Summary Holy Trinity Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes August 13, 2018

Financial Reports:

Signature cards on four accounts at First Tennessee Bank were updated by Martin Schick and Brenda Mooneyhan will continue to manage the Memorials account.

Staff Reports:

Pastor Bangle continues to visit members. Arrangements for confirmation classes are underway. He reported on how smoothly the Ed Hansen funeral service arrangements went due to the "above and beyond time commitment" of Sue Morgan and Marie Baker and noted the live-streaming by a family member's cell phone was possible due to WIFI.

Calendar Review:

Pastor Bangle noted attendance at Immanuel Lutheran Church 225th Anniversary and that he met with Bishop Gordy who asked about progress.

Study Group will hold a meeting in Fellowship Hall on September 13.

Committee Reports: Written reports were received prior to the meeting.

Mutual Ministry - Succession planning for finance officers underway.

Outreach –Upcoming meeting will include discussion of Family Promise program and staffing for this program.

Worship & Music – Committee submitted a recommendation (and the issues that support this recommendation) for a single service schedule for the duration of our Interim Pastor for multiple reasons including long commute of both pastors, inclement weather for the commutes increases, and the 50% reduction in cost for musicians and clergy. After discussion Amy Louthan made the motion to continue the current single service schedule (with alternating styles) for the duration of our Interim Pastor, with Christmas, Easter and Reformation services using traditional style. Edna Kinner seconded this motion. Motion carried with a vote count of 13 in agreement and 1 abstention. Pastor Ridenhour will continue to be Pastor Bangle's back up throughout this interim period. Appreciation of Joy Wood and her leadership throughout this time was noted by the Council.

Youth -Confirmation classes will begin, Wednesday, September 5th at 5:30 pm.

WELCA –166 Disaster Relief Kits were assembled and will be delivered by Carolyn Chandler to Greenville at the end of this month.

Old Business:

Spiritual & Practical Journey of Prayer - Still waiting on some committees input.

Security Team – Will meet soon and have recommendations for Council that might require budget to implement these recommendations.

Gift Ratification – Paul Castille made the motion to ratify the proposal to provide an Anniversary Gift to ELCA Disaster Response in honor of Immanuel Lutheran Church which was seconded by Amy Louthan and unanimously approved by Council.

New Business:

Inclement weather policy — Pastor Bangle suggested that service not be cancelled, but rather, all members of congregation use their best judgement concerning traveling in inclement weather. Youth activities usually follow county school closure policies and committee chairs should make the decision regarding their meetings or activities and then notify participants. This policy will be further discussed at our next Council meeting.

Call Committee — All Council Members had the opportunity to submit names for the Call Committee. Discussion ensued regarding the make-up of this very important committee and next month after continued thought and prayer we may have the potential slate of names. The names and list remain confidential.

Communications to Council: Holy Trinity's add in the paper is incorrect. Sue Rasmussen will call the Times/News and check on it.

Wellness for My Soul Health Presentation

September 30, 2018, 12 noon - 1pm In the Fellowship Hall

A few months ago at a Stewardship Committee meeting, we discussed the broader spectrum of "stewardship" beyond just the usual issues of finances. We speak of "time and talents" but there is also stewardship of other gifts God has given us, such as our bodies and health and also the world around us, to consider a few. Paul writes in his letter to the Corinthians: "Do you not know that your bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not you own; you were bought at a price. Therefore honor God with your bodies."

So how is it with your health? Are you well? The words of a song come to mind:

September is National Cholesterol Education Awareness Month

Cholesterol Information:

- Cholesterol is a waxy substance found in the fats of the blood.
- The liver manufactures 80% of cholesterol found in the body. The other 20% of cholesterol in our body is obtained from our dietary intake of meat, poultry, eggs, fish, and diary products.
- Cholesterol is not inherently bad.
- We need cholesterol for cell membrane and hormone formation.
- Too much cholesterol or a high cholesterol level is a major risk factor for heart disease, stroke, and peripheral vascular disease.
- High cholesterol can be inherited, but often it is a result of an unhealthy lifestyle of choices.
- A blood test is the only way to detect a high cholesterol level.
- It is recommended to obtain testing after the age of 20 with repeat testing every 5 years or more often depending on your physician's recommendation.

The More You Know...

