"Episcotinis." "Whiskipalians."

#### Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

Have you ever heard these names and this phrase used before? I know I have on many occasions. I know I have spoke the phrase on a number of occasions over the years. This is partly why this month's newsletter article is very difficult to write, but I firmly believe it needed to be written. In fact, it is a necessity that it be written. We use these titles and phrase about ourselves as Episcopalians, and they are used by outsiders to describe us. These are people who have spent enough time around us to discover that there is a long-standing culture of alcohol consumption associated with the Episcopal Church. To be fair, we are not the only Christian faith that has a permissive culture toward alcohol. I was raised Roman Catholic, and the priest of my parish once announced after the final benediction at Saturday night Mass that there was a keg of beer in the parish hall for anyone wanting to stay after the service. This parish priest eventually had to take a "Sabbatical" to regain his sobriety.

For Episcopalians, having this permissive culture of alcohol usage is a two edged sword. There are those who are attracted to the Episcopal Church because we provide a sharp contrast to other Christian Churches that have "Zero Tolerance" policies toward alcohol consumption both in the church and outside of the church. There are plenty of jokes about some of these churches when they appear to be hypocritical. Not to pick on our Southern Baptist brethren, but an internet search will reveal the common saying; "Muslims do not recognize Jews, Catholics do not recognize Protestants, and Southern Baptists do not recognize each other in a liquor store."

To turn a blind eye and have too lax of an attitude and policies towards alcohol, or no policies at all, is to accept the biblical truth; "You reap what you sow" (Galatians 6:7-9; Job 4:8). If we are committed to saying "anything goes' or 'don't tell me what I can and cannot do" when it comes to the tolerance of alcohol in our midst; then we have to openly admit that we are willing to accept the responsibility of damaging consequences when such an open policy goes awry. As my mother-in-law told me quite frequently; "With adult privileges, comes adult responsibility." We are critical and judgmental of the destruction alcoholism creates in a family system, yet too often turn a blind eye to the destruction alcoholism causes in the church family. We cannot be tolerant of alcoholism in our midst, yet be critical of the destructive behavior, bad behavior, of the alcoholic in our midst. One diocese is dealing with the damaging consequences of alcohol addiction. They have reached out to the rest of The Episcopal Church to warn us of our own peril if we do not repent of our ways. We could, in an instant, end up in the same terrible mess.

Our diocese has had informal policies regarding use of alcohol at church sanctioned events for at least ten years. Because of the tragic event in one of our diocese, a committee met at General Convention last summer and drafted Church-wide alcohol and substance-abuse policies. They were voted upon and passed. They are THE policies of our Church. Our diocesan convention voted in favor of affirming those policies. However, we also agreed to continue a conversation on these policies and draft similar and/or even more stringent measures. Each parish is required to recognize that they have read and understand these policies, regardless of what the final printed policies may be. Our Vestry and I will most likely be required to sign a document stating that we take FULL responsibility of either adhering to those policies or taking the responsibility for ignoring them to our own detriment. I would state that many of these policies are common sense rules, but we don't always follow common sense. Within this newsletter is the actual policies themselves. I want to hear constructive feedback about them and how we can go about doing a better job of monitoring our culture of alcohol and getting those addicted into counseling and treatment if necessary. I stated that this was a difficult letter to write. I am not advocating we go back to a state of Prohibition, but that we be wiser and smarter about our behavior and attitude toward alcohol. allen+

For anyone who watches the stock market, please keep in mind that St. John's long term investment portfolio is structured to generate "income ". The finance committee and our professional advisors choose very conservative positions for our holdings and need to make very few changes to our portfolio. The market trends only effect the market value of St. John's account ON PAPER. Our income from month to month is what we monitor closely. We depend on the money generated from our portfolio to pay the bills. As you remember, I projected our portfolio annual income for 2016 to be \$90,000 in this year's budget. We manage our stock holdings on that number not the DJIA.



## Our Church & Diocese

### The Episcopal Church Use Of Alcohol At Church Sponsored Events

Adopted at the 78th General Convention of The Episcopal Church Affirmed by the 178th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Indianapolis

- 1. The Church must provide a safe and welcoming environment for all people, including people in recovery.
- 2. All applicable federal, state and local laws should be obeyed, including those governing the serving of alcoholic beverages to minors.
- 3. Some dioceses and congregations may decide not to serve alcohol at events or gatherings. Others may decide to permit a limited use of alcoholic beverages at church-sponsored events. Both can be appropriate if approached mindfully.
- 4. When alcohol is served, it must be monitored and those showing signs of intoxication must not be served. Whenever alcohol is served, the rector, vicar, or priest-in-charge must appoint an adult to oversee its serving. That adult must not drink alcoholic beverages during the time of his or her execution of his or her responsibilities. If hard liquor is served, a certified server is required.
- 5. Serving alcoholic beverages at congregational events where minors are present is strongly discouraged. If minors are present, alcohol must be served at a separate station that is monitored at all times to prevent underage drinking.
- 6. Alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages must be clearly labeled as such. Food prepared with alcohol does not need to be labeled provided the alcohol is completely evaporated by the cooking process; however, it is recommended that even in this case the use of alcohol in cooking be noted on a label.
- 7. Whenever alcohol is served, appealing non-alcoholic alternatives must always be offered with equal prominence and accessibility.
- 8. The serving of alcoholic beverages at church events should not be publicized as an attraction of the event, e.g. "wine and cheese reception," "cocktail party," and "beer and wine tasting."
- 9. Ministries inside or outside of congregations will make certain that alcohol consumption is not the focus of the ministry and that drinking alcohol is not an exclusively normative activity.
- 9. Food must be served when alcohol is present.
- 10. The groups or organizations sponsoring the activity or event at which alcoholic beverages are served must have permission from the clergy or the vestry. Such groups or organizations must also assume responsibility for those persons who might become intoxicated and must provide alternative transportation for anyone whose capacity to drive may be impaired. Consulting with liability insurance carriers is advised.
- 11. Recognizing the effects of alcohol as a mood-altering drug, alcoholic beverages shall not be served when the business of the Church is being conducted.
- 12. Clergy shall consecrate an appropriate amount of wine when celebrating the Eucharist and perform ablutions in a way that does not foster or model misuse.
- 13. We encourage clergy to acknowledge the efficacy of receiving the sacrament in one kind and consider providing non-alcoholic wine.

Being mindful of the emerging legalization of other addictive substances and the increasing rise of addiction, The Episcopal Church provide for the ready availability, implementation, and continuing development of this policy church-wide, in consultation and coordination with Recovery Ministries of The Episcopal Church.

# Cheddar Biscuits

Light, Airy, and Tasty Garlic-Cheese Biscuits



#### **INGREDIENTS**

2 cups biscuit mix

1/2 cup shredded mild Cheddar cheese 2/3 cup milk

4 tablespoons (1/2 stick) butter 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder Parsley flakes, for sprinkling

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Stir together the biscuit mix, Cheddar, and milk until a soft dough forms. Beat with a wooden spoon for about 30 seconds. Spoon onto a greased cookie sheet. Smooth down tops to prevent hard points from forming. Bake for 8 to 10 minutes, until tops are brown. While the biscuits are baking, melt the butter in a pan and stir in the garlic powder. Once the biscuits are done, brush the butter on the tops, sprinkle with parsley flakes, and serve hot. (Optional: sprinkle with salt.)
