Economic diversity

Providing a diverse range of employment opportunities, with a focus on job creation in five target industry sectors while elevating incomes in the region;

Talent development

Having a workforce that exceeds the needs of the employers that are starting, expanding and relocating in the region;

Place and livability

Focusing on the region's overall quality of place to ensure Nashville's long-term prosperity as a preferred destination for corporate investment and talent; and

Regionalism

Collaborating with business leaders in the 10-county Nashville region to develop a unified approach to key issues that impact the region's economic future.

New Partnership 2020 Strategy Launch

On July 1, leaders of the Nashville Area Chamber of Commerce's Partnership 2020 economic development initiative officially launched the new P2020 five-year strategic plan for increasing prosperity in the Nashville region. Co-chaired by Nashville Mayor Megan Barry and Jim Schmitz, Middle Tennessee area president of Regions Bank, Partnership's new strategy will broaden its focus on the three strategic drivers identified below that build not only on Middle Tennessee's achievements, but also identify areas of need to ensure future economic strength.

The 26-year results of this Partnership are astounding and resulted in:

- more than 425,000 new jobs created by expansion and relocation of companies to the region
- a per capita income growth of nearly 150 percent approximately \$48,000
- population growth by more than 185 percent more than 1.8 million people

The new Partnership plan is tied to a series of quantifiable goals, which include new metrics related to traffic congestion and educational attainment, in addition to the traditional measurements of job growth, wage growth, and increases in population and gross metropolitan product.

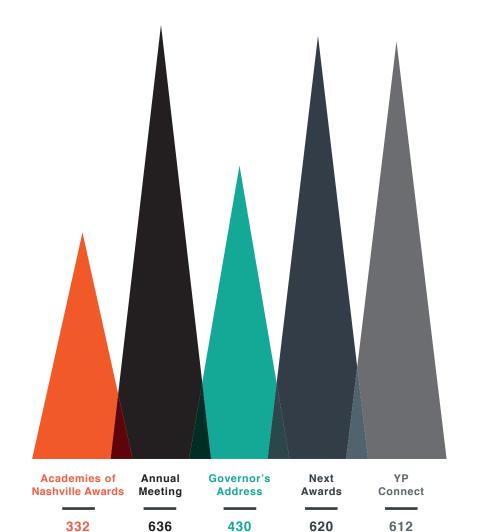

The Nashville Area Chamber of Commerce's large corporations tend to carry the most recognizable names, and the sponsorship of large firms enables the Chamber's initiatives to have broad-based impact, but the overwhelming majority of Chamber members are small companies with 50 or fewer employees.

In 2014, the Chamber created Business Studio to address the unique challenges and needs of small businesses. With monthly seminars on topics such as small business financing, marketing, market segmentation, growth strategies and many others, Business Studio has become a vibrant community of entrepreneurs intent on deepening their knowledge of navigating the sometimes turbulent waters of small business.

National publications are taking notice. In August 2015, *Inc.* magazine ranked Nashville the sixth best city in the country to start a business. Additionally, the Kauffman Foundation praised Nashville's welcoming environment for women and millennial entrepreneurs and ranked Nashville No. 5 nationally, ahead of San Francisco and Boston, for startup growth.

That may help explain why the U.S. Small Business Administration awarded the Nashville Area Chamber a grant to administer ScaleUp Nashville, a program providing small businesses from Middle Tennessee a 12-week course of study aimed at overcoming the barriers to business growth.

Meanwhile, small companies demonstrating exemplary growth strategies are recognized by the Chamber's annual Next Awards, in collaboration with the Nashville Entrepreneur Center. The event spotlights locally headquartered companies and individuals whose drive and entrepreneurial spirit significantly impact the Middle Tennessee business environment.

Moving Forward

Moving Forward ensures the creation of a regional transportation solution through a cohesive community effort. Its work is grounded in the values of regionalism, accountability, urgency and collaboration. Launched in August 2015, Moving Forward engaged more than 100 business and community volunteers, forming a coordinating committee and three task forces. The Routes, Network and Modes Task Force is charged with envisioning the transportation system our region needs. The Public Engagement Task Force focuses on educating the public about forward-thinking transit solutions. The Revenue & Finance Task Force investigates funding sources for transit. In addition, a Moving Forward Advisory Forum was formed in early 2016 to accommodate additional volunteers wanting to provide input and become involved.

