Messiah Lutheran Church Congregational Meeting December 12, 2021

The congregational meeting was called to order by president Pat Yost at 10:40 am. Pastor Rich offered a prayer.

A quorum was reached: there are 226 members on the official roll, 51 attended the meeting, so the quorum requirement of 27 was attained.

Pat Yost started with comments about the activities of Messiah in the past year. Dennis Allen, vice-president, spoke about the improvements to the grounds and other fixes, such as the streaming of the Sunday morning services. Treasurer Cheryl Crabtree shared information about the new accounting program which will be fully used at the start of 2022, which will improve many financial functions. The tithing envelopes will no longer have account numbers on them, so members must write their names on them. She also spoke about the budget sheets that members can take home to review before voting on the ministry plan at the annual meeting in January. Pat thanked Pearl Slusher for her work on the Council minutes during the past year. The other members of the Council were introduced.

There were three seats becoming vacant on the Council for the next year. Three candidates for those seats were introduced: Jerry Price, Phyllis Roberts, and Pearl Slusher, the last two being incumbents. Pat asked twice if there were any nominees from the floor; there were none. Dennis Allen made a motion to accept the slate as presented; Ron Booth seconded. Everyone in the congregational meeting was in agreement to accept these three candidates. Margo Reigel commented that the flyer presenting the candidates was well done.

Thanks were extended to Charlene Frantz, who served for one year as a fill-in member, and had decided not to continue on the Council.

Mandatory Constitutional changes were shared with the congregation, which Scott VanBaaren said were minor changes to wording which would make the meaning of the Constitution clearer. All were in favor of the changes, and a second vote will be taken in January.

There is an opening available on the Endowment Committee; Gretchen Hawk has expressed interest in service on this committee.

Barb Schoonmaker, who has been a member at Messiah for 31 years, thanked the Council and staff for all they had done in the past year to keep Messiah operating as our church. Pat appreciated her comments and said Council members work as a team to ensure the church continues to operate.

George Carter made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 11:00; Scott VanBaaren seconded. All were in favor.

While 2021 continued to present challenges for how the church's faithfulness to our calling occurs, Messiah rises to the occasion with vigor, determination, and steadfastness. Adaptation and implementation are two keywords that describe how we have been and continue doing the work of Christ. In addition, Messiah abounds with dedicated members and leaders who are willing to reflect upon a situation and follow where we discern the Holy Spirit is leading.

Perhaps the most visible way Messiah has adapted and implemented concerns our worship life. With masks now optional, we are back to in-person worship services. Opening back up for in-person worship with optional masks is significant. We encourage you to wear your masks, With one Sunday worship service, we enjoy a fuller sanctuary, knowing that there are saints of God joining us virtually as well. When we look at the worship attendance in 2020 and 2021, we can see an increase in those attending.


Limited social gatherings are taking place, such as the Wednesday afternoon Sip and Munch Fellowship Group. While we did not schedule funerals or public baptisms in 2020/2021, the year provided the opportunity to return to funerals and baptisms inside of the sanctuary. If you had a loved one die during 2020/2021 and you still desire a funeral worship service, please contact us so that we can arrange a funeral liturgy.

In addition, some adult educational offerings returned in 2021, offering a hybrid method, giving attendees the opportunity to choose between attending in-person or virtually via Zoom technology. We are beginning 2022 with some exciting adult educational opportunities. These include a multi-week series on the Wisdom literature of the Bible, and a monthly conversation with the pastor. My hope is that a monthly gathering on varying topics concerning spirituality, Scripture, and theology will appeal to a broader audience, lessen the burden of heavy commitment, and provide for some meaningful discussion that will enhance spiritual growth and discipleship.

The agenda of this report includes some exciting potential for ministry in the future. I look forward to many more years of serving with this parish. A special thank you goes to our congregational council, staff, and all members of this congregation. It is a joy and an honor to serve God during these times and in this place.

Deacon Annual Report Messiah Lutheran Church Congregation December 31, 2021 John Renfroe, Deacon

On September 23, 2021, I celebrated my seventeenth year serving Messiah Lutheran Church as your Rostered Deacon. At this point, I am reminded of a phrase out of Rippon's text from the hymn How Firm a Foundation. ".... And then, when gray hairs shall their temples adorn...."

