You can be poor or rich, uneducated or college degreed, unknown or famous and be among the Ain'ts: coming home from school with a report card to hear *"You ain't smart enough."* You try out for a team and don't make the squad, or you interview for a job, only to hear, *"You ain't good enough," "You ain't experienced."* You ask the bank for a loan: *"You ain't qualified."* You try to fit in, but *"You ain't funny, or pretty or outgoing, or* (fill in the blank)...." Throughout history, though, no one gives hope like the rejected Jesus.

He is The One. And since I'm using grammar to make a point, notice the verb. He **IS** The One. Present tense. Jesus is not dead. He is Risen! He's alive! Yet, why do we respond to Jesus the way we do? Why ain't we more amazed? Why ain't we more willing to follow Him and shape our lives around Him? Anything less is but ... rejection. When we place Him anywhere

but first in our lives, we are rejecting Him no differently than those 2,000 years ago. We reject Jesus when we fail to trust and obey Him. We reject Jesus when we hear the word of God and fail to put it into practice. We reject Jesus in our disconnection from worship. We reject Jesus when we are more interested in what's going on around us than our relationship with Him. We reject Him in our failure to love others as God loves us.

Jesus knows what rejection feels like, from the Garden of Eden to the Garden of Gethsemane, from the wooden manger to the wooden cross. Yet, John 6:37 says Jesus will never reject those who genuinely seek Him. Praise God, we can know the hope that Jesus brings! A hope that can never fade ... even when

Churches gearing up for summer youth ministry

Planning is underway for some exciting learning and fun this summer at Nashville UMC, where Vacation Bible School will have a little different look.

Modeling Killbuck's successful Wild Wednesday ministry, Nashville is transitioning from a traditional weeklong VBS to a six-week series. Our theme each Wednesday from June 29 to July 27 will be "Jungle Safari," where children from kindergarten through fifth grades will learn about God as Creator, Provider, Protector, Savior, and King. Then, on August 3rd, we'll have an "End-of-Summer" celebration before school starts. Each weekly session will run from 5:30 to 8 p.m.

"Getting together one day each week has wonderful benefits," says Pastor Ken. "Children get to stay connected and engaged in learning throughout the summer. And it creates an opportunity for volunteers to stay fresh and not be bogged down with the sometimes demanding nature of a continuous multiday VBS."

At Killbuck, two three-day mini VBS's will be held: one in early summer, June 8-10; and another from July 27-29, from 10 a.m. to Noon. The theme is "Knights of God's Kingdom." In between, our six-week Wild Wednesday ministry will explore each of the pieces of the Armor of God.
