From the Moderator

There's a verse from the prophet Joel that's stuck in my mind for years. Israel has suffered through a horrible and devastating infestation of locusts followed by drought. The people call out to God for mercy. God responds. God makes his presence known to them and declares that relief is on the way. He promises that the land will be green and bountiful again. Not only does God promise a turnaround in their circumstances, he makes this straightforward promise: God says, through Joel, "I will repay you for the years the locusts have eaten" (Joel 2:25).

It's not just that the future will be better. It's that God is going to ... what? ... tack on years to their lives to make up for the years of suffering? Or make the next few years so spectacular that Israel will feel they came out even? We don't know precisely what God had in mind with these words. Remember these words from John's vision in Revelation, a glimpse of what's to come: And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "See, the home of God is among mortals. He will dwell with them; they will be his peoples, and God himself will be with them; he will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away." And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new." Also, he said, "Write this, for these words are trustworthy and true." (Revelation 21:3-5)

Friends, these words are trustworthy and true. Our hope at all times is in the trustworthy and true promises of God. Our reliance on God is just more obvious during sometimes than others. This is one of those times when our hope gets a chance to shine. May your hope and trust in God be strong and shining. May it light up not just your own life but also the lives of everyone around you.