My call at Messiah Lutheran Church covers the areas of the Choir Ministries, Music Director and Organist, coordinator of the Fine Arts Concert Series, along with the visitation ministries and the hymn selection committee. There are also administrative responsibilities associated with each of these areas. My annual report will reflect my work as a Deacon at Messiah Lutheran Church from January 1, 2021, through December 31, 2021. I praise God for the opportunities to serve in this setting at Messiah Lutheran Church, as we work together to be "disciples engaged in mission!" It is also my privilege to report to you how God used me to support the various ministries to which Messiah Lutheran Church called me. I am grateful to be a part of such an excellent staff. Many thanks go to Judy King and Scott Van Baaren, our parish deacon. I am also thankful for the opportunity to be in mutual ministry with Pastor Richard Leseganich. I am blessed, indeed.

Even though many people have been fully vaccinated, the Covid virus and all the variants with it are still very much alive. Given the circumstances of this global pandemic, it continues to have a direct impact on the ministries of this church. From January 1, 2021, through February 7, 2021, we had drive-through communion only. We began limited in-person worshipping on February 14th. The Easter service was held outdoors, featuring the handbell choir, a brass ensemble, and keyboards. However, full singing with a choir did not begin until September 2021.

Choir Ministries

From September 8. 2021 through December 23, 2021, the Chancel Choir rehearsed a combined total of 17 times including two extra rehearsals, and they led the liturgy at 7 worship services. In addition to leading our liturgy on Sunday mornings, the Chancel Choir and the Handbell Choir also presented an extra Advent worship service, The Longest Night.

I want to take this time in my report to also thank Judy Young, our volunteer choir librarian for her many hours of work in keeping the music inventory in order. Last fall, she undertook the arduous task of completely updating our library to reflect an accurate counting of our choral and instrumental music. As a result of her work, I also updated our anthems on our computer to reflect the new updates. In case you weren't aware, the Chancel choir affectionately refers to Judy as our "choir mom".

The SonShine choir is a group of volunteers that meets 45 minutes before each of the summer services, and they meet at 8:45 AM on the first two Sundays of the month and during the winter season. They also began leading our liturgies on June 6, 2021, as we began limited singing in our worship services. From June 6, 2021, through December 12, 2021, the SonShine Choir met and prepared 23 anthems.

Out of continued caution of too many large group gatherings, and with the health safety of those gathering for worship, the Church Council and Staff agreed last year that one inperson worship service gathering would continue until further notice. As a result, the Saturday Evensong Choir did not meet last year.

Part of my call and responsibilities at Messiah Lutheran Church is to oversee the handbell choir. You might recall that with the approval of the worship and music committee, along with the church council, I brought Judy King on staff to lead and develop the handbell choirs back in 2005. Over the past year, she has developed a beginner's choir and has developed small groups out of the main choir. Because they were not a singing group, the handbell choir continued their rehearsals throughout 2021. From January 10, 2021, through December 31, 2021, the combined rehearsals for the handbell choirs were rehearsed 50 times.

Presently, the Handbell Choir plays twice a month for our worship services. From February 21, 2021, through December 31, 2021, the Handbell Choir, or one of the new groups from the choir, played for 27 services. Additionally, they played for our outdoor Easter service last April, for the advent service, The Longest Night, for Christmas the Eve service, and for Christmas Day. All of this was in addition to the time she spent reorganizing handbell choir music while calling, emailing, and zooming handbell choir members. I marvel at the way she creatively kept the handbell choirs active during this pandemic season. Thank you, Judy, for your tireless efforts! I would also like to take a moment to thank Jim Slater for his involvement as the handbell maintenance person. Many people may not realize what is needed to keep our handbells in good repair.

Director of Music/Organist

As director of Music and Organist, I prepared service music for 51 services, including 7 virtue services from January 1, 2020, through December 31, 2021. I also played for or participated in 2 memorial services.

Additionally, as my role as a called and rostered deacon, I prepared three homilies and eight weekly virtue devotions.

Fine Arts Concert Series

Last December, the Fine Arts Concert Series presented The Longest Night, observance of the winter solstice. As this prayer service remembered the longest night of the year, it also pointed to the Light of Christ shown to us in the birth of Jesus. I hope to be able to report on a more active concert season next year.

