Because, this fall has been a very busy time at Our Saviour. We had a blessing of the animals on October 10 in our courtyard; I hope you saw the charming photos printed in the Mountain Democrat. We kept adding to our "Ofrenda" – our altar honoring El Dia de los Muertos in the Parish Hall – until we blessed it, and everyone it represented when we observed All Saints AND All Souls Days on November 7. In church we renewed our Baptismal Vows, and blessed about 30 new quilts that Lorna Perpall had created for recipients at Marshall Hospital, Progress House and other agencies. After worship that day we told stories about the loved ones we remember. It was such fun! Exciting News from Bishop Megan

We are now authorized to offer Holy Communion in both kinds via "Clergy Intinction." This is how it will work, at least to begin with. The priest, holding the blessed Body of Christ in wafers, will stand behind the altar rail, as usual, with the Eucharistic Minister holding the Chalice. The priest will in "intinct" – or briefly dip – the wafer into the blessed wine in the Chalice, and then place the wafer into each communicant's cupped hands. Communicants will stand or kneel at the altar. You may also request "No intinction" to receive only the wafer.

Singing in Church and Physical Distancing

Many of us LOVE, LOVE to sing in church, and it has been a serious detraction to NOT sing. Well, we started singing a couple weeks ago when Betsy was not able to be with us. Perhaps that was premature, and I take responsibility for that. When we sing we project air droplets which can be contagious, if anyone among us is ill. Rather than ask for proof of vaccination before letting in worshippers, it seems much, much easier – and more welcoming Yes, to just put on a mask when we sing. Is it a pain? Yes. Might it protect others? Yes. And, it follows Bishop Megan's recommendations. We have ordered many masks, so if you don't have or forget one, there will be one for you.

And, please keep a pew apart as you join for worship. We can do this! We do it for the safety of others. El Dorado County has a 56% vaccination rate, and has reported 16,478 cases since the beginning of the pandemic. As of Nov. 26, 169 of our neighbors have died from Covid, and most were in their prime of life. We have to be realistic about the climate around us.

Fixes and Flourishes Committee

The committee has accomplished projects large and small this past year and will present a full report in time for the annual parish meeting. The kitchen project is nearly done. The delay is one small hot water connection. Once it's reconnected we will have a meeting with the coffee hostesses and host to run through the operation and we will then be able to use it on a regular basis. The total cost was less than expected thanks to in house work done by Steve Boilard, Mike Berkery, and Boyd Roberts.

Vestry approved a bid from Taylor Made Construction for the repair of the dry wall around the library windows and the replacement of the window sills. Painting was not included in that bid. The job requires two days which we have requested to be a Monday and Tuesday to impact the fewest number of people. We are waiting for dates.

Camerado Glass has made a template for the cracked library window. We are waiting for an estimate on replacement. They also will be offering suggestions for reducing the light from the three arched windows that would be less costly than plantation shutters.

Plantation shutters remain a popular choice for an attractive, permanent, low maintenance solution.

We are developing a list of completed tasks with costs and a list of maintenance services that need to be scheduled for completion on a regular basis.

Sacred Ground Circle ~ A Personal Experience

My experience of Sacred Ground incorporates my personal family history of being a grand-daughter of Italian immigrants. As I mature, I am aware of how my family history affects who I am today and what I value. Our family story included an experience of my maternal grandmother not being taken seriously at a hospital when her three-year-old daughter became ill with appendicitis. My grandmother was labeled a "hysterical Italian mother" and told her daughter only had the flu and to go home. Unfortunately, her daughter had a burst appendix that became septic and without antibiotics she succumbed to the infection and died. Perhaps if the attending physician had not been affected by his pre-judgement and labeling of my grandmother by a cultural stereotype, my maternal aunt would be alive today. This is a lesson in how cultural stereotypes can affect our objective judgements.

Part of my work in this world has been to accompany families with children with disabilities to access services to support their health and well-being, including those from different cultures. Even in high school I became interested in learning a second language to better communicate with those still learning English (including one grandmother). I see how access to services can be limited or denied based on circumstances and stereotypes.

Participating in Sacred Ground helped me get in touch with my own cultural history and stereotypes, and learn about others' history. In addition, it helped integrate my faith and response to the difficulties encountered by many people during the course of history in our country. As I listened to stories from participants, videos, and authors my understanding broadened and I came to see through the lens of faith that there is more work to be done to build a Beloved Community.

A New Sacred Ground Circle Coming in January



SACRED GROUND is a race dialogue series designed for these times. The series is intended to bring a community together to participate in transformational conversations about race. Attention is given to the history of race and racism in America. Documentary films and readings focus on Indigenous, Black, Latino and Asian American histories, as well as recent thinking of scholars and practitioners of racial healing, racial equity, and whiteness.

SACRED GROUND is framed as a spiritual journey to help us hold and nurture the vision of Beloved Community.

Participants in the Sacred Ground Circle will be provided access to the online Study Guide and Curriculum resources for this 10-session process. This 2022 Sacred Ground Circle begins Thursday January 20,2022. It will meet weekly on Thursdays from 2:30 – 4:00 pm through Thursday, March 24, 2022. Experiencing SACRED GROUND is an opportunity for honest conversation meant to begin healing the broken people and places harmed by racism. SACRED GROUND will inform you, challenge you, and bless you.

SACRED GROUND is part of the Becoming Beloved Community initiative of The Episcopal Church. The resources are available to members of a Sacred Ground Circle regardless of church affiliation or no affiliation. You are welcomed and encouraged to be a part of this dialogue committed to peace and reconciliation in our society, personal lives, and ministries.

There is no charge for participation; however, participants will need access to a computer to attend sessions and access materials and will also be asked to read two books (available from libraries or online sellers—approximate total cost of less than \$35).

Around the Diocese - St. John's, Petaluma, launches Afghan Allies Project

We are pleased to announce the launch of our <u>Afghan Allies Project</u> at **St. John's Episcopal Church, Petaluma**. This is a story that began only two weeks ago when our volunteer receptionist took a phone call from Ali, an Afghan refugee who had just arrived in Petaluma and was hoping we could help.

When parishioner Frances Frazier and I went to visit Ali and his wife and three small children in their new apartment, he told us how he had done an internet search for "refugee resettlement agency near me" and St. John's was at the top of the search results. I can only think it was because we have had information on our website for a couple of months about how to donate to Episcopal Relief and Development and Episcopal Migration Ministries for relief of refugees.





But search algorithms aside, it has become clear that this was God at work. Since that day Frances and others at St. John's have been very busy getting to know these incredibly courageous families, and in partnership with Mr. Shir Haidari, Project Director from the ULM Family Foundation, we are now in a position to invite others to join us in this effort.

Our new webpage, <u>saintjohnsepiscopalpetaluma.org/afghan-allies-project</u> has more information and a link to our volunteer information form, where anyone can sign up to help out.

The Bishop's Mission for Disaster Resilience was honored to assist the Commission for Intercultural Ministries and Russian River Deanery in the settling of Afghan refugees through the delivery of Project (Re)Start bins to help the displaced people find their place, in their new communities. Bins containing the basics for infants, bedrooms, and bathrooms were delivered from the following congregations:
