Before You Begin

The parable of the good Samaritan had a twist that surprised Jesus' audience. The hero was a Samaritan, a social outcast. While Samaritans worshiped the same God as the Jews did, some of their religious traditions made them unacceptable to their more devout Jewish neighbors. Righteous Jews who heard Jesus' story asked, "How could a Samaritan do anything worthwhile?"

In the story, the priest and the Levite had legitimate reasons for not helping their neighbor. Jewish law considered anyone who touched a dead body to be unclean for seven days. To become clean again required a ritual of purification. Perhaps the priest thought that if he touched the man, he would be unable to perform his priestly duties at the Temple. Obviously he thought that his responsibilities were more important than aiding a man in distress. In addition, the Levite also may have been worried about this scene being a setup for a robbery. The Jericho road was notorious for bandits, and Levites tended to be among the monied crowd.

The Samaritan, however, was not bound by the same strict religious laws as the priest and the Levite. He was free to help the injured man. In this story Jesus expressed concern that people were forgetting the need for compassion for others as they strived for righteousness.

When children enter school, they move into an alien world. This world is peopled with many kinds of people, some quite different from those with whom the child is most familiar. These persons of different cultural, religious, and community backgrounds are now neighbors too. We need to help the children recognize their potential for being a neighbor and for reaching out to others in these circumstances.

Because of the media explosion in today's world, children are no longer bound by geographic borders. Everyone is our neighbor, whether that person lives next door or around the globe. This presents a new set of questions: Who is my neighbor? How can we live so that we can be good neighbors to someone in another part of the world?

Reader I:

With oil and wine he cleaned the wounds, so moved was he within; then put the man upon his beast and took him to the inn.

Reader 2:

All night he nursed the injured man; then, with the morning sun, he asked the keeper of the inn to do as he had done.

Reader 3:


"If you take good care of him, I'll come this way again and pay you for your services," said the Samaritan.

A Samaritan was a person who lived in Samaria. Samaria is located on the Jordan River between Judea and Galilee. The Samaritans practiced a different form of Judaism, and this caused problems with the rest of the Jews. For example, Samaritans considered only the first five books of the Old Testament as holy, excluding all of the other books (such as Psalms and those of the prophets).