Visitations

Pastor Leseganich and I coordinate all hospital, Hope Hospice, and shut-in visits. I report the outcome of these visits directly to Pastor Leseganich, and together, we determine appropriate follow-up strategies. In addition to weekly hospital calls and monthly communion visits, I oversee the visitation committee. On October 14th, we restarted our monthly visitation meetings. As we continue with this pandemic, the committee members will either call or visit the homebound. Their decision to either call or visit is out of an abundance of concern for their safety as well as the parishioner's safety, my Thanks go to, John Baskin, Charlene Frantz Louise Gaumer, Judy Lindsten, and Arlene McCarthy,

The Hymn Selection Committee

This committee meets quarterly on the second Monday of the month at 1:30 PM. I give copies of the planned scripture readings, along with Sunday morning worship themes, and some suggested hymns, to all the members for advanced planning and studies. These hymn suggestions come from Sundays and Season, a planning resource from Augsburg Fortress Publishing Company. The committee studies the appointed scriptures and prepares their recommendations based on the readings of the day to the committee. During the meeting, this committee correlates hymn usage ideas working together as a group, and they make final hymn selections for the following month's Sunday worship services, my thanks go to Edna Cannavale, Bob Reider, Pearl Slusher, and Judy Young for their invaluable inputs and suggestions. This committee is open to anyone who wished to have an input in the hymn selection process.

Worship and Music

The Worship and Music committee restarted our monthly meeting on October 6, 2021. This active committee consists of Pastor Leseganich, Charlene Frantz, Pearl Slusher, Jim Slater, Judy Young, and myself.

Vice President's Report

It has been an honor to serve on the Messiah Council in 2021. I have taken part in the conversations and decision-making effort of the Executive Committee and Council throughout the year and have volunteered to assume some of the "Facility Manager" duties. Here are some of the programs and projects that have been undertaken and my role in them:

Lead the project to find and hire a contractor to repair/repave and stripe the parking lots.

Contracted for repair and replacement of some broken and damaged rain autters.

Contracted for the repair and extending of the irrigation system.

Supervised the design and installation of two new flower beds at the front of the church.

Searched for and contracted with a new landscape contractor.

Located and contracted for the removal and trimming of trees on the campus.

Lead the live streaming effort to get Messiah on Facebook Live.

Lead the effort to provide a suitable shower facility for our homeless neighbors.

Improved building security with remotely monitored electronic locks.

Lead the project to replace the aging telephone system with Voice Over IP saving over \$50 per month and improving service.

Conducted an audit of the Kids Connection and Messiah financial records and management procedures and made recommendations for improvements and efficiencies.

In conjunction with Messiah treasurer, established fund accounting procedures for the use of Church Windows to replace Shepherds Staff.

Took on the role of Financial Secretary to implement those procedures. Lead the project to get the roof replaced on the Kids Connection Building. Supervised the installation and repair of electrical and mechanical systems around the campus.

Lead the effort to research and design a high definition digital sign to replace the aging sign on Pine Island Road.

The pandemic has caused many changes to the way we interact and worship as a community, but after drive-thru communion seemed to work so well my wife Edna and I tried drive-thru Lenten Soup. We had some good fellowship handing out volunteer-provided soups to passers-by, Messiah members, and Kids Connection Staff. Although we had to hire contractors to do many of the grounds maintenance functions around the Messiah campus, the majority of the work on the grounds is done by two faithful members – Carl Schroeder and Tom Harmer. Without Tom and Carl the grounds would not have the manicured appearance that they do. I thank them for their excellent service and much appreciated hard work.

Endowment Fund Committee Report—2021

The Endowment Committee administers Messiah's two endowment funds, the Mission Endowment Fund and the General Endowment Fund.

MISSION ENDOWMENT FUND

The purpose of the Fund is to provide a vehicle and structure for individuals who have the ability and desire to benefit Messiah Lutheran Church, N. Fort Myers, FL, Inc., through charitable giving that is consistent with its mission of witnessing to the message of salvation through Jesus Christ on both a local and global level.

At year end, the balance of the Mission Endowment Fund was \$292,370.90.

During calendar year 2021, The Mission Endowment Fund provided a \$3,500.00 grant to Angel Wings of SW Florida. This organization provides housing for unaccompanied women of Lee County.

The fund received a bequest of \$16,000.00 from the estate of George Brockman.

GENERAL ENDOWMENT FUND

The purpose of the Fund is to provide a vehicle and structure for individuals to make gifts to the church that will undergird the long-term ministries of Messiah. The monies generated by the fund's annual principal will be used to augment the General Fund of the annual budget and to provide money for the Capital Reserve Fund.

