

Most of you know Sandy and I just made our first trip to Disney World recently. It was a good, interesting, and sometimes overwhelming experience. As we walked around for five days, watching people, I had the strangest thought; there are ways that the church could be more like Disney! Now, please don't think I've lost my mind — I think I can convince you.

First, let me set the stage. 152,000 people visit Disney World every day. Some of them ride rentable carts that dangerously zoom in and out of pedestrians. And there are A LOT of strollers, double-wide, that jostle and push everyone else around. Everyone is on a mission to get somewhere and there is a sense of urgency...until you get into line, some of which are three hours long. Finally, on most days it hovered between 90-95 degrees with 77% humidity. All of that together seems to be the formula for misery and disaster!

But here is the thing that caught my attention. There was never one employee (they call them 'cast members') of the thousand we saw that ever lost their cool. They never argued with each other or complained about anything. In fact, they bent over backwards to be kind and helpful and in every way went the extra mile to make the experience a positive one. Yet, I imagine that most of these 'cast members' came to work with their own issues, it was just as hot and crowded for them as it was for Sandy and I, but they **chose** to set that aside in order to make our visit a good one. Hospitality!

Disney has a culture of hospitality, which they do for something temporary. How much more should we welcome people with love and kindness and patience as we have an eternal purpose! Interestingly, as each cast member was so kind, I found myself responding with kindness. I wanted to hold the door for those that were serving me and say an encouraging word. It was like an upward spiral of kindness and hospitality! Disney says it is the 'Happiest Place on Earth' — I'm not sure I would go that far. But I admire their culture of hospitality and I hope our church is such an authentically welcoming place for a far greater and eternal purpose.

By the time you read this we will be well into the holiday season – which can feel a little like Disney with all the rushing, urgency, long lines and weary people. Christmas is a time when we can expect many guests and so what a tremendous time to **choose** hospitality. Jesus said in the Gospel of John, ^{13:35} "By this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another." If we have sincere love for one another, and for our guests, it will strike a chord in their hearts and meet a need they might not even fully understand. And the wondrous thing is, as we offer hospitality, it fulfills the Gospel and meets a need we have!

May this truly be a wondrous and Merry Christmas for you and yours, and for all who come as we **chose** hospitality, in the name of Jesus!



An Update and Plea from Your Finance Committee

\$11,626.27. At the end of the last fiscal year, 2018-2019, when you take our yearly income and subtract our current yearly expenses, this is the number you get. It sounds good right? Unfortunately it isn't. Let me explain.

Each year we, as a church, strive to give 10% of our actual giving to missions. We estimate how much 10% will be based on the proposed budget but never know exactly how much will be given. Distribution of missions funds are made on a quarterly basis which are based on actual giving. Our hope is that our budget estimate and our quarterly distributions will be very close. In order to accomplish this, our weekly budget requirement is \$11,444.80 (total budget divided by 52).

Our current 2019-2020 fiscal year weekly budget requirement is \$11,373.58. Each quarter, after paying expenses such as payroll/utilities/etc., Richard (our church administrator) pays a portion of the projected total to each mission. If we receive more tithes/offerings one month, he is able to put more towards missions. If the budget is tight, he pays less out of necessity. At the end of the fiscal year, he is able to determine how much still needs to be paid out to our missions in order to meet our 10% goal.

Last fiscal year, 2018-2019, we had quite a few tight months. There were several months when Richard had to choose between paying missions or making payroll and paying utilities. Because of this, at the end of the fiscal year, the amount needed to make up the 10% to missions was quite substantial.

Let's look at the numbers

-Proposed budget - voted on by the church - for the 2018-2019 fiscal year	\$595,129.42
-10% of the proposed budget is to be paid to missions	\$59,512.94
-Actual contributions at the closing of the fiscal year (notice it is lower than expected)	. \$542,573.27
-10% of our actual budget at the close of fiscal year	\$54,257.33
-Amount paid towards missions throughout the year	

As you can see, Richard was only able to pay just under \$28,000 throughout the year towards the goal of just over \$54,000. We would still need \$26,452.18 in order to reach the missions goal of 10%. And if we look back to where we started, our bank balance is only \$11,626.27. We cannot meet our missions goal of 10%. The money is just not there.

This shortfall is so much more than line numbers and balance sheets. This shortfall means that we weren't able to send money to Aaron Smith in Kosovo, who anticipated receiving a certain level of support to live and further the Kingdom of God. The shortfall affects shoes for children in Romania, Bibles for people around the world, the homeless shelter in Sanford, and care for young mothers at the Reach Out Pregnancy Center. These are real people, often hurting, who we have promised to support and be the hands of Jesus.

As a committee, we have tried to be very open about our financial situation and quite simply it's not good. So, together, what can we do? How can you help?

Pray. Tithe. Pray.

Sometimes Christians think their giving is unimportant or there is more than enough. It just isn't so. Your giving is essential for the various ministries of the church. For those of you who faithfully give, THANK YOU! You are doing what God has called you to do and you are making a difference in the life of our church and the lives of those people we are able to reach. As God has been immeasurably generous to us, may we at least return our tithe in response to His wondrous love!

Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it.
