# **Sublime Mystery of God's Grace and Mercy**

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ.

The Lord is near: Come, let us adore Him. This Christmas we want to discover God who becomes so close, who embraces us with affection. God, as God, has a predilection for the weakest, loves them, and calls us to care for them. In his letter to the Philippians, Saint Paul tells us that Christ, "being of divine condition, did not boast of his status as God; on the contrary, he stripped himself of his rank by taking the

condition of a slave, making himself similar to humankind" (2,6-7).

For centuries, Israel waited for the Messiah. The people envisioned the messiah as a political-military leader who would liberate Israel from the Romans. However, the savior was born in a stable, without doors, without shelter, in silence and in poverty. He came as a light that illuminates all people, "and his own did not receive it" (Jn 1: 9.11). However, "to all who received it, he gave the power to become children of God" (1,12). The promised light illuminated the hearts of those who had persevered in vigilant and active waiting, to gift them and us with divine sonship.

I am sure that all of us have been preparing throughout Advent - praying, and expecting the encounter with the Lord. Today more than ever, it is important for you to be ready, when there are just a few hours or couple days, to go before Christmas Eve. Watching and praying, we will be able to recognize and welcome the brilliance of Christ's Christmas, the Sun that rises from above, which dispels darkness and will renew everything with its brilliant splendor. Today the Christian's mission is to spread, with word and action, the truth of Christmas and the genuine act of salvation that Christ brings us.

Look around the world! People are living in poverty of all kinds: material poverty, material, loneliness and sickness. Jesus was born in the poverty of the manger; Jesus comes to offer everyone the only joy and the just peace that can satisfy the desire for the happiness of the human heart. Soon it will be Christmas. Jesus will come to transform the poverty to joy and peace for all. On Christmas Eve, we will once again stand before the manger to contemplate in wonder the act of God: the word made flesh, God among us. Feelings of joy, admiration, and gratitude will spring up in our hearts before the prodigy: that the Creator of the universe came out of love to make his home among humans.

These days, the liturgy urges us to live the final hours of Advent, as prelude to welcome the Lord into our hearts. At this end of the advent season, watchful and prayerful, waiting must be our fundamental attitude on these vespers. It is the attitude of the protagonists of the first Christmas: Zacharias and Isabel, the shepherds, the magi, the simple and humble people, but, above all, Mary and Joseph, who lived more than anyone the emotion of the event of which they were to be protagonists and witnesses. It is not difficult to imagine how the last days passed, singing in our heart the *Maranata*, "Come Lord Jesus," and waiting to hold the newborn in our arms.

In this period of uncertainty, may the Lord help you to follow the example of Joseph and Mary, to live the mystery of Christmas with authenticity and truth.



# The Sunday Paper Junior and other Resources for Children