At year end, the balance of the General Endowment Fund was \$145,563.28

During calendar year 2021, The General Endowment Fund provided \$5,644.86 to augment the General Operating Fund at Messiah, and \$1,411.22 was placed into the Capital Reserve Fund.

Kid's Connection Year End Report

Year 2021 just flew by! I still must repeat myself of how fortunate we are to be covered under the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost during these fearful times. They are the most powerful keepers of mankind. This is Kid's Connection 28th year of being in operation and through thick and thin and the continuation of Covid 19 we have survived. We've had laughs and tears but I am sure The Holy Trinity was here with us at all times. We continue with lots of love and great enthusiasm teaching our little ones. We have cared for our co-workers who were here to support our mission of giving our little ones a good start towards a bright future. We were opened all year long and we were full to capacity. The Man up there knows our needs and the needs of the community we serve. The Early Learning Coalition gave us quite a bit of financial support through grants and bonuses and the parents were able to keep up to date on their tuition payments. We have missed the children who left us this year to journey into the public school system some of them were here since they were infants. We had their Voluntary Pre-K graduation which was held outdoors. All the families gathered under a big tent that we rented. The children marched out of the V.P.K classroom past the tent and performed from a stage that we set up for them and they got awarded their diplomas. The parents were all teary eyed and super happy. Now we work diligently with the ones that are presently here. It makes us proud to hear the positive comments from last year's parents on how good their children are doing in Kindergarten. This is our advertisement the parent's word of mouth that means we must be doing a good job. With the help and guidance of our Lord perhaps Kid's Connection will be able to celebrate twenty eight more years. We always try to maintain Kid's Connection and in 2021 was no exception. Our inspections by the Department of Children and Families, The Early Learning Coalition and the Fire Department were all A's again in spite of how hard it has been to keep up with all the COVID 19 regulations. We also participated financially on fixing the parking lot and the gutters. We put new toilets in all the bathrooms a total of eight toilets. We also put new fixtures in all of our sinks a total of seven fixtures. We painted the two year old classroom and put in new flooring. We painted the three year old's bathroom and added plastic panel to the bottom wall, easier to wipe clean. We put in new flooring in the teacher's bathroom.


This year we were not able to invite the parents as we usually do to participate in all the holiday activities, but we did celebrate all holidays with the children. The reason for this was that we do not let any adults into the center because we are taking great precautions to keep all of us healthy. We greet the parents at the door, give them hand sanitizer before they sign the children in, we take the child's temperature, take the child to the bathroom and wash their hands then we take them to their classroom. In the evening we greet parents at the door give them hand sanitizer, they sign the child out, we get the child from the classroom and bring the child to the entrance for the parent. As you can see it has not been easy but it has worked thank God again!

As always the Creative Curriculum method is still being used Ms. Carmen writes the curriculum for the month and the teachers do their lesson plan according to the theme and what they will focus on for each week. We also include a weekly Bible story so our children are learning the word of God. Also we include a weekly character development. Although we had the Summer Camp children attending it was very hard because we could not take them on field trips.

We also did not use the Family Center which is more spacious for them, in precaution of Covid 19. We used one of the V.P.K classrooms since there is no V.P.K during the summer. We made the best of it trying to keep them well entertained here at the center.

Ms. Carmen and staff at Kid's Connection thank God for giving us one more year filled with strength and health to continue on with our mission to serve the community. We are so thankful to the parents for choosing to enroll their children at Kid's Connection, for the trust they had in us through these difficult times. We are so thankful and grateful to the teachers for their hard work and their constant dedication and love to the children. We are thankful to our Advisory Board for their time and all their good advice. Although we could not meet in person we had our virtual meetings. We are very thankful and grateful to Pastor Richard for being our spiritual leader and I am very sure he kept us in his prayers. We missed John Renfroe this year we hope this coming year we will get together for the children's music program. We are also thankful for the council members and members of Messiah Lutheran Church. We want to than Scott for being there for us and for all the help he gives us. We give a big thank you to Cheryl Crabtree and Dennis Allen for all their help. We also want to thank the member of M.L.C who from their kind hearts donated for the needed children's Thanksgiving meals and Christmas gifts. Feeling super blessed for the success Kid's Connection had this year in spite of all that is going on in the world around us. Our budget remained very stable. Annual Report Messiah Lutheran Church Stephen Ministry

