FROM THE PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE . . .

One hundred and forty years . . . That's a long time!
Of course, when you compare it to nearly two thousand years of Christian history, and the nearly two thousand years of Hebrew history prior to the coming of Christ, it's really relatively brief.

But when you think about a local congregation in one place, it's significant. One hundred and forty years . . .

On Sunday, September 27, we will have a Homecoming service as we celebrate the 140th anniversary of the establishment of the congregation now known as the Jonesboro Heights Baptist Church of Sanford, North Carolina.

Things were a lot different in 1869. When it was established on September 29, 1869, our church was first known as the St. John's Mission, then as the Ephesus Baptist Church, then later on as the Jonesboro Baptist Church. It was located in the community of Jonesboro in what was then Moore County. The church was established 38 years before Lee County came into being, and met under a brush arbor for nearly a year until a simple building could be constructed.

In 1947 the towns of Jonesboro and Sanford merged to become the city of Sanford. Jonesboro became the Jonesboro Heights section of Sanford, and our church soon changed its name to reflect the surrounding community's new designation.

Thirty-four ministers have served as pastor of JHBC throughout its history. Pastoral tenure has ranged from a year to 28 years. This church has been through highs and lows, trials and triumphs, struggles and successes. Early in our history (the late 1870s), services were discontinued and the doors shut due to lack of pastoral leadership. But in time, services resumed and the church moved forward.

Throughout it all, God has had a purpose for the Jonesboro Heights Baptist Church and has been with us. That has made all the difference.

And now it's time to celebrate again!

Sunday, September 27, will certainly be a special day as we come together for a combined worship service in the sanctuary at 10:30 A.M. Our preacher for this service will be our beloved Pastor Emeritus, Rev. Gilbert W. McDowell. This is most appropriate, since Rev. McDowell served the longest tenure of any pastor of JHBC. This will be a service of worship in which we celebrate our past and look ahead to our future. Our history committee has been working diligently to prepare for this celebration. There'll be plenty of fellowship as well, especially around the tables at the covered-dish lunch following the service.

I hope you'll make a special effort to be here on this day filled with memories and anticipation. God has given us a wonderful heritage as a congregation, and a hope for a bright future. Come celebrate this heritage and hope with us on September 27!

Family Ministry

I'd like to continue to emphasize the importance of setting priorities for your family. You can't imagine how important that is and the fruit that it bears.

According to a study of spiritually mature young adults by the Search Institute, there are three factors present in the lives of young adults that might be classified as *devoted followers of Christ*, as differentiated from those who simply claim *belief in Christ*. I'll list these in order of priority given by the families of the 1000 young adults involved in the study.

The third most important common factor in their family life was *involvement in an ongoing group involved in Bible study*. For some, the group was their Sunday school class. They were involved in classes that moved beyond a discussion of what had occurred at school last week and were centered on a study of the Bible. This study also included discussion of how these things were "played out" in their lives. For others, the group was their youth group. Again, these were youth groups that emphasized spiritual growth over recreational activities. And, for others this need was met by involvement in a "small or cell" group that met in homes on a weekly or bi-weekly basis. None of the young adults involved in the study said that Bible study was not a priority.

The second most important common factor in their family life was *daily prayer with their family*. They were not talking about praying before a meal. Their family gathered daily to pray together and talk about things that were important in their spiritual lives. It was an important time in their families and they guarded that time against the "busyness" of their lives. (An important aside: Dr. Wallace, who teaches counseling classes at Campbell Divinity school, often cites statistics that show that the number one predictor of drug use in teens is failure to gather around the table for supper with their family.)

Surprisingly (but not unreasonable), the most important common factor present in the family life of young adults identified as being *devoted followers of Christ* was involvement *as a family* in regular mission activities. Some went on mission trips together with other families, but that is not what they were talking about. They said that their family "went out" into their community and became involved in mission projects together. They worked on the homes of poor people. They helped out at food kitchens and pantries. Together, they identified needs, prayed about them, and went out together to meet those needs.

By now, you might be saying, "Yeah, sure. Like I've got time for that stuff." Truth be told, probably nobody would say that there was time to do those things on a regular basis. But, if those things were priorities, there would be time. If those things were AT LEAST as important as soccer practice, music lessons, or everything else that competes for family time, we'd see major changes in our family life. I've said it before and I'm repeating it now: Until we, as parents, begin to see our childrens' spiritual growth as our number one priority (yes, even more than academic growth), we'll continue to see children grow up and walk away from their faith. It's a reasonable thing for them to do. If they see that it's not very important to us, it won't be very important to them. We show them what is important by what we do. It's as clear as that.

Parents, it won't accomplish much to call a family meeting and dictate these things. It won't accomplish much to do these things a few times. Get your family together and discuss what is important to all of you. Who are you as a family? Set priorities that reflect what is important to your family and where you see God moving in your family.

To paraphrase Jesus, "What does it profit your child if he/she gains scholarship after scholarship, or has a job, or is the best player on the team, but he/she cares little about following Christ?" Think about it; pray about it; discuss it with your family.

NOTE FOR LITURGICAL DANCERS



Midweek Manna begins. Serving will be from 5:00 – 6:00 PM.



KID'S CHALLENGE



Comforts – Past and Present

Our Four Houses of Worship

Furnished by the History Committee

The early members of our church would not believe the changes that have taken place over the years to make it so comfortable in the present buildings.

The first house of worship (see photo at top) completed in January 1870 was only one room. This was used until 1889 when a second frame building was finished.

The second building was enlarged in 1908 to 1910 by adding a baptistery and 4 classrooms - two downstairs and two upstairs. There are those of us even today who still remember as Junior boys and girls going up the narrow steps to reach the small classrooms.

In 1923, a Sunday School Annex was added to one side of the second building at a cost of \$2,000.00 making total property value \$7,000.00. In the annex there were 2 large rooms downstairs. One was for small children and one for older ladies' Sunday School Class. This classroom could be opened to add more space in the sanctuary. Upstairs there were four classrooms used for teenagers and young adults.

All the building was heated by wood stoves in each classroom and 2 stoves in the sanctuary. Someone was hired to come in to build fires in all the stoves. In later years, coal was used in potbelly stoves in the sanctuary. By 1944, the Seventy Fifth Anniversary, oil circulators replaced the coal stoves. It was not until the building of the third house of worship (Chapel) in 1955 that heat pumps were installed.

There was no air conditioning until the education building was built and was dedicated on Sunday, May 5, 1968. What did we do to keep cool on hot days in the summer? Windows were opened wide. If you were not cool enough or the gnats were bad, you used a hand held fan furnished by some business in town with advertizing on it.

Until the third house of worship was completed there were no restrooms or running water at the church. Restrooms had been small two-seater buildings out back of the church.

The first electric power in the church was installed about 1924. The Sandy Creek Association minutes reports the spending of \$330.00 on the power plant of the church. This consisted of lights hanging in the center of each room.

What a surprise our present sanctuary would be to the charter members! They would be amazed at the size, the beauty, the comfort of heat and air condition and even cushions on the pews.

A bigger surprise...our newest addition, music rooms, lots of office space, a comfortable conference room and restrooms.

The biggest surprise...McDowell Hall - a huge beautiful room, colorful windows with Bible scenes. There are many tables where food is often served that has been brought from home or prepared in the state-of-the-art kitchen where there are stoves, refrigerators and dishwashers.

Will the next 140 years bring as many changes as the past 140?

God has richly blessed us over the years. May our buildings we now have and all our people be used to the fullest for the Glory of God.
