Together in Christ

There was a special lady who belonged to my first congregation in southwestern Minnesota. Her name was Anna. She was a widow in her early 80s who loved to host the new bachelor pastor for breakfast about twice a week.

Her husband, Pete, had died several years before I arrived to serve at St. Peter Evangelical Lutheran Church in Heron Lake and Delafield townships. The large, white-framed church was topped with a bell tower that lifted high the cross of Christ to the community. One mile west of the church was the cemetery, the abode of five or six generations of the same families I served.

Pete was buried there. Many widows made weekly treks to visit the grave of their deceased husband. Among them were Lillian, Minnie, Erna, Ida and Olga (even though Olga searched the fence line for asparagus more than paying respects to Carl, but Carl didn't mind!).

One morning while visiting Anna, she confided to me that she did not think herself to be a "good" widow since she felt no urge to visit the grave of her husband like the other widows. "I don't feel close to Pete at the cemetery," she said. I asked, "Where do you feel close to him?" Her response touched my heart: "In church during worship. He would always hold my hand. We would sing hymns and commune together. That's where I feel close to him!"

Emotionally, I responded, "That's where you should feel close to him. After all,

the liturgy says, 'Therefore with angels and archangels and with all the company tof heaven, we laud and magnify Thy glorious name.' So when we sing praises to the Triune God,

our voice blends with the voices of all the company of heaven, the saints in heaven, and that includes Pete!"

I think that assurance comforted her. Over the years it has also comforted me.

All Saints

October ends with Halloween, that is, "hallowed evening," marking the eve before All Saints' Day. On Halloween our society goes crazy with "ghosties and ghoulies and things that go bump in the night," but when All Saints' Day arrives only the Christian Church celebrates.

We confess in the Apostles' Creed: "The Holy Christian Church, the communion of saints." The Holy Christian Church and the communion of saints span both earth and heaven. It encompasses saints at work in mission and ministry on earth and under attack by satanic forces (Church Militant), and saints at rest in heaven in the presence of Jesus (Church Triumphant).

There are physical boundaries that separate us, namely the grave, but we are not separated by spiritual boundaries. In Christ we are one communion, whether in heaven or on earth! I think St. Paul hits on this holy common union when he encouraged:

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith. Heb. 12:1-2

He reminds us of the connection we have in Christ to all the saints, both *here* in our presence or *there* in His presence. He almost makes it sound as though the saints in heaven serve as a cheerleading squad for the saints on earth who are running the race and fighting against satanic attacks. This is, indeed, a "holy communion" because it is totally bound to and based upon our faith in Jesus Christ.

Thanksgiving

We begin November with All Saints' Day and we close it out by observing Thanksgiving Day. One of the things for which I am thankful is that conversation I had with Anna so many years ago. It has become more meaningful to me since my wife passed to the Church Triumphant in 2009. To feel close to her I need not hold a graveside vigil in Prairie Hill Cemetery, just north of Fulda, Minn.; instead I need only sing the beautiful hymns and liturgies of praise to know that her voice is blending with mine!
