

From the (Interim) Pastor....

Spoiler Alert! This article contains the "S" word. Yep, I'm talking about Stewardship! And while we're at it, the "P" word – Pledging. These words, used mostly in church, have gotten a bad rap. When we hear them, we instinctively grab our wallets and checkbooks and run.

Not so fast, folks. This is serious. Money hits at the core of who we are. While stewardship means management and refers to all of life, that also includes money. Jesus speaks often of money and so must we. A wise man once said, "Don't tell me about your values; show me your budget." Jesus said, "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." (Matthew 6:21).

For most of us, our finances are the most intimate of our secrets. However, as a pastor, my income has been widely known for most of my adult life. So has my lifestyle. For years I replaced a black SUV with another similar one to avoid the remark, "Looks like we're paying the pastor too much." I'm sure it was only a joke, but I didn't laugh. Pastors have hesitated to preach or write about stewardship for fear of it being seen as a self -serving way to get a raise. Being an Interim Pastor frees me to witness personally about this personal subject.

My giving is not in response to need, rather it is from Commitment. We tithe 10% to the church because God has gifted us with a generous heart. It is one of the gifts of the Spirit not often emphasized. (see Romans 12:8). God has also gifted us with financial resources. So we do not "pledge" to the budget, rather we commit from what we have. I tithe to Holy Trinity (where I cannot vote) and to Grace (where I seldom attend) and to Sharon (where they don't even have a budget!). It ends up being over \$700 each month. I tell you this not to boast, rather as a witness in the hope that you will have a family discussion around giving from commitment.

In the congregation of my youth, the pastor handed out the offering plates with the admonition, "As God has blessed us, so let us give." That pretty much sums it up.

Summary of Minutes Holy Trinity Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes September 10, 2018

Financial Reports:

Jeff Bedford provided a satisfactory report of the audit performed on the 2017 financial records. Martin Schick reminded committee chairs that budgets are due mid-October so the 2019 budget can be formatted.

Staff Reports:

Pastor Bangle would like to present "Healthy Congregation Workshop" and discussion of possible dates is in progress. November 10 was selected but Evensong rehearsal is taking place on that date.

Calendar Review:

Schedule is busy for the next couple months.

Sunday VBS begins Sept. 16, continues on Oct. 21 and Nov. 18. Family Promise – Sept 30-Oct.6 Oktoberfest – Oct. 12 Flu Shot Clinic – Oct. 28

Committee Reports:

Mutual Ministry – Gift presentation for Marie Baker will be coordinated by Edna Kinner. Meet-and-greet for Janet Thomas, our new temp. PT Administrative Assistant, will occur later.

Outreach – New Family Promise volunteers, and especially welcomed overnight hosts, will be oriented to duties.

Property – The motor of the office HVAC required replacement.

Worship and Music – Continuing education funds for music staff are being investigated by both Mutual Ministry and W&M.

Youth - Confirmation classes underway and dinner are welcomed.

Security Task Force – A recommendation to Council that \$2000 be provided for an 8 channel surveillance system with 4 cameras and monitoring equipment to be installed by HTLC volunteers. Discussion of this recommendation and the lack of estimates for installation of panic bars/door replacement resulted in motion to have requests for these upgrades to security be included as a line item in the 2019 budget.

Communication to Council:

Non-HTLC members have been observed using the member code to enter the building. Discussion followed regarding length of time for the current code. A request to the Audio-Visual Committee to decide what action may be needed.

Old Business:

Immanuel Anniversary Gift – Money has been sent to ELCA.

Inclement Weather Policy – Members are to use their best judgment concerning travel from their various locations.

Worship Services will **not** be cancelled.

Youth activities will follow Kingsport City School closure policy.

Council President and committee chairs will make decision regarding meetings and then notify members.

New Business:

Call Committee – Names were reviewed evaluating for diversity of age, culture, gender, children in family, and length of time in congregation; active membership, and trust of congregation to make sound decisions. Once the committee is complete, information will be shared with the congregation.



October 20, 2018 is World Osteoporosis Awareness Day

Osteoporosis Information:

- Osteoporosis is a common medical condition.
- Osteoporosis is a bone disease in which the bones of the body become fragile and brittle and break easily.
- The body is constantly absorbing and replacing bone tissue.
- In Osteoporosis the replacement of new bone tissue doesn't keep up with old bone removal. As we age bone mass is lost faster than the body can make it.
- Osteoporosis affects both men and women. Especially affected are older, white and Asian females post menopausal.
- Having a small body frame whether male or female is considered a risk factor for osteoporosis. Having a family history of either a parent or sibling who has experienced a hip fracture is considered a risk factor for osteoporosis.
- Osteoporosis can be diagnosed by having a bone density test.
- Osteoporosis can't be cured, but it can be treated. Medications, a healthy diet, and weight
 -bearing exercises can help prevent bone loss and strengthen weak bones.

The More You Know

This month Worship and Music Committee continues its series of <u>Trumpet</u> articles covering a variety of topics on symbols, colors, design/architecture, traditions, seasons, and festivals that many of us either don't think about very often or perhaps are not sure of the significance of these things. This month's article is a history lesson that is very seasonal as we enter October!

