### Reporting on a summary of the diocesan listening session

Fr. Frank

"I prefer a church which is bruised, hurting, and dirty because it has been out on the streets doing good work rather than a church which is unhealthy from being confined and from clinging to its own security." Pope Francis, 2013

These are the words that Bishop Jennifer chose to frame the results of the diocesan-wide Listening Sessions that were held with her from June – October 2017. The purpose of the sessions were to:

Provide opportunity for community building across the diocese

Provide opportunity and occasion for the Bishop to meet with and listen to a broad variety of constituents across the diocese with regard to their hopes, dreams, concerns, and needs

Gather important data by which Bishop Jennifer and the Executive Council can shape decision making for the future of the diocese.

Sessions were held in the various geographic areas of our diocese inviting lay participation, and key constituents gathered centrally (lay leadership, youth, priests, deacons, and Bishop's staff). In all:

10 sessions were held

Participants included: Laity, lay leaders, youth, priests, deacons, Bishop's staff

Almost 400 participants

Engaged in conversation with the Bishop around the present and future work of the diocese, by addressing three questions to stimulate conversation and listening:

What excites you about this work?
What hurdles may get in the way of this work?

What do you need from the Bishop and the Bishop's staff to do this work?

### **Vestry has October meeting**

**Vestry Members Present**: Natalie Palmer, Celeste Sheets-Eaton, Phil Sowders, Greg Staab, Jeff Weir, Angie Wilkinson. Priest-in-Charge Frank Impicciche and Vestry Clerk Dale Caldwell were also present.

Vestry Members Absent: None

### **Consent Agenda**

Minutes from September Meeting September Financial Statement Approved unanimously.

### **Feedback from Congregation**

Congregation-wide workdays. Possibility of local men's group to help with tasks that are more physical; Altar Guild workdays could include additional people for the many tasks that need to be accomplished.

A request came in from a member who wonders if we can resume the 8:00 Sunday service with a lay minister. Fr. Frank feels there currently is not a need for two services given the size of the parish and to fill a particular pastoral need. Once he becomes full-time, Fr. Frank said he will re-evaluate the needs of the congregation and assess worship needs to determine what is best for the community of the parish. The Vestry backs this approach.

### **Old Business**

- Kitchen Water Heater is on borrowed time. Has reached normal lifespan 10 years old. Jeff Weir moved, Greg Staab seconded, that St. Matt's commit to buy a new water heater. Part of the process will be to research the size of the main water supply line and see if there an interior water supply shut-off valve. Passed unanimously.
- There was some leftover concrete/construction materials from recent Boy Scout sidewalk project; its removal should take place soon.

- Community Day debriefing: about 100 people attended; 20 or so from community at large. The remainder were from the congregation and vendors. Good response from ARPO, Eastgate Christian Church/Still Waters, Florek; they want to continue partnership. We need to take advantage of and be more creative with social media. Revive ox roast as part of Community Day? Needs: more food. Should there be a shorter time frame? Pony rides and drum circle were short-lived; retiring soon; one is perhaps a staggered scheduling of major events would be beneficial. Should we have a band a la St. Joan of Arc's French Market?
- 2018 Stewardship Greg shared a proposed 2018 Commitment to Community Card; additional possible categories were discussed; Steve Albrecht has agreed to chair stewardship program.
- St. Matthew's Welcome Center Update positive discussion has begun to coordinate the construction with a Scout project.

Update on Hope Counseling: two counselors are retiring soon; one is in poor health. The future existence of the Center is uncertain.

### **October Financials reported**

Dear friends in Christ,

In reviewing the financial results for October, the only item of significance that varies from historical results is the \$4,900 we spent for an HVAC system for the rectory. We saw a slight catchup in individual contributions for the month, and we see a few of our pledges made annually at year's end. I am conservatively projecting we will have individual contributions for the year of \$125,000.

The vestry has discussed how we transition back to a full time cleric. It's a "chicken and egg" question. How do we continue the good work we have been doing this last two years and do so with more intensity and purpose without a full time priest? How do we hire a full time priest without a higher level of giving? What would we need to "invest" to have a full time priest before the increased giving occurs?

### **New Business**

- The sending of Lay Eucharistic Visitors will be part of Sunday worship at the end; symbolically and actually sent out on behalf of the parish.
- Discussion: what role can Episcopal churches playing a role in the opioid crisis? The Vestry watched a short video produced by the West Virginia Council of Churches about the opioid crisis in that state. It offered the foundation for how churches might become a positive force is dealing with the crisis. The Vestry was asked to pray for discernment on how St. Matthew's might respond.
- Vestry was asked whether they might commit to reading *Reclaiming the Great Commission* or another book?
- Celeste Sheets-Eaton is making cards for St. Matt's veterans to be presented in November. It was recommended we do a pitch-in after services on 11/12. All agreed.

If we assume a consistent level of giving in 2018 and hire Father Frank as our full time priest in charge, we would have a \$36,000 shortfall; if Father Frank increases his hours to full time in July, the shortfall would be \$18,000. As of the end of October, we have \$26,000 in the Founders Fund, \$16,897 in Memorial Funds, \$13,247 in the Centennial Fund and \$1,057 in the Children and Youth Fund (which dates back to when Barb+ Kempf was with us). These funds support the general fund deficit of \$2,240 and provide \$59,106 for us to consider investing in our future by hiring a full time priest.

welcome to join.


