From the Interim Pastor....

As a pastor, I really don't have much opportunity for sleeping in church.

You see, as a Host Congregation for Family Promise, our congregation is responsible for providing not only a place for families to stay, but also for evening meals, evening hosts, overnight hosts, and folks to do laundry and set up and take down the cots. **To provide all this for a week involves at least 41 persons!** This week we will have done it with **26**. This is not because we are so efficient, rather because we had so few people to sign up. As one of the 26, I had the opportunity (yes, opportunity!) to spend the night in the church. I also had the opportunity to look over the schedule sheet and note a lot of duplication as a few folks have carried a large part of the responsibility for this Congregational Program.

Nobody doubts the value of this program and we all want Holy Trinity to continue as a host congregation. With the church building that we have, it would be a waste not to. Folks, this level of volunteer support cannot sustain the program. It is as simple as that. I'm not sure you all may have been aware of this -- now you are. What will happen if the next time we are scheduled we cannot staff the slots in the schedule? Where will our guests go? You know what to do, and when to do it.

News from our ... Church Council

Holy Trinity Lutheran Church
Summary of Council Meeting Minutes
April 8, 2019
Page 1 of 2

Pastor's Report:

The requests for transfer of membership to Holy Trinity by Ron Dievert, Anita Dievert, and Jon Glauer were approved by Council. The request for transfer of membership from Holy Trinity to Bethel Lutheran Church, Manassas,, VA by Rilla Schultz was approved. Pastor has spoken with David Hrivnak concerning a charging station at the church.

Policy for Prevention of Abuse to Children and Family Promise: Jon Peters, the Outreach Chair and a Family Promise Board member, feels that the current policy should not include volunteers for Family Promise. Jon and the Outreach committee members contend volunteers do not deal directly with the children and it is the parent's responsibility to care for and maintain control of their children. Jon stated he did not think volunteers would be willing to take the training offered to comply with our policy for prevention of abuse to children. After much healthy discussion (one hour in length) it was decided the Best Practice is to have volunteers participate in the training class – this class is only 2 hours in length and Laura Mitchell said she would make it fun! An alternative to the class is to receive the information from Laura Mitchell, read it on your own and return the signed form to Laura Mitchell. This is not only a protection for the children, but also, a protection for the volunteer and our church. This willingness also shows a commitment to the program in which the volunteer is taking part.

Other thoughts about the Family Promise program include:

- Even though the parents are to care for their children if you are a volunteer you are in charge and have the direct responsibility. You do have emergency numbers to call for problems.
- More specific training for Family Promise Volunteers
- The families agree and sign off on the rules and regulations

We need volunteers to continue this program and we hope the additional training will not deter individuals from volunteering but rather make them more comfortable in this setting. Jon Peters will check on the agreement or contract that a family would sign so they can be accepted into this program.

Committee Reports:

Call Committee: We are in the "quiet phase" and awaiting potential candidates from Synod **Stewardship:** Report submitted. Stewardship committee recommends that the Security Task force be reestablished, and a safer security system be installed. Discussion revolved around the need for a safe and secure work environment for our staff and congregation members. Edna Kinner made the motion to proceed with the original recommendation and purchase the surveillance system and monitoring equipment. Diane Childress seconded the motion and Council approved this motion.

Mutual Ministry: Edna Kinner recommended that Janet Thomas be hired as the Part-time Secretary for Holy Trinity. Pastor Bangle agreed with this motion and Council approved her employment. Although Council is responsible for hiring and firing, Janet will be directly supervised by Pastor Bangle.

Prayer: The Quilting Ministry requested a Sunday in which they could ask for a free will offering from the congregation to help buy supplies needed for their ministry. Council approved this request. June 2, 2019 will be the Quilter's Sunday. Persons wishing to donate one-half yard or more of 100% cotton fabric may do so.

Property: Council ratified the email vote approving the bid from AAA 1 to replace the #3 HVAC unit and approved the project to be funded as a capital project from the DeBusk Bequest. The Property Committee recommendation to replace the doors at the Narthex entrance and add a panic bar to one of the Prayer Chapel doors was approved by Council and this project would be funded as a capital project from the DeBusk Bequest. Property Committee recommended the replacement of the sewer pump and Council approved this need and asked that Martin Schick use the appropriate funds for this replacement.

Worship and Music: The Committee recommended the purchase 50 Renew Song Books for \$650.00. They have adequate funds to do this within their budget and will receive an email from Martin Schick advising them regarding this request.

Old Business:

Nomination Committee – 3 individuals are willing to run for Council – waiting on other replies. 7 or 8 members are requested for the ballot.

