

Lilies

When Easter Sunday was celebrated at St, Paul's Lutheran Church, Orlando, I have no remembrance of any flowers adorning the altar. Perhaps there may have been a bouquet or two

of peonies or irises from the garden of Miss Hulda and Miss Wilhelmina Gieschen. However, purchased flowers were neither considered nor available.

The trumpeting white bloom of an Easter lily was foreign to Orlando, at least at the Lutheran church. I think this was true also of the Evangelical United Brethren and the Christian Church since their pockets were attended by frugal hands as well.

Today in most of our Lutheran churches, Easter Sunday services are marked with the beauty of multiple Easter lilies adorning the altars and filling the sanctuary with their strong aroma. But does the Easter lily truly represent the impact of Easter for us?

True, from a dead-looking bulb springs forth new life. True, the trumpet-shaped white blooms look as though they are trumpeting good news to the world. But the bloom quickly dims, droops and drops leaving only a bloomless, leafy stem.

Of course, the lily can be transplanted in one's garden to impress with a summer bloom. But in spite of the Easter lily's beauty, it's a fragile plant that needs much tending and it quickly fades.

True Easter Flower

A neighbor in Orlando got a deal on some blacktop for his driveway. It looked really good and he was very proud of it. However, sometime later a bulge appeared toward the edge of the blacktop. Something was pushing upward. The new blacktop began to crack in that spot as the unknown force worked its way toward the light.

When it finally burst its tarry bonds, there was a dandelion! Nothing, not even a thin layer of blacktop, would hold it down. Now that's the "true" Easter flower! A dandelion has a deep root, hearty leaves, a brilliant bloom and it produces countless seeds, allowing the

Oklahoma wind to blow them hither and yon.

To me, this demonstrates the power of Christ's resurrection! He suffered vicious scourging, He was pinned to a cross and He was sealed in a tomb. It was humanly impossible for Him to break away from that situation. Yet this

was the eternal plan to redeem sinners, demonstrating how much God loved the sinful world. When all seemed lost, Jesus Christ broke through every barrier that attempted to hold Him down, namely death and the grave! What seemed impossible became possible! He broke through them like that dandelion broke through the blacktop to show its sun-like flower.

In like manner, Malachi refers to Jesus as the Sun of Righteousness:

Continuing education for 2020

The Oklahoma District is blessed with several significant continuing education opportunities in 2020.

First, there are two monthly reading groups, open to all rostered workers and laity, offering CEU credits. One is hosted in the Tulsa Circuit, the other in the Ponca City Circuit. The reading list is at oklahomalutherans.org/continuing_education. More reading groups can be developed wherever there is interest.

Second, this June, Lutherhaven Retreat Center will host a continuing education course in the Panhandle. Dates and course details will be announced via email and the continuing education page at the district website.

Third, if you are a pastor who would benefit from a getaway, DOXOLOGY is offering programs in both Schuyler, Neb. and Belton, Texas. DOXOLOGY, an LCMS Recognized Service Organization, provides training in advanced pastoral skills while also providing spiritual care to pastors and equipping them to take better care of themselves and their family while serving God's flock. I highly recommend the program for pastors and their congregations.

There are three parts to the DOXOLOGY program, including four days of pastoral training, a later weekend session with at least one lay leader from the pastor's congregation, and a third event welcoming pastors' wives. Housing, meals and material for all sessions are included in the \$2,200 cost, which is eligible for district continuing education funds and can be spread out over two years. Dandelion Seeds

By the power of the Holy Spirit, the Easter Gospel is graciously planted like a seed in our heart. He sinks our spiritual root deeply into the Word and the Sacraments. The growth given by the Holy Spirit impacts our whole life.

The message of the risen Christ is proclaimed in our congregations on Easter, with the intention of impacting the community in which we are planted. The Easter Gospel of Jesus as the Resurrection and the Life is not to be confined to our sanctuaries or our own lives. Instead, it is intended to impact all those around us.

Recall the dandelion. After it blooms, you know what happens — hundreds of seeds replace the bloom and the slightest bump or breeze sends them flying through the air. They lodge in the most unpredictable places, but wherever they lodge a plant comes forth. That new plant may have to break through blacktop, hardened red clay or a hard gravel road.

And to this we have been called as Easter people: to distribute the seed for the Holy Spirit to plant wherever He desires! He is the One who gives that tiny seed the "breakthrough" power it needs, and He is one who gives the growth and increase!

I am not recommending that on Easter morning you adorn your altar with dandelions, but I do hope that you consider the Easter story in the light of their resilience, hardiness and seed-bearing qualities. The Holy Spirit lets the Easter Gospel break through the hardest ground ... and hearts! Through it He changes lives and eternities!

Let each of us sow that seed.

Alleluia! Christ is risen!

He is risen indeed! Alleluia!