Moving Forward released its first report on June 22, 2016. It contained 10 key recommendations designed to move the Middle Tennessee region toward bold implementation of a regional transit system. Over the course of its first year, Moving Forward hosted nine public events as part of a yearlong speaker series on various aspects of the transit conversation. Topics ranged from economic development to equity concerns to the disruptive forces brought by technological innovation.

State Legislative Session

In 2016, the Nashville Chamber's state legislative agenda focused on expanding Middle Tennessee's potential mass transit options and strengthening Tennessee's voluntary pre-K program. Faced with continued population growth and traffic congestion in the region, the General Assembly passed two bills providing new tools to support mass transit. First, TDOT is now authorized to explore and implement a program where mass transit buses may use the shoulders of state highways and interstates to bypass congested areas. Also, local governments and the state are now authorized to enter into public-private partnerships (P3) with private entities for the design, financing, building, managing and operation of mass transit facilities. In education, legislation became law to strengthen quality pre-K programs statewide by requiring focused professional development, collaboration between pre-K and elementary school teachers and the sharing of early childhood education best practices.

Metro Issues

Economic development tax credits and incentives are valuable investments critical to maintaining a competitive business environment in Tennessee and Davidson County. The Council approved incentives and public infrastructure investments for the relocation of Lifeway Christian Resources' headquarters to the North Gulch on March 15.

For more than 25 years, Nashville Metro Government has invested in Partnership 2020—the Chamber's public-private economic development initiative.

The contract with the city includes job-creation and expansion efforts in Davidson County, proactive marketing to relocation prospects and site consultants across the region, as well as small business development programming for Davidson County. On June 21, the Metro Council voted to adopt Metro's operating budget, which included the P2020 contract.

The Chamber's members and board understand the importance of housing affordability to attract and retain the workforce needed for our diverse and growing economy. Accordingly, we have participated in the debate surrounding the inclusionary housing bills, maintaining our position that the solution to ensuring housing affordability is to encourage additional housing supply through the use of incentives and the reduction of barriers to creating new housing.

The Chamber continues to be concerned about the impact of the city's unfunded liabilities related to Metro's retiree health benefits system. In 2015, a Study and Formulating Committee appointed by Mayor Karl Dean concluded that Metro's retiree health care obligations are not pre-funded and have a projected liability of \$2.6 billion. The committee recommended that Metro continue to provide the retiree medical subsidy for current employees, but that Metro discontinue the retiree medical subsidy upon eligibility for Medicare at age 65 for future Metro employees, except those covered by the police and fire pension plan. The Benefit Board disapproved the recommendation, leaving this growing liability unaddressed. The unfunded liability inherent in the current postretirement medical benefits package will continue to grow. The Chamber will continue to work for a resolution to this threat to Metro's financial security.

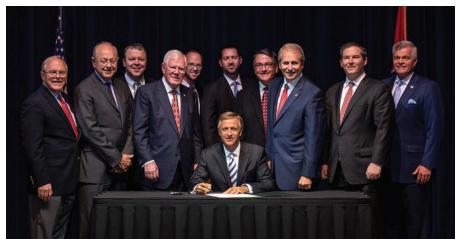

Vital Signs

Since 2013, the Nashville region has been among a growing list of international cities using the Vital Signs framework to identify regional issues and solutions. Released in October 2015, the third annual Nashville Region's Vital Signs report examined three critical issues that threaten the continued economic prosperity of Middle Tennessee:

- What is required of our labor force to continue our prosperity?
- How does the well-being of our residents impact our quality of life and prosperity?
- How well are we connecting people to jobs, housing and recreation?

The Vital Signs process includes an annual assessment of our region's assets and challenges performed by the Chamber's Research Center, as well as the work of an Action Team of business and community leaders who are charged with convening regional leaders and identifying solutions to challenges that arise in the annual report.

Education

Improving public education is the top priority for the Nashville Chamber, as we facilitate the involvement of business leadership on behalf of our city's schools. The Education Committee provided nearly 80 Chamber members the opportunity to engage in quarterly discussions of pressing education issues. More than 200 Middle Tennesseans attended three Chamberled VIP tours of Metro Nashville Public School middle schools.

The Chamber continued its second year of support for student industry certifications through the Academies of Nashville. There was a 42 percent increase in student participation in 2016, and 207 MNPS high school seniors passed their certification exams.

The 24th annual Education Report Card was released in December 2015, providing a comprehensive performance assessment of Metro Nashville Public Schools. Since the report's release, specific progress has been made towards implementing three of its five recommendations:

- MNPS should implement a dramatic intervention for all students reading below grade level in first through third grades.
- The State of Tennessee should strengthen the current pre-K program.
- MNPS should conduct an independent, comprehensive review of its human capital department.

Leadership Study Mission 2016

The 25th annual Leadership Study Mission to Minneapolis-St. Paul enabled 138 delegates to learn about regional government, youth employment initiatives, a comprehensive approach to transit and creative solutions to eliminating intergenerational poverty. Delegates participated in 30 panels and programs and heard from 74 of the Twin Cities community leaders and elected officials. This important annual intercity visit concluded with its Middle Tennessee delegates committing to:

- Engage with regional issues through the Vital Signs process
- Join Moving Forward
- Ride public transportation more frequently
- Support the youth of their community through employment opportunities
- Raise awareness about the value of regional public transportation in their communities



The Middle Tennessee Reconnect Community

In March 2016, the Nashville Area Chamber and a consortium of workforce, community and education leaders from 10 Middle Tennessee counties launched the Middle Tennessee Reconnect Community (MTRC), a regional effort to encourage the more than 200,000 area residents with some postsecondary education, but no degree or certificate, to go back to school and complete their education. The effort was made possible by a grant from the Tennessee Higher Education Commission under Gov. Bill Haslam's Drive to 55 program. Drive to 55 aims to increase the capacity of the workforce in Tennessee by raising the number of Tennesseans statewide with a postsecondary degree or credential to 55 percent.

Services provided by the MTRC include:

- Advising on financial aid and how to pay for college;
- Counseling on choosing the best program and school;
- Providing a single point of contact for coordinating with schools;
- Connecting a degree to a career path; and
- Offering workshops on study skills, goal setting, technology and more.

Partnering with the Graduate! Network and provided with technical assistance and funding from Lumina Foundation, MTRC saw an immediate response from working adults throughout Middle Tennessee. In a little more than three months, more than 400 adults had signed up to meet with an advisor and begin the journey to return to school. Adult students across Middle Tennessee are enrolled in college or technical school today thanks to grants approved by the Tennessee General Assembly in fall 2015.

Bill Curran, a captain with the Nashville Fire Department, completed an associate degree in fire science technology. Curran earned his degree alongside his son, also an NFD firefighter, after beginning school more than 10 years ago.

The Middle Tennessee Regional Workforce Alliance and Skills Panels

To balance the supply and demand for talent, a public-private partnership was formed among business leaders, higher education administrators and workforce experts to collaborate on postsecondary curricula design. These volunteers form a middle Tennessee network of "skills panels" whose aim is to improve the skill sets of workers. That's why the Chamber is working with local Workforce Development Boards, the Tennessee Board of Regents, area community colleges and colleges of applied technology in forming the Middle Tennessee Regional Workforce Alliance, an effort to bring business leaders together with higher education to align curricula with the skills needed in the workplace of the future. These skills panels use data projecting future workforce demand and the opportunity to collaborate with employers in developing a pipeline of graduates with indemand skills.

This year, the Nashville Community Partnership for Attainment grant, funded by the Lumina Foundation, provided resources for the Chamber to engage regional stakeholders in two important initiatives.

The first initiative built career pathway maps to help guide adults to career opportunities in two key growth sectors: information technology and advanced manufacturing. Career pathway maps were outlined with guidance from the Council on Adult and Experiential Learning and skills panel employers. The pathways describe the sectors' major job families, entry and career ladder job descriptions, skills and education required to enter or advance in a career field, and wage data.

The second initiative built a sustainable model to support adults to enter or reenter college by establishing a network of community resources and employer champions. The Lumina Foundation grant facilitated the formation of the Middle Tennessee Reconnect Network. The project engaged employers, the public workforce system, higher education and community based organizations to build a strategic framework of resources for adult learners. This model became the basis for the Chamber's grant application to the Tennessee Higher Education Commission. The Chamber received one of three Tennessee Reconnect Community grants for \$245,000 to support a grassroots adult attainment initiative serving 10 Middle Tennessee counties.





The economic prosperity of a city is defined by the quality of their human capital, which is why the Chamber's talent development team plays a vital role in attracting and retaining talent in high-growth industries and occupations. Over the past year, the talent team has been instrumental in assisting with the workforce needs of more than 160 companies, representing more than 78,000 employees throughout the region.

YP Nashville

YP Nashville empowers young professionals to actively shape the future of the Nashville region, and advances our region's quality of life by attracting and retaining a strong representation of young professionals in our workforce.

- YP Nashville partnered with more than 50 young professional organizations in Middle Tennessee, resulting in a 98 percent retention
- Hosted a Young Professionals Mayoral Forum, attracting 160 young professionals to hear mayoral candidates discuss green space, income inequality, quality of place, entrepreneurs and plans for retaining young talent within our region; and
- Celebrated the ninth annual Nashville Emerging Leader Awards, recognizing 75 young professionals for their accomplishments in their respective industries, demonstrated leadership and involvement in communityservice activities.





a bold vision for economic prosperity

The economic development team maintained an aggressive marketing calendar in 2015-2016. In February, P2020 hosted the fifth annual Site Selectors Guild Conference at the Omni Hotel. The conference provided a unique opportunity to host more than 40 of the top global site selection consultants and to highlight Middle Tennessee.

The economic development team organized a group of 17 economic development partners from across the state to serve as the Tennessee Host Committee for the conference. As sponsors, the Tennessee Host Committee hosted a pre-conference songwriter reception at Puckett's in Franklin, as well as a VIP welcome reception with our Partnership 2020 investors at the Bell Tower featuring speakers Courtney Ross, Chamber chief economic development officer; Randy Boyd, Tennessee commissioner of economic and community development; Nashville Mayor Megan Barry; and John Bradley, TVA senior vice president of economic development. Tennessee Gov. Bill Haslam welcomed attendees to the conference, highlighting the unique business advantages of Nashville and Tennessee.

Team visits to Washington, D.C., New York City, Birmingham, Philadelphia, Scottsdale, Dallas, Chicago and Atlanta were held to market Nashville and Middle Tennessee to site consultants and active relocation or expansion prospects, as well as various company executives. The economic development team also built stronger relationships with our existing companies and welcomed new CEOs to Nashville.

The world came to Nashville in 2015-2016, as the Nashville Area Chamber of Commerce hosted business and government leaders from Europe, Asia and North America, connecting them to Middle Tennessee companies doing business on a global scale. The Chamber's efforts to promote international trade garnered recognition from Global Trade magazine, which named the Chamber one of America's top economic development organizations in February 2016. U.S. Secretary of Commerce Penny Pritzker also named Chamber International Business Director Lori Odom to the Tennessee District Export Council.

Notable events included visits by the Irish Ambassador to the U.S., Anne Anderson, who spoke at a

luncheon at Belmont University, hosted by the Chamber's International Business Council (IBC) and the Tennessee World Affairs Council, about challenges facing the European Union.

Russian Ambassador to the U.S. Sergei Kislyak visited Nashville in February, speaking at an IBC breakfast and later to the Nashville Rotary Club about the potential for improved economic ties between Russia and the U.S.

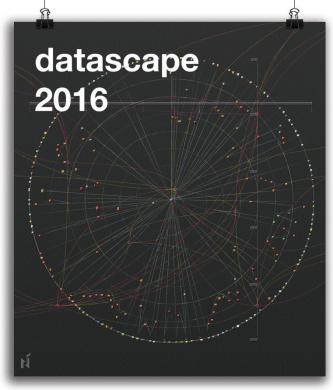

The Research Center completed major studies on a wide range of topics during the past year. Reports and activities gained local, regional and national attention in areas of workforce, livability and economic conditions.

