






- To engage with each other as we share lessons learned, resources, tools, and what we know about the impact navigators can make.



Build Relational Trust

Intentionally invest in relationships, especially across difference. Honor stories and listen for emotions.

Build Relational Trust

Why?


Relational trust is the glue in equity-centered design work. When working across difference on difficult challenges, teams must invest in developing emotional trust in order to authentically collaborate.

If we are comfortable identifying and processing emotions with our team, we create opportunities for healing and prevent distortion of our work.

How

- Enable personal connections through pairshares (people share what matters to them).
- Make time and space for people to bring forward their fuller selves and identities.
- Emphasize the importance of non-judgmental listening.
- Hold space for community to reflect, express and process thoughts and emotions.
- Create culture that invites dialogue.

Seek Liberatory Collaboration



Seek Liberatory Collaboration

Why?

Design work is fraught with power and identity dynamics (e.g. designer as expert, who's generally situated with advantage). To fully realize the liberatory potential of a design process, both for the people we are designing with and for the designer, it's critical to reframe the relationship as one of partnership.

How

- Actively seek diverse identities and skill sets as you build your team.
- Acknowledge and build from the strengths, stories, and skills of each other.
- Set conditions for collective learning, risktaking, and action.
- When framing the question, "How Might We...?" ensure the "We" is diverse and inclusive.







- 2016 to 2018: Focused on traditional 2/4-year pathways
- **2019:** Developed supports through workforce systems.
- **2020:** Provided immediate economic relief to struggling workers and those who are out of work.
- NOW: Creating pathways based on regional GDP for greater economic security and long-term upward mobility





- Pre-pandemic, there were about 7 million unfilled jobs AND as of April 2020, there were approximately 5 million unfilled job, with 180,000 new unemployment claims in Missouri alone.
- Focus on economic recovery and high demand jobs (Architecture & Engineering, Health Care, IT, Life Sciences, Manufacturing, and Transportation)
- Address capacity issues in regional workforce training systems (EDA Economic Recovery)
- Implications for Navigators (Super Navigator with expertise and training on workforce systems & career pathways)



Navigator Program Structure & Functions

- Size and scope of program
 - 1800 adults learners actively served
 - Two and Four Year Traditional Pathways & Workforce Pathways
- What services are provided to participants?
 - Career assessments (Agile Work Profiler & O'Net), prior institutions & student loan debt, common sector competency training, robust referral service
- How are participants identified and invited to take part?
- Referrals from bi-state workforce system, community-based organization referrals, partnerships with local, state, and federal agencies, email and social medial marketing, private sector partnerships
- What ensures it is equity-centered?
 - Broaden the share of economic risks by requiring employers of a certain size to pay invest
 - Make standard and portable a suite of wraparound services
 - Improve workforce analytics by creating an accountability dashboard for multiple measures of job availability and job quality
 - Governed by a multistakeholder partnership comprising business, labor, local government and the public

Navigator Program Challenges: Strategies

- Scale is one adult learner at a time (you do not have the efficiency that is baked into segmental pathways to higher ed)
 - Community-based partnerships, peer-to-peer support, professional Development, ambassador recruitment and alumni support
- Resources have to be continuously leveraged
 - Economic Development Administration, bi-state workforce systems, philanthropy, higher education institutions, state workforce funding initiatives
- Higher Ed and Business Partner Cultivation/Maintenance
 - EDA Economic Recovery, private sector partnerships, career and agility assessments, career pathways training, economic forecast and analysis, traditional 2 & 4 Yr. program offerings, leveraging workforce dollars

Recapture Navigators: Core Functions

The *Recapture Your Dream* program model deploys Recapture Navigators who work to recapture, reengage, and reconnect students with the post-secondary experience.

Recapture Navigators are a single point of contact to help potential students navigate their path back to college by providing enrollment navigation services, career exploration resources, and assistance with understanding financial aid and college costs. If needed, the Navigators can also facilitate connections to community partners that may be able to provide wrap-around services for students and their families.

The Recapture Navigators provide personalized, individualized assistance and are available throughout the entire student lifecycle – from exploration to registration to graduation.

Recapture Navigators: Structure & Funding

Program Director

- NAV 20 anchored at Coastal Compass Education & Career Resource Center
- Trained and supervised by RYD Program Director

Recapture Navigator (Del Mar College)

- NAV 20 anchored at Del Mar College

- Co-supervised by RYD Program Director and DMC Program Manager

Recapture Navigators: Structure & Funding

How is the program funded?

- Citizens for Educational Excellence (CEE) received initial grant funding from Lumina
- Navigators anchored at Coastal Compass are paid directly by CEE
- Navigators anchored at DMC are paid by DMC invoice for wages sent to CEE
- Ongoing long-term sustainability discussions are in process

Challenges

- Stakeholder engagement
- Events-focused outreach efforts
- Part-time Navigators / availability hours
- Institutional enrollment bottleneck
- One-to-one vs. one-to-many communication
- Maximizing Navigator efficiency

Lessons Learned

- ✓ Maintain consistent communication with stakeholders to ensure strategic alignment
- ✓ Create data sharing MOU with institutions
- ✓ Establish institution POC for enrollment handoff once Comebacker re-engagement has occurred and advising exploration/preparation has concluded
- ✓ Purchase Mogli SMS technology platform for text messaging functionality integrated into Salesforce

Graduate! Philadelphia Re-Entry Programs: A specialized form of navigation Presented by Anthony Johnson

- Anthony Johnson is College Success Advisor for Graduate! Philadelphia.
- MacArthur Foundation Safety and Justice Challenge (SJC) seeks to safely reduce the local jail population by 50% in five years (from 2015-2020). This major reform effort also aims to reduce racial, ethnic, and economic disparities in the criminal justice system.
- Created legislation, "The For Profit-Prison Inmate Education and Rehabilitation Program"



We are also in partnership with the following...

RISE: Mayor's Office of Reintegration Services for Returning Citizens

- Meet with returning citizens once a month.
- Provide college, financial aid, and scholarship resources to 40 returning citizens each month.
- Provide academic workshops (i.e., resources for strengthening academic skills and effective ways to pay for a college education).



STAR Program Supervision to Aid Re-Entry: STAR

- Innovative Program for the formerly federal incarcerated men and women.
- STAR Program founded by U.S. Federal Judge Tim Rice and Judge Phil Restrepo who meet twice a month with clients in their court rooms.
- Provide college, financial aid and scholarship support as well assistance with completing college admission applications for 70 returning citizens each month.
- Assist returning citizens with addressing their defaulted loans by guiding them towards an affordable payment plan.



Philadelphia Department of Prisons

- All services are provided at the prison facility (CFCF).
- Meet twice a month with 50 "clients" (we don't call them prisoners, felons, etc.)
- Provide academic counseling and courses to the clients (Math, Science, English, Political Science, etc.).
- Assist clients with completing college, financial aid and scholarship applications
- College partners visit prisons and provide academic workshops for the clients.



Closing Thoughts on Innovative Support

- When returning citizens are unable to come to Graduate! Philadelphia for support, meet them at their homes or libraries in their neighborhoods.
- For currently incarcerated men and women, go to the facilities and assist them with the enrollment, financial aid process before they are released (normally between six months to one year prior).

My academic philosophy is simple! Nothing should keep you from obtaining a college degree if you so desire it.





He let me know that I could walk in his office any time I needed and that as long as the light was on he was available. I walked out of that office believing him. I believed that I could do well and succeed, and I believed that NSCC wanted to see me do well. - Annisha
