

On this morning, I was in my sacred space along with my typewriter and blank sheets of paper; all of which were taunting me. I had two days to complete something that resembled a Sunday morning sermon. Unfortunately, my sermon writing juices had been damned up by the excitement of the upcoming camping/fishing trip in the high country. This was my annual two weeks' sabbatical; separating me from everything and almost everyone. For each moment I spent thinking about and studying the text, I spent hours mentally making sure I had everything, and that it fit into my bags.

My saving grace was the Labor Day weekend incorporated this Sunday. The church would be as crowded as on the Sundays following Christmas and Easter. Because it was Labor Day Sunday, I selected the text from Matthew 11: 28-30, with the focus on, "For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

Shortly after selecting that text, my world had been in constant battle. The shattering effects of these troubles had made following Jesus a hard and burdensome chore. While packing for the fishing trip, I made sure I left enough room to bring the problems of the last few days along with me. Even though I knew they would dampen my vacation joy, I hoped to explore them to determine rather I should have stayed in the Parish or become a door to door shoe salesperson.

Not only would the issues suck the joy out of the trip, but the more I thought about them, the more difficult it was to write the sermon. If the battles had a positive side, it was an ever deepening understanding of why Jesus never started a church but, instead, continued to move from town to town.

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In the front porch's opening to the freshness of the weather, the beauty of the scenery, and the taunting of the blank sheet of paper, I was blindsided by Little Jake as he came strolling down the street. "Rev. M, it must be nice getting paid for sitting around doing absolutely nothing. If you had your eyes closed, people wouldn't know if you were sleeping or dead."

"If you must know, Jake, I am faithfully working on a sermon for Sunday morning. I need an especially good one so I will have less guilt being gone the next two weeks. Unfortunately, every time I think I have an open avenue, I run into a brick wall."

"Rev. M, while you are so busy doing that head-stuff, you want me to repack your stuff and remove all the nonessentials? It would save you time repacking on Monday morning. You always forget that we are not going to be gone for a life time."

"Jake, I think you just wrote my sermon. I need to sit with God while repacking my bags."

I was right. I needed to reexamine what I was taking. Some of the items were necessary for the trip; however, some I could easily live without. And, above all, I had too much stuff that needed to be handed over to God. Those were the heavy burdens which God was much better equipped to address.

It is when we are secure enough in our faith to trust God with what God is best able to address, that we have enough room to accept the lighter yoke God will place upon our shoulders.

There, where clinging to things ends, is where God begins to be. If a cast is to contain wine, you must first pour out the water. The cask must be bare and empty. Therefore, if you wish to receive divine joy and God, first pour out your clinging to things. Everything that is to receive things must first be empty."

Our Heart of Texas Association Fall Meeting is still on schedule for Saturday, October 10, 2020. We had planned to hold it at Hope United in Georgetown in celebration of its 10th anniversary, but as all of us know, the COVID situation has sent all of us in directions we could not have imagined several months ago. Many of our churches are not yet meeting in person, including Hope United. Hope is also in transition, as it is in the interim and pastoral search process. The plan now for our Fall Meeting is to meet via Zoom. Our Association Board will be planning that gathering over the next month, and we will send each of our churches and ministers information and a link to the meeting as soon as that planning happens. I think we can all look forward to the opportunity to share our churches' experiences, commitments, and journeys together as we gather -always an uplifting and vitally important part of our meetings.

Perhaps even more important than ever in this time will be your stories of how our churches are continuing to minister and how we are each dealing with the challenges that the COVID pandemic is presenting. We will look forward to the time when we can meet in person once again, but are grateful, in the meantime, that we have the opportunity to gather easily from homes online.

I am also grateful for the many ways I am aware of that our churches and pastors are adapting their ministries and even growing them in new ways over this time. Some of our churches are meeting outdoors (seated outside or by driving up and staying in cars); some are meeting in person but spread out to keep each other safer; and some, particularly those in areas with high COVID case numbers, are meeting online in various ways. Many have found that the process of learning to meet online has led to new and very creative worship formats. Some have also found that our online platforms have brought distant members and friends to worship with us, as well as allowing very broad participation in discussion and study since people do not have to drive. Our pastors have met

via Zoom several times to continue our "Jam and Bread" gatherings, the last time being to say farewell to Ron Trimmer as he prepared to move to Lake Ozark, Missouri. Ministers who otherwise would have had to drive a long distance have been able to gather easily with colleagues. The youth of United Christian and others who joined them were able to have a virtual mission trip this summer after the multi-church mission trip they have been part of was cancelled. A host of people have worked hard to make all of this happen. I thank God for all of you.

On Sunday, September 17th, Lee Zillman, pastor of Redeemer UCC in Marion (in the Zuehl community) will retire. Lee has served Redeemer for the past 11 years, and in ministry and in Christian ministry for forty three years. I hope to give news of the celebration in a future newsletter. At this time, I ask for prayers of thanksgiving and support for Lee and Sharon, and prayers for the ongoing service in ministry of the whole Redeemer community as they embark on this interim time.

Weimar UCC Worship Services

Our church doors are open for worship services!! Since the very beginning of this pandemic, our daily lives have been affected. We want you to feel safe when attending services or visiting the building. With that being said, Weimar UCC is taking every precaution to ensure a safe experience for you and your family.

We have roped off every other pew in the church to make sure we have proper spacing between attendees. We regularly and frequently clean and disinfect areas which are regularly touched, such as doorknobs, tables, chairs, restrooms, pews, etc. We have hand sanitizers throughout the church. When visiting the church, it is mandated that all wear a face mask and keep it on throughout the service and when visiting, keep six feet or more apart from other attendees, and we strongly encourage the at-risk population to watch the services remotely. If you're not feeling well or have any of the COVID-19 symptoms, please remain home and watch remotely. It has been noted that some attendees are removing their masks once seated. Please, do not do that!!! The "rules" are to keep masks on at all times while in the building.

When God crosses our paths ...

Pastor and martyr Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote, "God will be constantly crossing our paths and canceling our plans by sending us people with claims and petitions."

Last spring, the whole world had plans canceled, first by Covid-19, and then by God, "sending us people with claims and petitions." Some folks needed prayers for healing or for coping with grief. Medical staff, teachers, pastors and others serving long hours needed support: meals, check-in calls, "thinking of you" cards. Parents working remotely while helping kids with distance-learning needed encouragement. Crucial nonprofit work still required donations.

Pre-pandemic, you may not have realized that staying home or wearing a face mask could be a ministry. Or, that sending a card expresses love in Jesus' name. Or, that buying takeout from a local restaurant can be a gift to the owners. When our calendars are empty, God "crosses our paths" in new ways — both to be with us and to nudge us toward others (even if virtually, or six feet apart!).

Sometimes one word makes all the difference. In John 14: 16, when Jesus promises the disciples that God will send the Holy Spirit, he doesn't say "the" Helper or "a" Helper but, "another" Helper. For there to be "another" of something, we must already be familiar with a first of that thing. Jesus has been, for the disciples, their first Helper. They already "know him for he dwells with [them]" (verse 17 ESV).

When my infant son was to start full-time daycare, the transition went quite smoothly. That's because his "new" caregiver wasn't new at all: She was Grandma! The sense that my son would be in the hands of another family member he already knew eased the handoff for Mama and baby alike.

Not all parents have access to that type of situation, but the care giving arrangement Jesus provided his disciples is available to all. Even when Jesus is no longer physically with us, another who loves us just as much — another we already know and whose truth we've seen in Jesus — is here. We're in good hands.