Martin Luther

95 Theses

Reformation

Just who was Martin Luther? What are the "95 Theses" and why are they important? What was the Reformation? With Reformation Sunday just a few weeks away, these questions are significant in our Lutheran heritage and are timely in the month of October.

In 1517, Martin Luther was a 34-year-old Roman Catholic priest. He had been a lawyer before becoming an Augustine Monk. He studied the Bible extensively and saw the word of God in a very different way than church leaders of that day saw it. The church had developed its own theology apart from the Bible. In Luther's time, the church was very different from the church of today. The Catholic Church was the only church. The Bible was not accessible in the common man's language. Church services were conducted in Latin. The church was rooted in rituals and laws. People were required to pay (literally!) for their sins to gain forgiveness. In Luther's time, the church sold indulgences (signed pieces of paper that entitled the holder to forgiveness) as a form of penance. The penitent person was told that he could actually purchase his or her way out of Purgatory through this process. It was also possible, according to church officials, to release the souls of the dead from Purgatory by purchasing indulgences!

Martin Luther became disenchanted with the Roman Catholic Church and started to write a complaint that ended up being a list of 95 abuses he saw in the Catholic Church. He challenged the practice of indulgences and other church teachings and practices in his "95 Theses" (a thesis is a position on an issue or a stand that a person is willing to debate). Luther challenged the right of the Pope to forgive sins because he knew that only God has the power to forgive sins. On October 31, 1517 (the eve of All Saints' Day), Luther posted the "95 Theses" to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. Back then, church doors were commonly used as bulletin boards to post topics for debate. And the common practice was to nail such postings to the door.

What Martin Luther didn't know, when he pounded the nails into the door that day, was that he was changing the course of history – it was the dawning of the Reformation. He intended to begin a debate on what he considered questionable church practices. Things did not work out that way! Luther was charged with heresy, and the Roman church vehemently asked him to withdraw his objections. Luther took his stand and refused to back down so he was excommunicated from the church and declared an outlaw. The debate he intended to start instead became the roots of the transformation of the Christian Church. Germans, anxious to sever their Roman ties, widely accepted his reformation ideas thus propelling him to lead the Reformation movement in Western Europe, changing the course of history!

Reformation actually means "the act of reforming or the state of being reformed; a change from worse to better". Today people associate the word "Reformation" (capital R) with this 16th century religious movement that began as Luther's attempt to reform the Roman Catholic Church and resulted in the creation of the Protestant churches. Interestingly, Martin Luther never intended that his followers take his name. The name "Lutheran" was actually contrived by his enemies and was meant to be a mark of contempt. Instead, it was adopted as a badge of honor – one that our denomination continues to claim today.

The celebration of Reformation Sunday this year will be on October 28. Our paraments and banners will be red on this day. The significance of the colors will be discussed later – but be sure you wear red on October 28!



Tri-Cities Memory Gardens Mausoleum Properties Available for Sale to HTLC Members





The HTLC Council was recently made aware of this donation and unanimously agreed to pursue the following options in the order listed:

Option 1. Offer to sell the properties to HTLC members (Timeline: July-December 2018),

Option 2. If no HTLC members are interested in purchasing the properties, we will offer to sell them to the public (Timeline: January-June 2019),

Funds from the sale of these properties will be placed in the HTLC General Fund and used as designated by Council.







Choral Evensong: A Thriving Tradition

With traditional worship declining world-wide, and pipe organs being exchanged for digital keyboards, many claim that the church is on a steady decline. Yet, if one attends an Evensong at Westminster Abbey or St. Thomas Fifth Avenue, they will find themselves to be in good company. At such well-known churches, it is not unusual to wait in line to attend these services. So what draws such interest to the service of Choral Evensong? The most notable distinction between a regular Sunday service and Evensong is the music being sung. The structure of the Evensong service requires greater involvement from the choir in addition to the usual anthem and hymns. In turn, the congregation follows a more passive role, listening to the sung prayers, responses, and scripture. Stemming from ancient Anglican traditions, Evensong developed from a combination of Vespers and Compline, two of the services from the eight Daily Offices practiced by the Roman Catholic church since the Middle Ages. A very structured service, every Evensong has many of the same parts. Introits followed by Preces/ Responses, Scripture, and universal texts for the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis. Again, we ask the question: what draws such interest to the service of Choral Evensong? From the congregation's perspective, Choral Evensong is an ideal end to a stressful week and eventful weekend; listening to choral music and scripture soothes the soul. From the choir's perspective, being able to share in such divine music with a group of other like-minded singers, is a privilege. In our choir, we will have members from First Broad Street United Methodist, First Presbyterian Kingsport, and Covenant Presbyterian Johnson City; we are worshiping not just as Lutherans, not just as Christians, but as a community! We have answered our twice-asked question. What draws such interest to the service of Choral Evensong? Community.

If you have a free afternoon on Sunday November 11, I invite you all to come at 2:30pm to hear a masterful organ recital, followed by a beautiful service of Choral Evensong.


