## PASTOR TO PEOPLE

Easter is fast approaching, which means special music, confirmation, and egg hunts are appearing on the calendar. All these point the church to the promise of resurrection and new life given to us through the Risen Christ.

The current sermon series and the focus on our United Methodist membership vows has come to an end, but I hope that it has given us all a deeper understanding of what it means for us to be Christian in the United Methodist tradition. It also gives the opportunity to think through how we are to live out our faith in the community of Poteau. How do our prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness impact our relationships with our neighbors? How do these bring focus to our ministries?

Over these past few weeks, my appreciation for all that this congregation does has been affirmed. There are many effective ministries in which a person can and do participate. Yet, at times it seems as if these ministries are isolated from one another, having little connection. Several members have asked about our purpose and mission beyond just being First United Methodist Church or being followers of Christ in this particular congregation. What is our purpose and mission as a congregation? The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church says that it "is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world" (BOD 2008, Paragraph 120). What does that mean for us in Poteau, OK?

To help us discern possible answers, I will be facilitating a six week study on mission and purpose beginning Tuesday, April 14, at 6:15. All are invited, but I especially want to encourage those persons who serve in leadership roles to participate. As we continue to look to our future, perhaps the most important piece is to seek out a purpose and vision of our role in God's work in this community. Again, I believe this to be of such importance, that I anticipate high participation. Please contact the church office by April 9 to register your attendance.

As most of you are aware, I am currently working on a Doctor of Ministry degree from Saint Paul School of Theology. The topic of my thesis is Holy Communion and our participation in the sacrament. I need some feedback after our next communion service and so I would invite you to

### 30-Hour Famine

On April 24 and 25, the youth and their



friends are embarking on a famine experience. Right now, more than 840 million people around the world don't have enough to eat. Annually, more than 9 million children under the age of five die from disease and malnutrition as a result of hunger. But world hunger is 100% preventable and our teens are ready to be a part of the solution.

They will be joining the efforts of hundreds of thousands of young people all over the nation who will set aside the usual "stuff" that fills their daily lives. Instead, they "WILL STARVE FOR FOOD" – the theme for World Vision's 30 Hour Famine this year – by going without food for 30 hours to get a taste of what the world's poorest children and families face everyday. Prior to the event weekend, students raise funds with the knowledge that every \$30 they raise can help feed and care for a child for a month. Groups also are encouraged to perform hands-on service projects during the weekend in order to make a difference in their own community as well.

As part of the Famine, some of the events our teens will do:

1. Host an Ugle Tie & Outfit Contest. They will be on display in the Chapel room off the main sanctuary with milk jugs under each for you to vote with your dollars and coins (checks are accepted, as well). Each penny = one vote. The ugly tie and outfit selected will be worn by Rev. Greg Tener on April 26th, the Sunday following our famine.

2. Hold a Silent Auction. The teens will donate service time in yardwork, housework, babysitting, etc. Church members write in a bid under the service they would like, then on Sunday, April 26th, winners of the services will be announced. If any church members would like to donate an item to the silent auction (art, gift basket, etc.), please bring to church by April 6. The Silent Auction will also be located in the Chapel Room.

3. Build a cardboard city on the church lawn during the weekend of the famine where they will sleep during part of their famine. There will also be other visuals placed around the church during this weekend as an awareness campaign.

4. Have a food scavenger hunt to help our local food pantry and a "Go for Garbage" collection contest to help beautify our community.

5. Some teens have even chosen to approach

people for individual pledges in a personal effort to raise funds for hunger. Their personal goals are based on the knowledge that all it takes is a dollar a day to feed a starving child through the World Vision organization.

### LIVING LORD'S SUPPER DRAMA

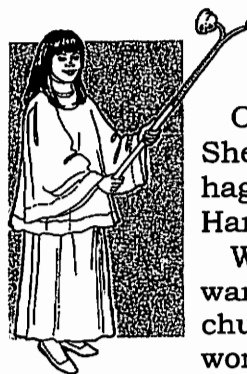

Dear Church Family,

My grandson, Grayson Bradshaw, and I have been on our church prayer list since the Fall of 2006. My spinal tumor condition and Grayson's Stage 4 Neuroblastoma presented grave prognoses.

My surgery and radiation seem to have arrested the tumors, but significant spinal cord damage persists. I have been told that it is remarkable that I can function like I do.

Grayson's surgeries, chemo, and radiation have presently arrested the cancer but with some damage to his growing body. As long as any cancer is undetectable he is receiving an experimental "antibody stimulant" in New York City's Sloan Kettering Hospital for one week every 6 to 8 weeks. This should continue for 18 months.

Recently Dallas Children's Hospital told his mother, Sarah, that they didn't think he would have made it this far.

I want you all to know that because of your commitment to the church in prayer and support, Grayson and I have an unexpected quality of life. The love and support is "worth" as much as the applied modern medicine.

God bless you all and thank you for your continued support.
