The monthly amount needed to meet our budget in 2014 was \$9,801.00.

The Dorchester Chaplains A Story of Love and Heroism



This is a story of four United States Army chaplains who gave their lives to save other soldiers during World War II. The chaplains, who all held the rank of lieutenant in the United States Army, were the Methodist Reverend George L. Fox, the Jewish Rabbi Alexander D. Goode, the Roman Catholic Priest John P. Washington and the Reformed Church in America Reverend Clark V. Poling. They were sailing on the USAT *Dorchester* troop transport on February 3, 1943, when the vessel was torpedoed by the German submarine U-223 in the North Atlantic. As the vessel sank, the four chaplains calmed the frightened soldiers and sailors, aided in the evacuation of the ship, and helped guide wounded men to safety. The chaplains also gave up their own life jackets.

As I swam away from the ship, I looked back. The flares had lighted everything. The bow came up high and she slid under. The last thing I saw, the Four Chaplains were up there praying for the safety of the men. They had done everything they could. I did not see them again. They themselves did not have a chance without their life jackets.—Grady Clark, survivor

On December 19, 1944, all four chaplains were posthumously awarded the Purple Heart and the Distinguished Service Cross.



The Four Chaplains' Medal was established by act of Congress on July 14, 1960, and was presented posthumously to their next of kin at Fort Meyer, Virginia on January 18, 1961. The chaplains were also honored with a stamp, issued in 1948

and by an act of Congress designating February 3 as "Four Chaplains Day."



Chaplains Fox, Goode, Poling, and Washington responded to a high calling from God to represent His love among men of war. On the day they died, they personified the words of Jesus found in John 15:13"Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends."