Notably, the Research Center has gained considerable expertise in workforce and impact analysis. This year, the Research Center completed two major regional workforce studies to inform the region's economic and workforce environment through 2020: one for the Nashville market, and one for the combined five workforce areas of East Tennessee. These reports were presented to key leaders and organizations throughout the area as bases for strategy, planning and program implementation to advance workforce competitiveness.

Additionally, the Research Center presented at the Association of Chamber of Commerce Executives (ACCE) on uses of research as a foundation for the work of chambers and economic development organizations around the country. The 2016 edition of Datascape, a customized research publication for the Chamber's Leadership Study Mission delegates, received ACCE's Communications Excellence Award.





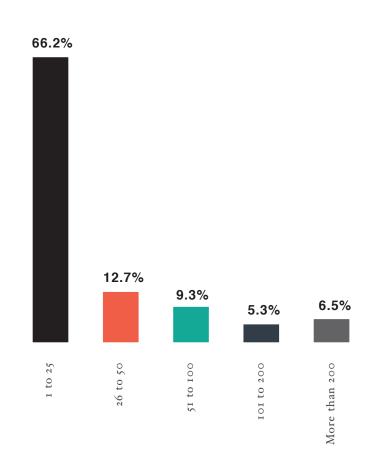

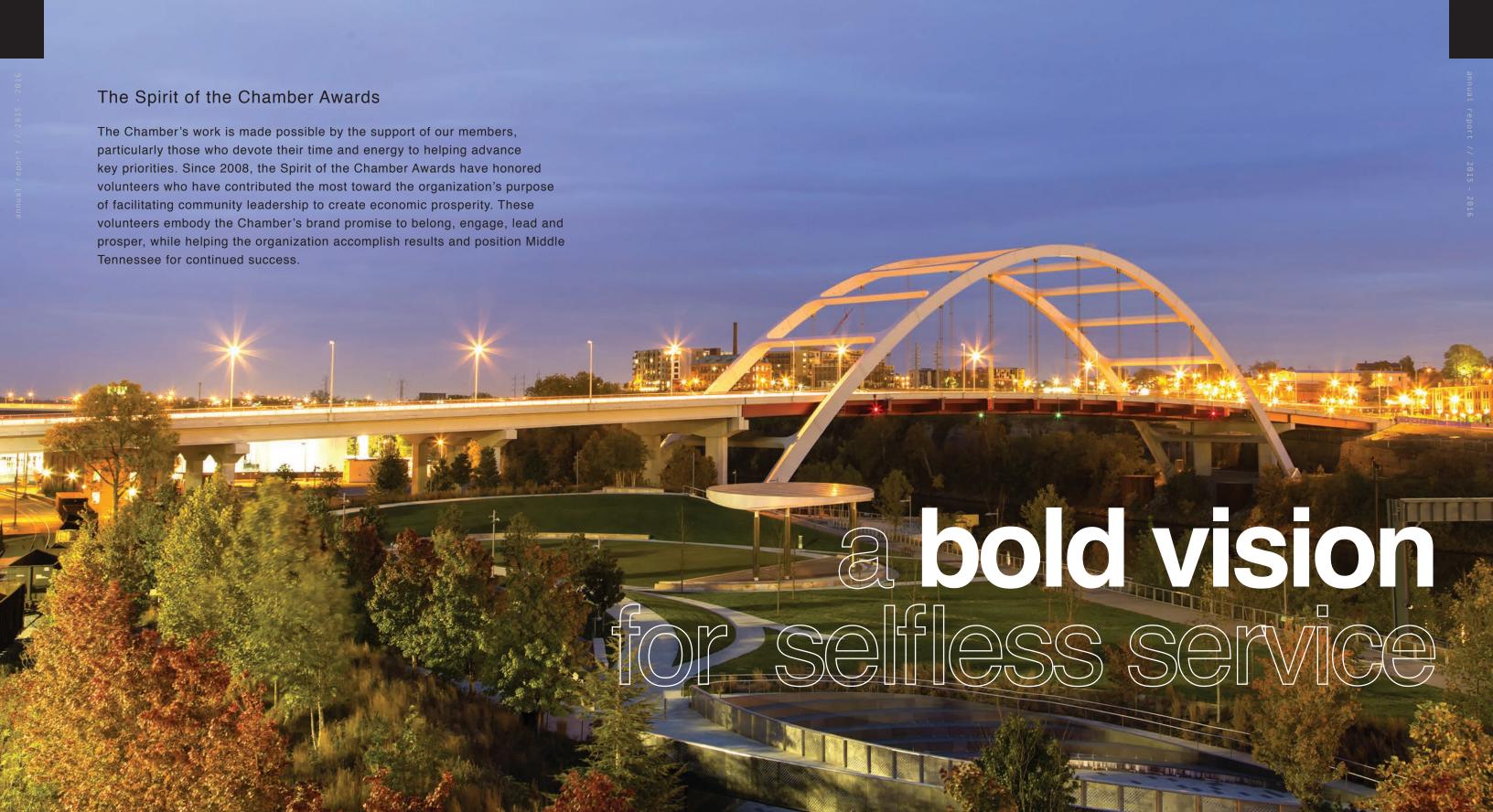


The Council Fellows Initiative

In 2016, Nashville Health Care Council Fellows, an annual initiative that brings together a select group of senior industry executives with renowned health care thought leaders, completed its fourth class. Thirty senior executives met for eight days to participate in a nationally unique curriculum, focused on business strategies, creating value, driving industry growth and effecting change.

Leadership Health Care