Stephen Ministry is a one-to-one Christian Caring Ministry that helps people through an unpleasant life situation. The pandemic presented some unique challenges for us to still provide that care while observing the necessary protocols brought about by COVID-19. Innovative methods were developed and successfully used to continue this ministry. Some of our Stephen Ministers were able to meet face-to-face, but tele-care was the primary means of providing care. Texting, email, telephone conversations and old fashioned snail mail worked well to keep connections with care receivers. Two Stephen Ministers successfully completed the Stephen Leader training that was conducted in a new virtual format. Stephen Ministers met twice monthly to participate in continuing education and supervision sessions. Resources to help those grieving a loss were provided to numerous Messiah members and friends. Awareness articles have been provided to Messiah followers through media sources to help those needing Stephen Ministry support. Planning for training new Stephen Ministers will begin in 2022 to add to the existing team.



Emily Norris had been serving at Augsburg Lutheran Church's winter-overflow homeless shelter in Winston-Salem, N.C., for a few years when she heard the rumblings. Many of the guests opened up to her, told her stories. One need kept arising.

"I heard very loudly that there was a deep hunger for a faith community that looked like them," Norris said. They craved space where they could worship God and not feel judged for their housing status, their past or their appearance. Heeding their calls led Norris to Wartburg Theological Seminary, Dubuque, lowa, to become a pastor.

By 2020, Norris was ordained and serving as the mission developer for the Dwelling, an ELCA faith community designed for, but not exclusive to, people in Winston-Salem who are or have been homeless. Funding comes from partnerships with Augsburg, the North Carolina Synod, the Moravian Church in America and the ELCA churchwide organization, which draws on Mission Support for the Dwelling's grant.

Starting a church during a pandemic wasn't ideal. Safety restrictions made worship impossible, and the population Norris had hoped to reach became especially vulnerable. So she did what many ELCA leaders and congregations were forced to do: she pivoted.

After assessing community needs, Norris determined that free mobile showers would be the Dwelling's anchor ministry. Visitors could take showers and receive clean underwear, socks and T-shirts donated by nearby members of the Dwelling's synod.

"It was really a profound way to start," Norris said. "Showers provide a sense of dignity and are therapeutic. I don't know a better way to remind people of their baptism."

Eventually the showers became permanent, with participants volunteering to help the program. By Christmas Eve, area restrictions for gatherings had been relaxed, and Norris held the Dwelling's first service. In January 2021, it began offering regular Sunday worship.

With a living room for its sanctuary, couches and chairs for its pews, and free-flowing food, the Dwelling takes seriously its mission of hospitality. "It has a feather touch, where you can come in and get comfy," said member Cheryl Morrison. "It's OK to talk to the person next to you, get up to get a cup of coffee, doughnut or muffin."

Change and the need for creativity have become constants over the last year and a half in many aspects of life, including the church. This was the case for Living Christ Lutheran Church in Flagstaff, Ariz., even before a global pandemic caused many of us to rethink what it means to be church. Generosity from all three expressions of the ELCA (the churchwide organization, the Grand Canyon Synod and members of Living Christ) helped turn a congregation "on the road out of town, near the mail" into an online presence reaching over 500 people a week from Phoenix to the Philippines. (Read more about Living Christ in the current issue of "Stories of Faith in Action" at ELCA.org/SOFIA.)

Many other congregations have found new ways to connect both when inperson worship was impossible and when congregations began to return to their sanctuaries. Generosity, especially through Mission Support, helped us find and support these new ways of being connected. Early in the pandemic, ELCA Worship launched the "Worship in the Home" webpage, with Scripture, hymn links, prayers and reflections for each Sunday. These resources were and continue to be used in congregations across the ELCA—even at **Sitka Lutheran Church** in Alaska, whose members printed and hand-delivered "Worship in the Home" resources to fellow members without internet access.

Change and creativity have taught us many things. As Pastor Sandra Rudd of Sitka Lutheran Church noted, "The pandemic was a stark illustration of the fact that the church is not a building. A lot of people say that, but we didn't fully know it until we didn't have a building to use. We learned that there are many ways to be connected as the church." Throughout the pandemic, the ELCA has changed and adapted, doing ministry in new and creative ways, because of the generosity of its members. Even now, you may be gathering in a new way for your annual meeting, to discern how you will steward the gifts shared generously with your congregation to do ministry in your community and beyond. As you have these important conversations, remember that your gifts of time, talent and resources have helped create new spaces beyond our walls and buildings where we continue to worship, serve and love God and each other.
