hymn, written in October 2017 by J. Barrie Shepherd, retired senior minister from First Presbyterian Church in New York City. This hymn (is) called “Deep in the Heart of Winter” ...”

*“Deep in the heart of winter, when days seem cold and bleak,
Our faith calls us to enter this space of seven weeks.
We turn to prayer and fasting, take scripture as our guide,
Prepare our souls for Easter, and joyful Eastertide.*

*A time of deep reflection, a time to search the heart.
Yet more than introspection calls us to do our part.
We turn our thoughts to others, our kin both far and near,
Our families, sisters, brothers, the ones we hold most dear.*

*Our prayers reach further out now, and think of all whose needs
Cry out for our attention, yearn for our faithful deeds.
The sick, the poor, the hungry, all those who are oppressed,
Those folk our Savior taught us to see as truly blessed.*

*So mark these days as holy, our truly Lenten time.
 Let every seeking soul be restored, renewed, refined.
 Till in our Savior's footsteps, beneath his cross we pray,
 Then meet him in the garden, rejoice on Easter Day."*

As worshippers reflect on these words, regardless of the tune and the style, the message of Lent calls them not only to faithful introspection but also to service and outreach ministry. It seems those are the important points! The message speaks past the medium!

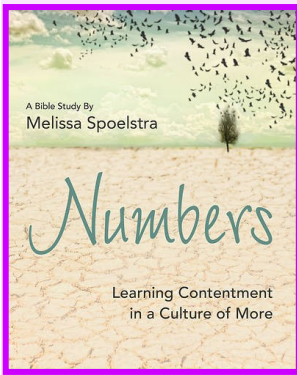

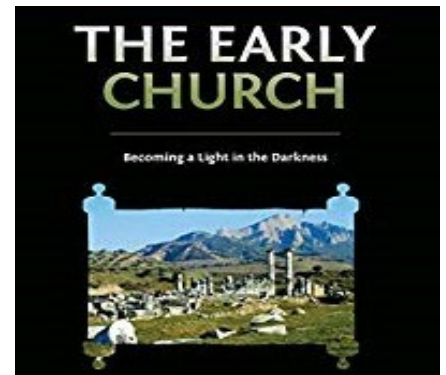

Vision 2020 Update

The Vision 2020 Update Group (Leigh Bergemann, Diane Childress, Amy Louthan, Charlie Nitschke, David Reames, and Jeff Wallace) have had their first meeting. The group's objective is to recommend updates and revisions to Holy Trinity's Vision and Mission Statements to Church Council.

If you have not already done so, please read the Pastor's letter (hardcopy dated 2/21/2020; also sent as e-mail on 2/24/2020) and the document attached to it for background on this effort.

This work is a continuation of the work Holy Trinity began during Lent of 2018 – our "Spiritual and Practical Journey of Prayer." Some 35 to 40 of us met together after our weekly Lenten Soup Suppers that year and gave some thought to changes in our church, our community, and our world and to what those changes might mean for Holy Trinity's ministry and service as we move into our second century. This work was good information for our Pastoral Search and Call process. Now we are turning more to the matter of future direction for our ministry. This is a priority not only for us based on our 2018 start on this journey but also to Pastor Scottie as he has shared with us several times in his sermons.

The first step is to review our Vision and Mission Statements. The Update Group will propose new documents in draft form in April. More will be shared about those documents in the coming weeks. After that, the Council and Committees will devote some time to assessing what ministries match up with current needs as well as with our current callings and capabilities. While the world and our church are changing, we are firm in our belief that God is not finished with us yet. There is much ministry yet to be done. There will be lots of communication about this as well as opportunities for input. Stay tuned!

In the meantime, the Update Group would echo Pastor Scottie's call for all our members to be in serious, earnest prayer for our church, for its future, and for discernment of God's plan for ministries as we continue to serve Him in 2020 and beyond.