Leadership Health Care (LHC) is a Council initiative to foster the next generation of health care leaders by creating educational and networking opportunities for members. With more than 900 members, LHC is the foremost organization for emerging leaders in the field.



Rob Elliott is chief operating and chief financial officer for Stansell Electric Company, Inc. He served as the cochair of the 2015 Education Report Card Committee, and his background in business analytics brought a unique perspective to the committee's analysis of data for Metro Nashville Public Schools. His leadership, alongside committee co-chair Dr. Jewell Winn, created a sense of cohesiveness among committee members with differing perspectives and backgrounds. Elliott was also involved with the subcommittee charged with overseeing the implementation of the Report Card's recommendations and took a lead role in explaining the committee's work to members of the media during the release of the Report Card in December 2015. Additionally, Elliott has been active in sharing his experience as a Chamber member with prospective new members, and participated in a May 2016 membership drive which brought in nearly \$28,000 in new revenue to the Chamber.



Spirit of the Chamber: Dr. Jewell Winn

Dr. Jewell Winn serves as executive director of international affairs and chief diversity officer at Tennessee State University. Along with Rob Elliott, she served as co-chair of the Chamber's 2015 **Education Report Card Committee. 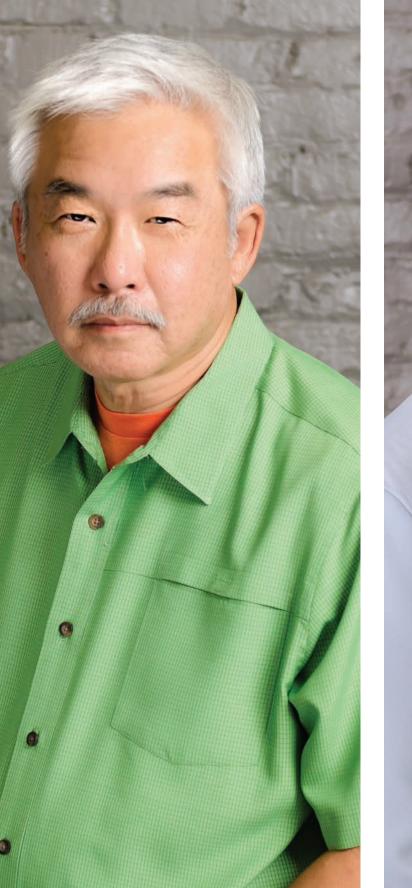


Spirit of the Chamber: Laura Reinbold
