In this month of May, many individuals will be celebrating a major milestone in life with a graduation ceremony from high school or college. No doubt many graduation speeches given this month will encourage the graduates to seize opportunities that are now before them and to go forth and change the world for the better in some way.

In his book <u>Coming Together Around What Matters Most</u>, author Thomas J. Bickerton includes a chapter entitled "Seizing the Opportunity Before You". In this chapter, Bickerton shares a story about a time when several clergy families went on vacation together. As they had all gathered at a restaurant for dinner one evening, the debate arose around the table about who should pray the blessing over the food? Should it be one of the clergy? Should a clergy spouse step up and offer the blessing? Or perhaps one of the children? As the debate continued, suddenly a voice said, "I will pray for you." It turns out that the voice belonged to the waitress, who joined hands with the two nearest people in the group and began to pray a prayer of thanksgiving to God for the food she was about to serve them.

When the prayer ended, someone in the group asked her about the courage it took to offer herself in this way. She explained that at her church they encourage the parishioners to be courageous and bold in offering a public witness of their faith. As she heard them debating about who would pray, she thought to herself, "Why not me?" She seized the opportunity and provided a blessing the group will likely not soon forget.

Often, we defer prayer and other acts of public witnessing to those "called" to ministry. Yet everyone of us is "called" to a ministry that bears witness to the love of God in our hearts. This witness may be a well-thought-out strategy or a simple, spontaneous prayer or action.

Ask God today to give you the courage to increase your public witness. Be looking for those times when you can seize an opportunity to bless someone with the grace and love of God. You might just be surprised at how God can and will use you!
