#### Sermon

## "All Saints"

Today is All Saints' Day, and what we celebrate today is a mystery. The mystery we are celebrating is the body of Christ. As Paul teaches us in 1 Corinthians 12, we are all the body of Christ and we are each individually members of it (1 Cor 12:27). The reason this is a mystery is that the body of Christ is not limited by time. The body of Christ is an eternal reality. It exists outside of time. That is why All Saints' Day can include all saints, alive or dead. We are all one in Christ Jesus. Being united to Christ does not only mean that we exist in the presence of our Maker. It also means that we walk hand-in-hand with all our brothers and sisters in Christ, and that this seemingly great enemy, Death, really has no power to end our communion with one another. So we as Christians believe that those who have died do more than live on in the hearts and minds of those they effected while alive. No, those who have died really live on. They are alive; they are just as alive as Christ is alive, for they are joined to him.

So what are they doing right now, all these saints that have passed on before us? If the book of Revelation provides any clue, they are praying for us. In fact, Revelation provides a window into the eternity in which the saints who have passed on now live. These saints cry out to God on our behalf, on behalf of the living, asking God how long it will be until the wicked are judged and the righteous vindicated (Rev 6:10), how long it will be until those who destroy the earth are destroyed (Rev 11:18).

So the saints pray for us. But we can say more. I believe that what the saints do for us is captured well by an image we find in the book of Joshua. After a whole generation has died off while wandering in the wilderness, the Israelites are

finally ready to enter the promised land. But in order to enter that land they have to cross the Jordan River. We often think of the Red Sea when we think about making a crossing on dry land. But let's not forget that the Israelites also passed through the Jordan River on dry land, walking through it in order to get to that land that was promised to them. The story of the Jordan River crossing is dramatic, and goes like this:

There is a holy object, gilded with gold and decorated with figures of cherubim (Exodus 37:1-9), which contains the Ten Commandments (Deuteronomy 10:2). This object is called the ark of the covenant. It has been brought all the way from Mt. Sinai outside of Egypt to right here, the edge of the promised land. Joshua instructs a group of priests to pick up the ark of the covenant and carry it into the waters of the Jordan. As soon as the priests' feet touch the water, the river ceases to flow and stands up in a single heap, so that the people of Israel might pass through and make their way into the promised land on dry ground. The priests who are carrying the ark then move to the middle of the Jordan, and they remain there, holding back the waters, "until the entire nation finished crossing over the Jordan" (Joshua 3:17).

I love especially this image of the priests standing and holding the ark until all the number of the people of Israel make it over to the other side. It is an image of how people hold the holiness of God for others, how they make present the holiness of God and wait with it in this chaotic world. And in so doing, they are making provision for others, they are holding back that which threatens to overwhelm, so that we might walk over to the other side and be saved.

This, I think, is what the saints do. They are praying, they are making sure the presence of God remains in the world long enough for us to cross over safely to the promised land. They are making provision for us. We are always in danger of getting caught up in the turbulence of the world. The saints who have gone on before us work to hold the waters back, to keep us safe and deliver us to the other shore. They have solidarity with us; they know how difficult it is to keep faith in this life, and they work for us, watching over us and making their prayers on our behalf known to God.

One saint that has gone before us who has been on my mind this year is Rebecca McCulloh, the former pastor of Chapel Hill Christian Church. Rebecca and Chapel Hill Christian sponsored my ordination as a minister, and I continue to be marked by how she formed me. I remember how much Rebecca fought for the Kingdom of God and how she was inspired by the moral clarity of Jesus. She was inspired by how Jesus saw the least of these and would not let his audience forget them. I remember how imaginative Rebecca was as a preacher, how she would make up stories that surprised and delighted her congregation, mainly just for the fun of it. I remember her wisdom and how willing she was to share and to offer guidance to those in need, among whom I can count myself. I remember her because she was truly, in the fullest sense of the word, a pastor.

But I don't only remember Rebecca. She doesn't only live on in my thoughts. I feel her praying for me, even now: she is making sure I stick closely to the narrow way of Jesus, she is making sure I press and push myself to more fully embrace the way Jesus cared for the world, which is not an easy thing to do. So, my question to you this day is: who is praying for you? Who has passed on ahead of you that is patiently holding the ark for you, making sure you pass safely to the other side? Send up a prayer of thanks today for those who are praying for you—for otherwise, without these prayers, without the care of those saints, we know we wouldn't make it. In the name of Jesus Christ, of whose body we are a part: Amen.

# Prayers of the Parish:

All Saints is a time for silence and reflection. We at First Christian ask that you observe two moments of silence today. Visit especially: doctors, nurses, and all those working in health care; those who are in nursing homes, hospices, and long-term care facilities who are feeling isolated in these long weeks of distancing; schoolchildren, teachers, and administrators in a time of great uncertainty, and especially those students, teachers, and administrators who are now or are soon going back to school; we pray for childcare workers; for those who process food and those who stock and sell in grocery stores; visit delivery drivers and visit all Your churches, their pastors, their deacons, their elders, and their congregations. Visit all those who cannot find safe work in these moments and who are feeling more threatened than ever this week. Visit the sick, the hungry, and the imprisoned. Be present to those in our armed forces, who are in especially precarious times. Mourn with those who mourn. Rejoice with those who rejoice. Grant us Your peace.

which helped us to see (*City of God*, Book XXII). Around the table, all the fragments are put back together, and God comes to join us in the feast. Let us rejoice together.

In the same manner after supper, Jesus took the Cup and when he had blessed it, he gave it to his disciples, saying, "This is my blood of a new covenant, poured out for you and for many, for the forgiveness of sin. Drink it in remembrance of him."

Death, be not proud, though some have called thee
Mighty and dreadful, for thou art not so;

Much pleasure; then from thee much more must flow,
And soonest our best men with thee do go,
Rest of their bones, and soul's delivery.
Thou art slave to fate, chance, kings, and desperate men,
And dost with poison, war, and sickness dwell,
And poppy or charms can make us sleep as well
And better than thy stroke; why swell'st thou then?
One short sleep past, we wake eternally
And death shall be no more; Death, thou shalt die.
