Something We All Can Do Acts 3:1-10

The train-themed program was "Jesus Power Pulls Us Through." With Ainsley's planning, plus the help of Trisha Dean and other volunteers, VBS take-home bags were created, providing activities for a three-night program. A drive-by pickup of bags was held at church. In addition to our own congregation, 60 bags were sent to Dottie Fromal, director of Integrated Service's "The Hive" project in Nelsonville, for the youth and families with whom she interacts. Each bag contained train and Bible-based materials Including a bandana, bracelet, snacks and crafts so that children could follow each night's teaching. A total of 111 bags were distributed.

Starting Monday, August 17, children heard the story from Pastor Dave about Ananias helping Saul. Trisha taught the song, *Follow Jesus*, while also showing it on the big screen for the Facebook audience. The craft activity was coloring a Rubik's cube during which Ainsley reminded children of the night's message, *Jesus helps us do hard things*, when you think something in life is hard to do, like a Rubik's cube, instead of saying "I can't do this", say "I can't do this, yet."

Tuesday's story about Paul encouraging others during a storm and shipwreck conveyed the night's message, <u>Jesus' power gives us hope</u>, and was accompanied by the song <u>Love the Lord with All your Heart</u>. For craft time children made a prayer journal and were encouraged to write their concerns, pray about them and be assured that God hears the prayers.

The final night, Pastor's Bible story told about Peter and John helping a blind man and teaching about

Jesus in the face of adversity and authorities who forbid it. The story demonstrated the message, <u>Jesus' power helps us be bold</u>. The craft included creating a train on a track that was "engineered by God and driven by faith." The session ended with the team -- Pastor Dave, Ainsley and Trisha -- leading dancing and singing to an upbeat *Jesus Loves Me* while children danced and sang at home.

It may not be the traditional VBS that our church loves and enjoys, but positive feedback and pictures sent by parents showing their children participating prove the program was a success. Teachers and volunteers hope to see children in person next year at VBS. All involved were thankful to find a way to come into homes with God's word. It is amazing to see what we can all accomplish together when God is involved.
