

What Will Be Required to Maintain My CPH Status?

CPH professionals are required to obtain and document 50 hours of continuing education every two years. A convenient online CPH Recertification & Reporting System is available to all certificants. It includes digital badging, a digital certificate, a Code of Ethics and secure processing for credit card payments.

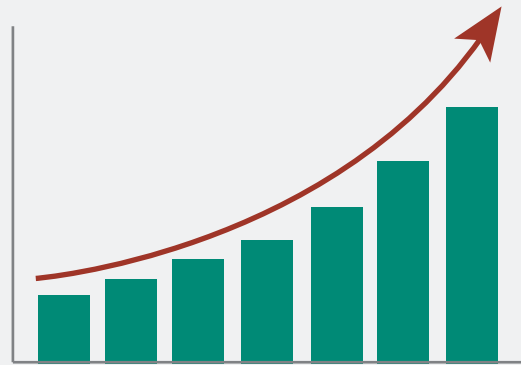

Why Should I Be Certified in Public Health (CPH)?

Becoming Certified in Public Health helps set standards consistent with the expectations of the public.

Benefits of the CPH Credential:

- Meet the standard of the profession by maintaining the credential

Can I Get Certified?

- Students or alumni of a school or program of public health accredited by the Council on Education for Public Health (CEPH)*.
- Individuals who have at least a bachelor's degree and at least five subsequent years' public health work experience will be eligible to take the CPH exam.
