

It sounds like the story-line from a soap opera: The youngest son of a multi-millionaire decides that living under his father's roof is cramping his style. He decides to leave home to live a free and wild life in Belize, or the French Riviera, or maybe Dubai. But he realizes that fun in the fast lane requires a ton of cash. So before jetting off, he sells one-third of all his father's corporate holdings, transfers the funds into his own account, tells his dad to drop dead and waltzes out the door.

Jesus once told a similar story. We know it as the parable of the prodigal son, found in Luke 15. In Jesus's parable, an arrogant son demands to be given his inheritance *before* his father's death. Incredibly, the father allows the young man to take his portion of the family fortune, after which he goes to a distant country, where he squandered his property in reckless living.

You know what happened next, but let's pause for just a moment. Jesus used this parable to illustrate the way we humans can treat God ... and how God responds. The selfish son was only interested in the things his wealthy father could give him. As soon as the young man had received those things, he turned his back on the entire family and walked away. He wasn't interested in maintaining the relationship.

There's a troubling trend in the world today: I think of it as "ME-ism." It isn't new. ME-ism says that life is about satisfying MY needs, MY wants, MY desires. ME-ism says "I want what I want, when I want it," and, "I'm willing to put time and effort into this (relationship, job, church, etc) only as long as I'm being well rewarded."

This kind of thinking is so pervasive in our culture, that it pours over into how we view God. God is infinitely good, indescribably kind, extravagantly generous. *Of course* we look to God for help and for blessings. He is the source of all good. But the thing I have to ask myself is, "Am I more focused on the things I can get from God, than I am in the relationship itself?"

It's a tricky question. I know that, apart from God, I am spiritually bankrupt. Apart from God, every soul on this planet is lost. Just as the younger son, having squandered everything his father gave him, soon became penniless. Forced to take a disgusting job feeding pigs, he "came to his senses." He decided to return home, apologize, and ask for a job as a servant. But – had he really learned to value his father? Or was he just looking to get away from those pigs? Ultimately that didn't matter. Because Jesus says that the father saw his son coming and while he was still a long way off, "he ran and embraced him." And before his son finished apologizing, the father had already ordered a feast to celebrate his return.

When we look at God, our human inclination may be to mostly think of what God can give to us. But when God looks at you, he sees his child, created in his image, completely and dearly loved. And he is worthy, more than worthy, of our eternal love and devotion.

Jamestown ECO Presbyterian Church Highlights of the Session Meeting, September 29, 2021



Deacons Report: The Deacons will continue their monthly donation of \$100/month to Wings to Fly for the school year, purchased clothing for the elementary school to have for emergency use, and sent flowers to Betty McCormick for her 100th birthday from her church family. The Fair parking went very well and the ROOT International donations were great, it took 2 pick-up loads to haul the donations! The Deacons will prepare for the October Community Dinner, which will be their Chili supper asking for donations of pies (cakes are acceptable, but pies are preferred).

Finance/Treasurer's Report:

The General Checking Account balance as of August 31, 2021 was \$ 16,950.90. Thus far, \$8,851.00 has been donated to the Parking Lot Fund.

Mission: Tom Walker reported that the mission trip to North Carolina went very well. Tom also reported ½ a beef was donated to the church, leaving just the processing cost for the church to cover.

Fellowship: Saturday Supper in October will be organized by the Deacons. October 15, Chili dinner. November – a simplified turkey dinner, November 13. December – lasagna, December 18.

Worship: Regular hours resumed on September 12, with Sunday School at 9:45 a.m. and worship at 11:00 a.m. The adult Sunday School class is using "The Story".

Future Pastoral Leadership: The town hall discussion held on September 26 went well. Attendance was lower than session had anticipated but there were good questions and feedback from those present. Members of the congregation are asked to continue to pray and provide input (see additional information in the newsletter).

Preschool: The preschool board continues to meet and organize fundraisers for the school year. There was good discussion about the preschool's value in the community, and about finding ways to help JPNS be on a sound financial footing despite the reduced enrollment caused (in part) by the pandemic.

Discovering New Forms of Ministry is a Pilgrimage


- May require new ways of pastoral leadership

October 10 – washcloths, toothbrush and toothbrush holders (No toothpaste)


<u>October 17</u> – tote/purse, socks, combs, brushes, and hair clips/ barrettes, lip balm, plastic cup/bottle, plate