New Business: Communications to Council

- Whitney Nussman request to use the Gathering Room and Kitchen on Friday, June 7, 6-10 PM and Saturday, June 8, 8 AM 5 PM was approved.
- Council approved the use of the building for the Easter Egg Hunt on April 20th
- Based on recommendations from the Bishop's office, the Council will extend Pastor Bangle's current contract on a month-by-month basis. We will revisit the contract terms in late August if we do not have strong pastoral candidates in the pipeline. Pastor Bangle is fully supportive of the recommendation.

The More You Know...

This month Worship and Music Committee continues its series of <u>Trumpet</u> articles covering a variety of topics on symbols, colors, design/architecture, traditions, seasons, and festivals that many of us either don't think about very often or perhaps are not sure of the significance of these things. In the May article, we will continue reflection on Easter, reflecting particularly on the cross as a part of our worship and our identity as well as discuss Ascension.

The Easter Season Ascension

Easter Day (or, Easter Sunday) marks the beginning of another 40-day season of the church, the Easter Season. During this time, our worship will focus on the post-resurrection teachings of Jesus as he points the disciples toward their future in a world that will never be the same, a world changed by the cross and by the resurrection.

For us, these weeks of Easter offer a time to reflect on the cross as a symbol of what we believe and indeed of who we are. Prior to that first Easter, the cross was a symbol – more than a symbol – a <u>means</u> of death, a tool for execution. But Easter changed that for Christians. While the cross forever reminds us of Jesus' death, it also forever reminds us of His eternal-life-giving sacrifice of His perfection to atone for our sin. And as such, we are truly marked by and with the cross of Christ forever! That mark is first made for us at the time of our baptism. We commemorate that in many ways in worship, of course.

But the cross is also a part of our physical presence in the community, our presence at 800 Broad Street in Kingsport, in many ways and for many reasons. The sign that identifies us as Holy Trinity Lutheran Church has a large wooden cross incorporated into it. That cross proclaims to all that we are unmistakably a Christian church because it proclaims the death and associated resurrection of our Lord. Just like the sign, it helps to identify Holy Trinity as a gathering place for all believers.

The newest cross – the large cross atop our roof – also proclaims who we are to the community. And you can see it without being on Broad Street between Sevier and Ravine. It stands high in the air, proudly proclaiming our identity as part of the body of Christ. And isn't it ironic that a cross, once a shameful symbol of death for criminals, can now offer a proud proclamation of Christian identity? That is miraculous on its own! This cross really completes our building – which, with its unusual shape doubtless has caused some to wonder what the facility might be as they approach. With the cross atop it, the purpose of our building is clear to all – we are a church of followers of the Lord Jesus, crucified and risen! It speaks that



message 24/7 as you drive the streets nearby and even as you look out of some of the rooms of the hospital.

Another cross that is important in our worship life is the Processional Cross as it sits in its pedastal shining out over our congregation each time we enter in. At times, it is carried in and placed in the sanctuary for worship. Once again this cross reminds us of who we are, whose we are, and how that relationship came to be.

Finally, Holy Trinity is blessed with a beautiful and unique cross in our sanctuary, suspended in the large open space above the altar. The eye is drawn to this cross as you enter the worship space. It is beautiful but is also highly symbolic of God reconciling humanity to Himself.

- The basic shape of the cross reminds us of the death of Christ and His subsequent resurrention.
- The circle in the center symbolizes the completeness of God (Father, Son and Holy Spirit) on the cross for the whole world.

- The "sunbursts" represent what the Gospel is. The wires pointing towards earth represent God's reach to man while the wires pointing upwards represent man's reach heavenward towards God. Their meeting place is only on the cross.
- The vine, which covers the entire cross, is the seed of life which is planted and becomes full grown. "I am the vine, you are the branches." Even in death, there is life over and through the cross.
- At the points of the cross are the shields and symbols of the four Gospel writers:
 - o Matthew a winged man emphasizing the human nature of Christ
 - Mark a winged lion stressing Christ's Kingship
 - Luke a winged ox representing the priestly character of Christ's ministry
 - o John a winged eagle representing the Spirit which was always with Christ

These crosses, and many others, are a part of our worship and a part of our life as Christians. The Sundays of Easter might be a good time to take a walking tour around our facility and look at these crosses and reflect on them.

Late in May – May 30 to be exact – we will celebrate the **Ascension of our Lord.** On the 40th day after Easter, our Lord ascended into heaven <u>completing the work of our redemption</u>. Like Christ's immaculate Nativity and like His resurrection from the dead, His Ascension is a miracle beyond human comprehension, a powerful convergence of the absolute and eternal with the realm of the relative and temporal.