This month the Worship and Music Committee begins a series of <u>Trumpet</u> articles that will cover a variety of topics on symbols, colors, design/architecture, traditions, seasons, and festivals that many of us either don't think about very often or perhaps are not sure of the significance of these things. Some months we will address seasonal topics (such as things related to Christmas or Pentecost), and other months (like this first one) we will comment on more general topics (such as our windows, our crosses, our paraments, etc.).

The concept and indeed much of the material was first introduced by Worship and Music, under the leadership of Brenda Mooneyhan, in 2002. With thanks to Brenda and with her blessing, we will utilize some of that material and add some updates and additional topics.

Sanctuary Nave Chancel Narthex

Familiar words? Parts or architectural features of our church, right? But what do those names mean? Sanctuary is often used to refer to the worship space (even Webster defines it as "the room in which general worship services are held"), but the term is actually more specific than that. By another, more precise definition, the sanctuary is the most sacred part of a religious building. In Christian churches, it is where the altar is placed. In our church, that would be the highest raised platform area on which the altar sits. In the medieval church, the sanctuary was shut off from the congregation and was as inaccessible as the Holy of Holies in the Temple of the Old Testament. The sanctuary of the Renaissance church, however, is before us and not behind a curtain, helping us feel nearer to God and filling our hearts with joy.

The next "level" is known as the chancel. The term was used in England before the Reformation when this area of the church used to be separated from the nave by rails. It is the area of the church that encompasses the altar and which contains the seats for the clergy, the worship assistants and (in many churches) the choir. (Some churches refer to their choir as the "Chancel Choir" because that is where the choir sits!)

The nave is the large, central part of a church, extending from the narthex to the chancel and flanked by aisles. It includes the pews and is where worshippers sit, stand, and kneel during the services.

Finally, at the rear of the nave, where most worshippers enter, is the narthex. A narthex can also be called any number of things from a portico (a colonnade or covered ambulatory often at the entrance of a building) to a vestibule (a passage, hall or room between the outer door and the interior of a building) to a lobby which leads to the nave of the church. In our church, it's a place where worshippers transition from the outside or the Gathering Room to the quieter worship space of the nave.

For completeness, there is one additional part or architectural feature that is common in many churches – the transepts. Beginning in the Middle Ages, many churches were built in the shape of a cross. The vertical timber of the cross would begin at the narthex entrance to the nave and extend all the way to the sanctuary. The horizontal timber would cut across the vertical at the front of the nave just before the chancel and create two seating areas to the left or right that would appear to the arms of the cross. These are sometimes used for additional seating for worshippers or may be used for choir seating, organ console, etc. The great cathedrals of Europe such as Westminster Abbey as well as a number of large churches in this country are in this shape. Holy Trinity's current design does not include the cross shape or transepts; the previous worship space (the one that faced Sevier Avenue) was, however, shaped like a cross with transepts.


Tri-Cities Memory Gardens Mausoleum Properties Available for Sale to HTLC Members

In August 1978, three mausoleum properties located at Tri-Cities Memory Gardens were donated to HTLC with a current total value estimate at \$15,480.00 (one single unit = \$6,490 and one double unit = \$8,990). The HTLC Council was recently made aware of this donation and unanimously agreed to pursue the following options in the order listed:

Option 1. Offer to sell the properties to HTLC members (Timeline: July-December 2018),
Option 2. If no HTLC members are interested in purchasing the properties, we will offer to sell them to the public (Timeline: January-June 2019),

Funds from the sale of these properties will be placed in the HTLC General Fund and used as designated by Council.



Finding cures. Saving children.

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital is well known to most Holy Trinity members. Our own Brady Nussman was a St. Jude patient, and each year many of you participate in and/or contribute to Brady's Bunch, the team bearing his name in annual St. Jude Walk/Run to End Childhood Cancer. This year, the walk will be Saturday, September 15 at the Pinnacle in Bristol. Registration/ check in begins at 7AM, with the walk beginning at 8AM. In addition to the website information, there will also be a Walk/Run Kickoff Party for Kingsport at the Farmer's Market on Friday, August 10 from 5 to 7PM. There will be lots of information about St. Jude, opportunities to form or join a team, and a host of other treats and surprises – including FREE carousel rides! (Of course, you do not have to attend the Kickoff to participate in the team and the Walk/Run!)

St. Jude is unlike any other medical facility. 




