

ave you noticed how kids desire to grow up, dreaming of the day they reach adulthood? "When I grow up, I will ...," we say. Yet, as adults, we yearn to be kids again, recalling what seemed to be a simpler time. As children, the world fascinates us; as adults, the world scares us. Children, recognizing the restrictions under which they live, look forward to the freedom they imagine they will enjoy as adults. But as we grow older, we realize there are different restrictions actually limiting that freedom. We tend to be concerned with social status,

political clout, and pecking order. We tend to rank people according to how things look to us in the world.

But Jesus warned that using earthly criteria will never give us an accurate picture of God's Kingdom. Consistent in Jesus' teaching is that His kingdom is not like the kingdoms of this world. The way of Jesus is one in which leaders are servants, the first are last and the last are first, enemies are loved, and suffering is held in regard. In God's kingdom, those whom the world looks down upon are looked up on.

Such is the context of Mark 10:15 where Jesus says "I tell you the truth, whoever does not receive the kingdom of

God like a child shall not enter it." What did Jesus mean? Any parent will recall the so-called "terrible 2's" – that year in a child's life when mood and behavior rapidly change and parents struggle to deal with them. Nope. That's not Jesus' point. Rather, as Matthew 18:3 suggests: that we have the humility of a child.

To experience the change that Jesus can bring into our lives, we must be teachable as little children. That, Jesus says, is the mark of true greatness. His first beatitude in Matthew 5:3 says *"Blessed are the poor in the spirit* (the humble), *for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."* And here's what we must remember: the Kingdom of God is not just some futuristic state. It's here and now; and as Christians, we are citizens first and foremost of that Kingdom. So

let's have that child-like faith and live out our citizenship to its fullest. Amen?

Is God calling you into a deeper relationship with Him? Membership to a church is an important step in our spiritual journey and growth. It is one way to affirm your faith in and love for Christ, and express your desire to worship, serve, and grow by connecting with others in mission and ministry through His church. Or, perhaps God is calling you into baptism. Come, learn about

this act of God through Christ's grace and the work of the Holy Spirit.

This is a six-week class led by Pastor Ken for the Nashville & Killbuck United Methodist Churches

and gain a better understanding of the Wesleyan tradition. The group sessions will be offered on six consecutive Wednesday evenings from **September 1 through October 6**, with other opportunities for one-on-one growth as well. - 1) Rent it, as an income source for maintenance & capital improvements
- 2) Partner with the "Homes of Hope" ministry through Love INC of
- Greater Holmes County to help families in need
- 3) Sell it, and put the proceeds in escrow
- 4) Maintain it as is for any future needs of a parsonage

Business manager Sue Weimer is compiling the costs of insurance, taxes and utilities for background information.

Vicki Conn from Love INC has provided information about Homes of Hope, which provides temporary housing for families facing a housing crisis and willing to participate in Love INC's Fresh Start ministry that includes budget coaching, goal-setting, and life-changing steps toward self-sufficiency. Details about Homes of Hope transitional housing are available at the church.
