The church was finally decorated. The participants of the Christmas pageant's final practice were departing. Which meant there would be calmness in the church. In this calmness, RevM would finally be able to focus on preparations for the up coming services. Like thunder clapping across the heavens, the church's peacefulness was shattered as Little Jake broke through the door. He was adorned with a fresh coating of snow. Standing in the doorway Jake did his best to stomp himself clean.

While the stomping was near completion, Jake walked directly into RevM's office, and as always made himself comfortable. Just as his tush hit the cushion, words began flowing from Jake's mouth. "I just visited Pastor Sven. He proved he knows less than you. He could not even answer my simplest questions. Then again, what can you expect from a person who likes lutefisk and prepares it on days when you can't even vent the house.



"Jake, with your massive depth of theological comprehension what questions could you ask that Sven could

"Revm, let me ask you the same questions. Maybe you won't be so dumb! First question, how many Wise men came to the manger to visit baby Jesus?"

"No one knows the exact number of Magi. Besides, they never arrived at Bethlehem's manger. Jesus could have been around seven years old by the time they finally arrived."

"RevM, you just fell in the same hole of misinformation as Pastor Sven. Retch showed me a card he received from his Aunt. On the card's front picture, there were three Wise men and Jesus was lying in the feed trough. There were also shepherds standing around the Wise men. I know big named card companies would never send out false information!"

"Jake, I thought you wanted to know what was biblically accurate, not supporting material for greeting card companies. I wonder if Sven also shared that the Wise men are in Matthew's Gospel and the shepherds are in Luke's Gospel."

"I think he said something about that. Did Sven call you before I came so you could compare notes? I know how you two like to gang up on a person. So, if the picture on Retch's card is so wrong, why are they all included in your display? I saw some Wise men in your manger set; along with a baby and shepherds. Why aren't you practicing what you believe?"

"Jake, you are correct. But, sometimes taking the easy path is better than being accurate. Regardless where we place the Magi, there are numerous lessons they have taught us. These lessons far exceed what we either know or wish we knew.

- God extended an invitation to foreigners as well as to the expected audience. It was the foreigners who most often accepted Jesus 'ministry.
- 2. The Magi were willing to travel into a great unknown; trusting in the possibility of a God they had never known. Not only were they willing to travel, but they put aside all that seemed important to them in order to seek an even greater answer.
- 3. In preparing for this journey, they brought their best gifts to present at the journey's end.
- 4. They were not afraid to move beyond their mistakes as they followed the path of the anticipated.
- 5. For me the most important lesson is found in the concluding words of their story; and they returned home by a different way. They were willing to be transformed through the gift of God. They became new creations of the Creating God.

Rather than trying to prove what we will never know, it would be much better to become more pliable in the Potter's Hands. We would be much better off if we allowed Divine experiences to move us in new and unexpected directions.

After all that, Jake departed by the same door!

May the Blessings of the New Year provide numerous opportunities for you to travel by a different way!

Heart of Texas Association News

Faith UCC in New Braunfels is undergoing a major transition. As of January 1, 2021, Scott Martin will be retiring as Pastor. Scott is a friend to many of us. He leaves Faith with our great appreciation for his ministry and many good wishes. The church has called Carla Cheatham to be their Designated Term Pastor. This is a type of transitional pastor that is charged with helping the church move toward specific goals, with the possibility of being considered as the settled (called and more permanent) pastor if both sides agree. Carla is the author of *Hospice Whispers: Stories of Life* and leads the Carla Cheatham Consulting Group, which trains people in care giving fields in ethical care giving. She has served in hospice and parish ministry. We join Faith and Carla in great hope for their work and future in ministry together.

Our Association Committee on Ministry has granted Amelia Fulbright "Seeking Privilege of Call" status in the United Church of Christ. This status means that Amelia, who was ordained at First Baptist Church of Austin, has been recommended for ordained ministerial standing in the United Church of Christ by our Committee on Ministry and will have an Ecclesiastical Council to be voted on for ministerial standing at our Association Spring Meeting. She will also be seeking a call to ministry in a UCC church. Amelia is currently the Designated Senior Pastor at University Baptist Church in Austin, where she served as the Associate Minister earlier in her ministry for several years. Before her current work, she was the founding Executive Director of Labyrinth Progressive Student Ministries at the University of Texas at Austin. Labyrinth is supported by a number of Austin area churches including Congregational Church of Austin and Church of the Savior, among others. Amelia put together Labyrinth and the coalition of supporting churches to form a powerful ministry that offers worship, Bible study, meditation, and community to students who are devout, questioning, and on a journey. We welcome Amelia to the Heart of Texas Association.

I rejoice to share with you that James Pennington, Senior Pastor of First Church UCC of Phoenix, Arizona, will begin his tenure as Executive Director of Back Bay Mission in Biloxi, Mississippi, on February 22, 2021. The Back Bay Mission Board has had a gratitude-filled time of

farewell with retiring Executive Director Alice Graham, whose work has been transformative and excellent. As many of you know, Back Bay Mission is a partner ministry with the United Church of Christ, does magnificent outreach work among the poorest people of the area, and hosts work camps for mainly UCC groups from across the country. James comes with extensive non-profit leadership experience prior to becoming a UCC minister. At First Church, he has led a ministry that expanded the church's outreach to those with no place to live, to refugees, and as a leading institution advocating for those with the least voice and poorest among us. I feel a special joy in making this announcement after serving on the search committee that recommended him. I hope many of us will find a way to get out to Biloxi to see and be part of doing God's work at Back Bay Mission.

Solitude as Soul Care

Richard J. Foster (Celebration of Discipline) says solitude is "more a state of mind and heart" than a place: "There is a solitude of the heart that can be maintained at all times. Crowds, or the lack of them, have little to do with this inward attentiveness."

Although Jesus preferred crowd-free alone times, that's not always feasible. But, no matter your surroundings and responsibilities, you can carve out intentional time to "be still."

Try these tips for adding solitude to your life:

- Take a day. Every month or two, enjoy a day of solitude. Turn off your phone, and spend the day with God.
- Take an hour. Treat this time as an important calendar appointment. Keep it free.
- Take a minute. Before a big meeting or as you're answering the phone, breathe deeply and invite God into the moment.