At the end of forty days, during which time Jesus appeared to numerous people including His disciples on several occasions, our Lord took the disciples to the Mount of Olives. There He laid His hand upon them and commanded them concerning the preaching and teaching of the nations: "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." Then, as He stepped away from them, He lifted His hands and blessed them, and then He ascended to the heavens until He was hidden from all human eyes.

What a triumph on earth! In spite of the fact that they were accustomed to all the miracles of our Lord, however, the sight was so astonishing to the disciples that it is not known how long they would have remained standing and gazing had the angels not encouraged them: "Men of Galilee, why do you stand here looking into the sky? This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen him go into heaven."

Christ did not abandon us as He ascended into heaven. The Ascension holds within it the approaching miracle of Pentecost, the descent of the Holy Spirit. That will be considered next month....

May 5th is Justin's last Sunday as organist and May 12th is Patrick's last Sunday as pianist. A reception in their honor will follow the May 12th service (in the Gathering Room). They both recently performed their senior recitals. Below are their bio's provided in their recital programs. HTLC has been truly blessed by these very talented young men.

Patrick Rice

is a senior piano performance major studying under Dr. Esther Park at ETSU. He transferred there from Southern Adventist University (SAU) in the fall of 2017. Prior to college, from 2005-2015 during his study with Alayne Griffin, he participated in the National Federation of Music Clubs Junior Music Festival, Guild Auditions, CMTA Auditions (2014-2015), and the TMTA State competition (2014-2015), consistently receiving superior ratings. In addition, during his senior year of high school he was a winner of the Chattanooga Music Club Scholarship and a winner of the SAU Concerto Competition. He began taking lessons from Dr. Sin-Hsing Tsai at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga (UTC) during his senior year of high school. It was during her tutelage that Patrick decided to major in music in college. During his first two years of college at SAU Patrick studied piano with Dr. Peter Cooper. Patrick also began studying organ with Judy Glass in January 2016. This led to the opportunity to play in a masterclass given by Nathan Laube, associate professor of organ at Eastman School of Music. Recently he was again a winner of the SAU Concerto Competition and played the first movement of the Guilmant Organ Symphony No. 1 with their orchestra in January 2018. While at SAU Patrick had the opportunity to play a piano quintet concert, give a solo recital and joint sophomore piano recital, and be a guest artist for the UTC Piano Extravaganza Concert honoring the memory of Dr. Sin-Hsing Tsai in March 2017. At ETSU he performed his junior recital, played in several other recitals, and played his senior recital on April 28. In his spare time, Patrick enjoys spending time with friends and family and being outdoors.

Justin Brueggeman

is currently a senior at Science Hill High School and dual enrollment student East Tennessee State University in Johnson City, TN. He began his piano studies in 2009 in Midland, Michigan, and has performed in adjudicated events sponsored by The National Federation of Music Clubs, The National Guild of Piano Teachers, and the Tennessee Music Teachers Association, In Johnson City, TN, Justin studied piano with Dr. Benjamin Caton, chair of the piano department at East Tennessee State University, and currently studies organ with Dr. Joby Bell, professor of organ at Appalachian State University. He has participated in master classes and lessons with Janette Fishell, Mark Thallander, Timothy Olsen, and Kimberly Marshall. As an active recitalist, Justin has played recitals throughout East Tennessee as well as in Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina, Maryland, New Jersey, Washington and Michigan. In 2017, he performed the Saint-Saëns Organ Symphony along with the Symphony of the Mountains Youth Orchestra and made his European debut in Medias, Romania, performing in the 17th annual *Orgelsommer* International Organ festival as the youngest organist to have performed in the festival's history. Justin has competed in national organ competitions in North and South Carolina, including the Columbia AGO Chapter Competition, where he placed 3rd (2018), and the East Carolina University Young Artist's Organ Competition, where he placed 3rd and 2nd (2017) and 2018, respectively). Justin's 2019 recital schedule includes performances in St. Petersburg, Fla, Bronxville, N.Y., Boston, Mass., as well as performances in London, England and Medias and Brasov, Romania.

Justin is a member of the American Guild of Organists, and the National Pastoral Association of Pastoral Musicians, from which he holds the Organ Certificate. As the youngest board member of the American Guild of Organists Young Organists (AGOYO), Justin has been serving as an officer in the Southeast Chapter of AGOYO since 2016. In fall, Justin plans to study at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, where he will major in biochemistry/pre-med and minor in organ performance.
